In celebration of Daviess County's Bicentennial the Daviess County Public Library is sponsoring Daviess County Memorabilia Day on Saturday, July 11th (1-5 pm). Various organizations and individuals that have items that reflect the history and culture of Daviess County have been invited to come and display them. A wide variety of items will be on display and also offered for sale. Items include art work, pictures, post cards, pamphlets, books, posters, signs, souvenirs, bottles, tokens, toys, antiques, products made locally and a multitude of other vintage collectibles. In the parking lot there will be an Owensboro Wagon, 1925 Ames auto, 1956 Owensboro police cruiser and 1926 Seagrave fire engine.

Both floors of the library will be a treasure trove of items to view and purchase. In the Kentucky Room, on the first floor, historic items from the Kentucky Room's collection will be on display. On the east end of the Kentucky Room there will be a Daviess County Book Store with free handouts and items on Daviess County for purchase – they include duplicate books & pamphlets from the library's collection, genealogy society's family history books on Daviess County, Greenwood Cemetery book, Messenger-Inquirer books, 1881 Birds' Eye View of Owensboro poster, postcards from Nona's Downtown Market, and complementary items from the Owensboro-Daviess County Tourist Commission and Greater Owensboro Chamber of Commerce. At the display of the Daviess County Bicentennial Committee the new history of Daviess County and other souvenirs celebrating the Bicentennial will be available. Also on the first floor will be booths hosted by the Owensboro Fire Department, Daviess County Sheriff, Joe Ford Nature Center, Owensboro Health Regional Hospital, Archives of the Owensboro Catholic Diocese, Archives of the Ursuline Sisters of Mount St. Joseph, Owensboro Area Museum of Science & History, Owensboro Antique Mall, Bruner's Collectables, and collectors, Steve Marks, Ben McGill and Paul Coomes.

Keith,

I would like to thank you again for the article you did about Daviess County Memorabilia Day at the library. The event was truly a celebration of Daviess County's history. I believe your article and some other avenues I pursued helped to get the word out and led to its success. This time I am not writing to request anything from you I just wanted you to personally know about the success of the program. I see you as the premier historian and voice for the history of Daviess County.

From 1 to 5 p.m. on Saturday Daviess County Memorabilia Day was held at the Daviess County Public Library. As a member of Daviess County's Bicentennial Committee I presented my ideas to the library on January 14 of this year for five programs that the library could host in celebration of the county's bicentennial. Over the past six months I spent many hours at the library and of my own time in organizing Daviess County Memorabilia Day. I had visualized and hoped it would be one of the most successful and well attended programs that have been hosted at the library. It indeed was. For the first three hours of the event the library's parking lot stayed full and many people had to walk from blocks away. Library staff estimated the attendance in excess of 400. On the average there were three or more people standing at each booth for the first couple of hours. On my first full pass through the library displays I counted 153 in about the first 20 minutes.

All thirty-five presenters, who had been invited, arrived and packed both floors of the library with antiques, art work and memorabilia. The number of presenters and their assistants alone exceeded any other previous program at the library. The parking lot display of an Owensboro Wagon, 1925 Ames auto, 1956 Owensboro police cruiser and a 1926 Seagrave Fire engine were a popular and impressive site. When the Fire Department arrived with the latter they also came with and parked two other fire engines.

One of the tables I prepared as part of the Kentucky Room's display was a memorial to your late compatriot and my fellow Bicentennial Committee member and friend, Glenn Hodges.

The library staff and I got many comments of praise and thank-you's for the event. Lee & Aloma Dew, chair persons for the Bicentennial Committee and Karen Porter, who was in charge of publicity for the committee, said we had no idea it was going to be so extensive and successful.
