

Zachariah Hines

(c1800-1858)

Zachariah Hines was born about 1800 in Virginia. He was probably the son of James Hines. A Revolutionary War soldier James Hines served in the Virginia line during the Revolution and sometime between 1800 and 1818 left Virginia and moved to Grainger County, Tennessee, where he applied for and drew a pension for his service in the Revolution. The 1830 census of Grainger County, Tenn. indicates that James Hines was between 80 & 90 years of age. The 1840 Grainger County, Tenn. census lists him as being a Revolutionary War veteran and pensioner; He died between-1840-1850.

Zachariah Hines appeared in the 1822 tax book of Grainger County, Tenn. On 13 October 1825 he married Sarah Brastly in Grainger County, Tenn.; bond was by Noel S. Hines. She was born in Virginia about 1806. In 1830 Zachariah Hines was listed in the census of McMinn County, Tenn. (spelled Hinds in census). In Grainger County, Tenn. in 1820 three Hines families were listed - James Hines, aged 80-90; William B. Hines, aged 40-50; and Zepheniah Hines, aged 30-40, the last-two were probably sons of James.

By 1840 Zachariah Hines had moved back to Grainger County, Tenn. In the census of Grainger County in 1840 two Hines were listed: Zachariah and James Hines. The family of Zachariah and Sarah Hines appeared in the 1850 Grainger County, Tenn. census. Their name was spelled Hinds and they were the only Hines/Hinds family listed as living in the county. Listed immediately following Zechariah and Sarah Hines were Anderson and Amanda (Hines) Davis, their daughter and her husband, who were newlyweds. Between mid 1850 and 3 July 1851 Zechariah and Sarah Hines moved their family to Ohio County, Ky. Several other families of Grainger County, Tenn., including the Farless, Townsley, Troglin, Daniel and Davis families also moved to Ohio County, Ky. during the same time period.

James R. & Rebecca (Townsley) Farless and Thomas & Malinda (Troglin) Townsley were reported to be uncles and aunts of the children of Zachariah & Sarah Hines. James R. Farless was listed in the 1830 census of McMinn County, Term., where Zachariah Hines was living in 1830. At the time of the 1850 census James R. & Rebecca Farless were residing in Rutherford County, Tenn. Rebecca Farless born 1810 in Virginia, in 1880 was living with Zachariah & Sarah's son, John H. Hines (born 1834) in Ohio County, Ky., in the census she was listed as being his aunt, John H. Hines in Ohio County, Ky. in 1881 married his cousin, Mrs. Sarah Jane Williamson, the daughter of James R. and Rebecca Farless; Sarah Jane was born in 1840 in Tenn.

Thomas Townsley, born about 1815 in East Tennessee was listed only a few households from the families of Zachariah and James Hines in the 1840 census of Grainger County, Tenn. Thomas Townsley married Elizabeth Ann Shelley 23 November 1836 Grainger County, Tenn. and Malinda (Troglin) Daniels 4 November 1843 Grainger County, Tenn.; Malinda was born about 1817 in East Tennessee. Thomas and Malinda left Grainger County, Tenn., about 1847 and moved to Ohio County, K., where they were listed in the 1850 census. About three years after they went to Ohio County Zachariah and Sarah Hines moved there. In Ohio County their families became neighbors. One of the sons of Thomas and Malinda Townsley was reportedly hanged in 1865 in Ohio County, Ky. by Confederate guerillas. A band of Rebs, under the command of William Quantrill, passed through the county disguised as Union soldiers, one of the party was Frank James, the brother of Jesse James, During their trek through the county they executed three Union sympathizers of whom Townsley was one.

When Zachariah & Sarah Hines came to Ohio County, Ky. from Tennessee in about 1851 they came with five children -Rebecca (born 23 February 1828), Amanda (born c1831), John H. (born 29 May 1834), Elizabeth (born c1849) and Mary (born 7 January 1843), all three were born in Tennessee. The marriage and subsequent census records of their children consistently indicate that their parents were born in the state of Virginia.

Zachariah Hines is first listed, in the tax records of Ohio County in 1851, he does not appear in the 1850 census of Ohio County or in the index, for the 1850 census of the state of Kentucky. The Hines family settled in the northern part of Ohio County in the area between the communities of Bell's Run (formerly known as Westerfield) and Pleasant Ridge, about one mile south of the Ohio-Daviess County line. They made their home near the family of Thomas and Malinda Townsley, who also came from Tennessee. The Townsleys had made the trip about three years earlier. Grandchildren of Zachariah Hines (family of Gilbert A. Hines) referred to the grandchildren of the Townley's as cousins.

