

# DeJarnette - Ball Cemetery

## Breckinridge County, KY

On Highway 992, about one mile east of Highway 105, turn right (south) into gravel lane just past the Clover Creek bridge. Lane leads back to farm of Scott G. Smart. In behind his house walk up hill, to the right, go around pond, at end of pond walk towards edge of woods. Cemetery is just across the fence in wooded area. Found four inscribed monuments and signs of at least 10 unmarked graves. Copied 12 November 1985 by Jerry Long, Owensboro, KY.

Zachary (Zack) Taylor DeJarnette (1848-1890) and Milton Christopher DeJarnette (1860-1908) were sons of James C. DeJarnette & Jane Miller; Thomas Jefferson Ball (1842-1888) married their sister, Judith Alice DeJarnette (1845-1909). The following biography of Andrew R. DeJernett, an uncle of Zack, Milton & Judith, was published in the book, Kentucky: A History of the State (J. H. Battle, W. H. Perrin & G. C. Kniffin, 1885):

ANDREW B. DEJERNETT is descended from an old French family of note, and is the son of John and Judith (Moorman) Dejernett, natives of Virginia. The father of John Dejernett was a native of France, which country he left in an early day, on account of being implicated in a conspiracy against the Government. In company with two fellow countrymen, De Bruce and Du-Pie, who, with himself, were ordered to be arrested for treason, he made his escape to America, and for a number of years was a resident of Campbell County, Va., where he accumulated a very large estate. John Dejernett was born in Virginia about the year 1788, but came to Kentucky and settled about four miles west of

Hardinsburg in the year 1808, and died in 1854. His wife, Judith Dejernet, was the daughter of James C. and Judith Moorman. She was born in Virginia, and died in Breckinridge County about 1846; Mr. and Mrs. Dejernet had a family of seven children, whose names are as follows: . Lucy. Susan, James, Daniel, George, Andrew R. and Judith. Andrew R. Dejernet was born in Breckinridge County, June 18, 1822, and grew to manhood on a farm, meantime receiving an English education in such schools as the country at that time afforded. He remained with his parents as long as they lived, looking after their interests. In 1848 or 1850 he purchased a part of the paternal homestead near Hardinsburg, on which he resided until 1858, when he purchased his present farm of 490 acres in Hardinsburg Precinct two miles and a half north of the county seat. This is one of the best farms in the district, and Mr. Dejernet is justly classed among the most successful agriculturists of the county. He is a member of the Baptist Church, which he has been connected with for a period of forty-two years, and in politics votes with the Democratic party. He was married February 19, 1846, to Miss Ann Eliza Miller, daughter of Michael and Nancy (Clark) Miller, who has borne him nine children: Allie M., present sheriff of Breckinridge County; John T.; Miller, deceased; Lulie, wife of Gideon Miller; Taylor, deceased; Calvin, deceased; Annie, deceased; Judith, wife of Barney Squires, and Maggie M.