Shortly after arriving in Ohio County Zachariah Hines daughter, Rebecca, married Benjamin N. Graves. They were married in Ohio County on 3 July 1851. Benjamin. N. Graves, son of John Cole Graves and Susannah McCoy recently had moved to Ohio County from the Philpot section of Daviess county, at the time his sister Lucinda Graves, wife of William Kirk, was living in the same community were the Hines were residing. After their marriage Ben and Rebecca Hines Graves lived on a farm in the Bell's Run community about one mile east of Pleasant Ridge in Ohio County.

On 13 November 1854 Sarah, the wife of Zachariah Hines, died, aged 49. She was buried on the farm of Ben and Rebecca Hines Graves. Sarah Hines's monument is the oldest of five inscribed markers in what is referred to as the "Graves Cemetery". It is located a short distance

off of Highway 764 (Pleasant Ridge - Bell's Run Road) about one mile east of Pleasant Ridge and just, east of the Green River Parkway. In the 1852-1861 vital statistics kept by the state of Kentucky the following as recorded - Sarah Hines died 9 November 1854 Ohio County, of congestive fever, age 50, married, born Virginia, parents unknown.

In the tax records of Ohio County Zachariah Hines is listed in the years of 1851, 1852 and 1857. the tax books for the years 1853-1856 and 1858 are missing, in 1851 he was assessed taxes for 100, acres on Panther Creek and in the age category of 5-16 he was shown as having two children of that age living in his home, in 1852 he was taxed on 110 acres on Panther Creek and in the category of children aged 6-18 two were listed. In the 1857 tax list he was listed as having no land and two children aged 6-18 where in his home, in the 1859 and later tax lists of Ohio County Zachariah Hines is not listed,

Zachariah Hires died in 1858. On November 9th of that year his son, John Hines, was appointed administrator of his estate; recorded in Ohio County Administrator Bond Book 1854-1863, page 221. His son-in-laws, Ben N. Graves and Anderson Davis paid the security on the bond. Anderson Davis, a neighbor of the Hines family, was born about 1832 in Tennessee and married Amanda Hines 8 July 1849 in Grainger County, Tenn. At the time of the 1860 Ohio County, Ky, census Zachariah & Sarah's daughter, Miss Elizabeth Hines, age 20 born in Tenn, was living with the Davis family. One of the grandchildren of Zechariah Hines was named William Anderson Hines. Anderson and Amanda (Hines) Davis had the following children - John Franklin, James T., William B., Lizzie B., Herman and Luther A. Davis.

On 16 November 1858 in the Ohio County Circuit Court William E. Kirk, Robert Moseley and David S. French were appointed to make an inventory of the estate of Zachariah Hines, deceased. The folder on his estate at the Ohio County courthouse contains three documents: the appointment of the appraisers, the inventory bill and the sale bill of his property. In the inventory of his estate he was shown as owning one horse, one cow, one heifer, one saddle-blanket & bridle, Zachariah Hines left no will and no land deeds were recorded by him in the deed books of Ohio County. He was probably buried in the "Graves Cemetery" beside his wife, Sarah, but no monument for him was found in the cemetery.

John H. Hines, son of Zachariah & Sarah, on 8 June 1858 married Harriet Graves, a sister of his brother-in-law, Benjamin N. Graves. She was born 15 March 1835 in Daviess County, Ky. to John Cole Graves and Susannah McCoy. John and Harriet Hines were married in Daviess County at her father's residence about two miles northeast of Philpot, near the present site of the Hopewell Baptist Church. Witnesses to their marriage were David S. French and Alex Melton, The Rev. James C. Stewart (3 February 1813 - 29 May 1892), a Baptist minister, performed the ceremony. Rev. Stewart resided in Ohio County and was associated with several Baptist churches there, including Bell's Run and Barnett's Creek, he was buried at the latter. John and Harriet Hines were one of 319 couples married by Rev. Stewart. At the time of their marriage John was 24 years old and Harriet was 23.

John and Harriet Hines were listed in the 1860 census of Ohio County. They were living in the Bell's District and their post office was at Buford. Listed immediately following them was the family of Benjamin and Rebecca Graves, his sister and her brother; the next family listed in the census was that of Thomas and Malinda Townsley. Their home in Ohio County would have been about 10 or 12 miles south of the Graves' former home in Daviess County.

The 1860 census indicates that John Hines owned no land, he was listed as a farmer-tenant. In the land deeds of Ohio County he is never shown as buying or selling any land. His brother-in-law, Ben N. Graves, did own a farm and in the 1860 census it was shown as being valued at \$1000. Since John Hines and Benjamin Graves were listed next to each other in the census John Hines was probably a tenant on the Graves farm, the same farm where members of the Hines family had been laid to rest. The listings for the Hines, Graves, Townsley and Davis families in the 1860 census of Ohio County appeared as follows:

Mary Hines, 17 years old, living in the home of John and Harriet Hines in 1860 was his sister. On 30 May 1865 Mary Hines married Thomas L. Midkiff. They were married in Ohio

County at the home of her brother-in-law, Ben N. Graves. On her marriage bond it was reported that she was age 22, born in Tenn., and her parents were born in Virginia.

In the 1870 census of Ohio County the family of John and Harriet Hines was again listed in the Bell's Run community immediately before the household of Ben and Rebecca Graves. The listing appeared is follows:

On 29 March 1876 Mrs. Harriet Graves Hines, wife of John H. Hines, died, she was 41 years old. She has a monument in the Graves Cemetery on the old farm of her brother, Benjamin N. Graves. By the time of the 1880 census John Hines was no longer living near the Graves farm, he was enumerated several miles south of the Bell's Run community in the Bartlett's Precinct. One of his sons, Alonzo N. Hines, was living with his aunt and uncle, Benjamin and Rebecca Graves. John and Harriet Hines other son, James T., was working as a farm hand on the farm of Bluford Greer in the Bartlett's Precinct, a short distance from where his father was living. The listings for the Hines and Graves families in the 1880 census of Ohio County appeared as follows:

John H. Hines married a second time on 13 September 1881. In Ohio County at his residence he married Mrs. Sarah Jane Williamson. They were married by Rev. John Samuel Taylor, a Baptist minister of the Bell's Run area. On their marriage bond the following information was recorded: Groom - John Hines, occupation farmer, age 47, born Tenn., parents born Va., residence Ohio County, second marriage; Bride - Mrs. Sarah J. Williamson, age 41, born Tenn., third marriage. Sarah Jane in the 1880 census of Ohio County, Ky. was shown as living in the home of John Hines. Her name at that time appeared as Mrs. Sarah J. Coin and she was listed as being a cousin of the head of the household, John Hines. Sarah Jane Farless was the daughter of James R. Farless & Rebecca P. Townsley and married T. J. Williamson, 24 October 1860 Caldwell County, Ky. The Rebecca Farless in the 1880 census is her mother. Sarah Jane married Oliver Perry Coin (Cowen), 8 March 1874. The Robert E. Williamson age 13 in the Hines home in 1880 is her son, another son was Commodore Williamson, who at the time of the 1880 Ohio County census was age 19 (born Ky.), living in the home of Mrs. Malinda Townsley, widow of Thomas. Rebecca Farless, Sarah Jane, Robert E. and Commodore Williamson were not listed in the 1870 census of Ohio County.

Sometime between 1881 and 1889 John H. Hines moved from Ohio County to the city of Owensboro in Daviess County, Ky. In the Owensboro City Directories of 1889-1890, 1891-1892, and 1893-1894 John H. Hines appeared. Listings for John H. Hines and members of his family as they appeared in these three editions appeared as follows;

Mrs. Mary Edna Millay of Owensboro remembers her father, Gilbert A. Hines, saying that he used to live in a little shotgun house which was the first house behind St. Paul's Catholic Church in Owensboro. The Church is on the corner of 4th and Bolivar streets. He apparently was speaking of the Hines family residence at 319 Bolivar which was where they were living at the time of the 1893-1894 Owensboro City Directory. The next available directory is 1897 and in that issue John H. Hines was not listed.

John H. Hines died 7 July 1893 in Owensboro, Daviess County, Ky. He would have then been 59 years His name does not appear in the administrator bonds or estate records of either Daviess or Ohio County. The following notice of his death appear in the Owensboro newspaper:

Owensboro Messenger, Owensboro, Ky., Thursday, 13 July 1893, p8:

Mr. John Hines died Friday morning at his home on Bolivar street, between Third and Fourth. He had been the past three years of consumption. Funeral services were held Friday afternoon and the body was taken to Pleasant Ridge for burial.

John H. Hines probably was buried in the Graves Cemetery near Pleasant Ridge. His wife, Harriet Graves Hines, was buried there. No monument for him was located. The oldest surviving grandchild of John H. Hines, Mrs. Pearl Deane McKinley of Owensboro, the daughter of Gilbert A. Hines, was born 21 July 1900. She does not remember her grandfather Hines and believed he died before she was born, she did not know where he was buried at.

Mrs. Sarah Jane Hines survived her husband, John H. Hines, by several years. Mary Edna Millay, daughter of Gilbert A. Hines, was born 26 March 1910 and can remember seeing her. Mrs. Millay said that she visited them when she was quite small, they called her "Little Grandma", and while at their home she asked her father to take her to see Tom and Pod (John) Townsley, who were brothers and cousins to her dad. Mrs. Millay went on to say that she died at the Little Sisters of the Poor home in Evansville, Ind., but she did not know where she was buried at. The death certificate for Sarah Hines shows that she died on 23 March 1926 at the Little Sisters of the Poor home in Evansville, Ind. and was buried at the St. Joseph Cemetery in Evansville. The same record records that she was born in Tennessee on 19 March 1842.

Mrs. Marguerite Hallmark of Owensboro, the widow of Luther Townsley, remembers her mother-in-law, Mrs. Cordelia Townsley, speak of "Aunt Jane Hines", who came from Evansville once to visit them. Luther, Tom, John and Frank Townsley were the sons of Joseph Aaron Townsley and Cordelia Bales, and grandsons of Thomas and Malinda Townsley who were former neighbors of the Hines family in Ohio County.

Six children were born to the marriage of John H. Hines and Harriet Graves, they were:

James Temple Hines married Virginia Creed Ford, 10 May 1883, at her parents home in Ohio County, She was the daughter of William Samuel Ford and Helen Prudence Burton, and was born in Daviess County, Ky. on 1 December 1862. On their marriage bond the following was recorded: Groom - James T. Hines, age 22, 1st marriage, occupation farming, born Ohio County, Ky., father born Tenn., mother born Daviess County, Ky. Bride - Virginia C. Ford, age 20, first marriage, born Daviess County, Ky., parents born Daviess County, Ky., residence Ohio County. Bond was by Henry Green Sapp, who was married to Virginia's sister, Retty Ford. Two of James T. Hines' brothers later married sisters of his wife, Alonzo N. Hines married Rhoda Ann Ford and Gilbert A. Hines married Willie Edna Ford.

After their marriage James T. and Virginia Hines lived in Ohio County near Adaburg. In the 1890 tax list of Ohio County he was listed in the Buford Precinct and was shown as being taxed on 98 acres. No land deeds were recorded at Hartford whereby he purchased any land and this land he may have been leasing, possibly from his father-in-law, W. S. Ford, who was listed in the tax list as his nearest neighbor and who was a land owner.

Virginia C. Ford Hines, wife of James T., died 30 January 1894 at the young age of 31, She was buried in Ohio County, Ky. at the Antioch Christian Church Cemetery, located on the Ralph-Bell's Run Road, in the area known as Taylorfield, about one mile west of Adaburg. She left three young sons all under the age of nine. James T. Hines remarried on 21 January 1897 to Emma Catherine Carter. They were married at Narrows in Ohio County. On the marriage bond it was reported that J. T. Hines was age 37, 2nd marriage, occupation farming, residence Adaburg, born Ohio County, father born Tenn., and mother born Daviess County, Ky. "Kate" Carter was born in June 1857 in Ohio County. The daughter of George W. Carter and Emeline Neville, she had first married W. E. Chapman on 24 February 1895 in Ohio County, she never had any children.

The 1900 census of Ohio County shows James T. Hines, his wife Kate and three sons, living near Adaburg. They were listed immediately next to the family of George A. and Alice Ford Weller, a sister of his first wife. According to the Ohio County deed records on 4 July 1901 J. T. Hines and J. L. Ralph, Jr. who were trading and doing business under the firm, name of Ralph & Hines of Ohio County, and being indebted to G. A. Weller for the sum of \$2000, they sold to him their stock of dry goods, groceries, boots, shoes, clothing, hardware & C., together with storehouse and lot near Adaburg (deed book 20, page 265).

James T. Hines at the age of 44 died on 28 April 1905. He was buried beside his wife, Virginia C. Ford, at the Antioch Christian Church Cemetery. Four children were born to their

marriage – Eskel Burton, Arnold Graves, Harmon Leslie and Helen H. Hines. Eskel Burton Hines born 19 October 1886, never married, died 13 July 1923 Ohio County, Ky. and was buried at the Antioch Christian Church Cemetery. Arnold Graves Hines born 21 October 1887 married Goldie Martin, died in Ohio County 21 October 1924 and was buried at the Adaburg Cemetery. Harmon Leslie Hines born 25 June 1891 (the 1900 census has his birth as being in June 1889,. married Addie Lee Burdette, died in Owensboro, Ky. 13 February 1978 and was buried in the Elmwood Cemetery in Owensboro. Helen H. Hines born 29 December 1892, died 20 September 1893 and was buried in the Antioch Christian Church Cemetery, the following notice of her death appeared in the Ohio County newspapers

Hartford Herald, Hartford, Ky., Wednesday, 27 September 1893:

Adahburg, Ky., September 23, - That cold and unwelcome visitor, death, has visited this place this week and claimed for its victim the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. James Hines.

Alonzo Nelson Hines, son of John H. Hines and Harriet Craves, is listed in the 1890 tax list of Ohio County, Ky. which indicated he was residing next to his brother, James Hines. On 27 September 1891 he married Rhoda Ann Ford at the home of her parents, William S. Ford and Helen P. Burton, in Ohio County. She was born 19 May 1874 in Daviess County, Ky, just two years after their marriage at the age of 19 she died on 20 August 1893. She was buried at the Antioch Christian Church Cemetery in Ohio County.

On 29 August 1895 Alonzo N. Hines died in Owensboro, Daviess County, Ky. and was buried at the Antioch Christian Church in Ohio County, Ky. The following death notice appeared in the Owensboro newspaper:

Owensboro Messenger, Owensboro, Ky., Saturday, 31 August 1895, p4:

Alonzo Hines died Wednesday at his home at his home on East Fourth street, of consumption, aged thirty-two years. The remains will be buried at the Antioch church, Ohio county.

On 14 March 1896 in Daviess County, Ky. his brother-in-law, Benjamin A. Ford, was appointed administrator for the estate of Alonzo Hines, deceased, the security on the bond was by his father-in-law, W. S. Ford. If he was buried at the Antioch Cemetery in Ohio County by his wife no monument marks his grave. Alonzo N and Rhoda Hines had one child, Pruda Helen. She was born 22 September 1892, according, to her obituary she was born in Daviess County. She was raised by her grandparents, William S. and Helen P. Ford, with whom she was listed with in the 1900 census of Daviess County. She married Henry J. Gordon and died in Owensboro, Ky. 10 December 1963, she was buried in the Rose Hill Cemetery in that city.

William: Anderson Hines, son of John H. Hines and Harriet Graves, moved to Owensboro, Ky. with his father about 1889. In the 1889-1890, 1891-1892 and 1893-1894 city directories of Owensboro he is shown, as residing with his father, his occupation was listed as

carpenter. In Daviess County on 27 March 1895 he married Mrs. Malinda B. Taylor, the widow of Thomas S. Taylor, who had formerly lived in the Bell's Run area in Ohio County. Bond for their marriage was by C. K. Williamson, he may have been the Commodore Williamson who in 1880 was living in Ohio County and who was probably the son of Mrs. Sarah Jane (Farless) Williamson, who married William A. Hines father. Malinda B. was the daughter of Patrick Hickey and Lavina Moore; she was born 1 April 1852 In Marion County, Ky. When the 1900 census of Daviess County was taken William A. and Malinda Hines were living in Owensboro at 423 Hall Street, two of her children by her former marriage were living with them, his occupation was given as a carpenter. William A. and Malinda later separated. He did not have any children. On 10 December 1931 she died at Utica in Daviess County and was buried at the Rose Hill Cemetery in Owensboro. William A. Hines in his later years lived in Ohio County at Buford. He died 9 October 1944 at Habit in Daviess County and was buried at the Mount Cannel Baptist Church Cemetery at Buford in Ohio County, on Highway 231 two miles south of Pleasant Ridge.

John Thomas Hines, son of John H. Hines and Harriet Graves, is believed to have died in his teens. In 1880 he was living with his father in Ohio County, he was then 13 years old. In a deed recorded on 9 October 1883 in Daviess County involving the heirs of his grandfather, John Cole Graves, the name of Thomas Hines is listed as one of the heirs, suggesting he was still living at that time, he would have then been 16. He may have died between 1883-1890, in the 1890 tax list of Ohio County and in the Owensboro City Directories of the early 1890's his name does not appear. In the Graves Cemetery in Ohio County he does not have a monument.

Alice Eudora Hines, daughter of John H. Hines and Harriet Graves, was called Dora and never married. The 1889-1890, 1891-1892 and 1893-1894 Owensboro City Directories show her residing with her father, she was listed as being a seamstress. In 1900 she was living, with her brother, Gilbert A. Hines, near Philpot in Daviess County. She later lived with her brother, William A. Hines, at Buford in Ohio County, where she died on 8 August 1944. William A. Hines died two months following her death and they were buried together at the Mount Carmel Baptist Church Cemetery at Buford.

Gilbert Arthur Hines, son of John H. Hines and Harriet Graves, most of his life lived and worked as a farmer in Daviess County in the vicinity of Philpot and Habit. In 1893 he was living with his father at 319 Bolivar Street in Owensboro. On 8 November 1893 he married Willie Edna Ford in Owensboro. She was the daughter of William S. Ford and Helen P. Burton, and was born 12 March 1872 in Daviess County. In the 1900 census of Daviess County Gilbert and Edna Hines were listed next to her parents in the Philpot neighborhood. Willie Edna Ford Hines died 31 July 1902. She was buried at the Antioch Christian Church Cemetery in Ohio County, where her two sisters, Rhoda Ann Hines and Virginia C. Hines had been buried. To Gilbert and Edna one child, Pearl Deane, was born. She was born in Daviess County on 21 July 1900, she married Armitt McKinley and lived in Owensboro.

Gilbert A. Hines married second Bernice Leone Hawkins on 16 June 1909 in Daviess County, Ky. She was the daughter of Moody Hawkins and Mary Eliza Webster, and was born 21 May 1890. She died 29 August 1933 and he died on 31 January 1953 in Owensboro. They were buried at the Pleasant Grove Methodist Church Cemetery near Philpot in Daviess County, Ky. They had six children - Mary Edna Hines (born 26 March 1910, married Thomas V. Millay, and lived in Owensboro); James Arthur Hines (born 28 August 1912, married Virginia and died 16 April 1974 at Union City, Tenn, where he was buried); Chester Marvin Hines (born 14 March 1915, married Pearl Kellem. and Georgie, he lived in Owensboro); Catherine Hortense Hines (born 4 September 1917, married Jerome Howard, and lived in Owensboro); William Thomas Hines (born 11 March 1920. married Dorothy Turner and Eugena Maple, he died 14 March 1985 and was buried Elmwood Cemetery in Owensboro); John Edward Hines (born 17 December 1922, died 4 September 1924, buried at the Pleasant Grove Methodist Church Cemetery in Daviess County, Ky.).

Rebecca Hines, daughter of Zachariah Hines & Sarah Brastly, was born 23 February 1828 in Tennessee. In Ohio County, Ky. she married Benjamin N. Graves on 3 July 1851. They resided in Ohio County. Her husband died on Christmas day in 1893 and was buried in the Graves Cemetery on his farm. Rebecca Graves in 1900 was living with her sister Mary Hines Midkiff in Owensboro, Ky. Rebecca Hines Graves died 28 December 1915 Ohio County, KY. She was buried in the Graves Cemetery in Ohio County, KY; her grave is unmarked. Her death certificate listed her parents as Zachariah Hines & Sarah Townsley. Ben and Rebecca Graves had seven children - John R. (died at age of 10), Sarah Alice (married Palestine Chapman and died at the age of 24), Mary E. (married Lapsly H. Mahan), Leslie V. (a promising young lawyer died of consumption at the age of 27), Benjamin N., Dennie Zachariah Graves (married Maude Westerfield and died at the age of 22) and one other child died in infancy. The following notice of his death was published in the Owensboro, Ky. newspaper:

Owensboro Daily Messenger, Wednesday, 27 December 1893:

Mr. Ben Graves, of Ohio County, died Monday night of consumption at the age of 72 years. The funeral occurred at the family residence yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Interment in the family burying ground.

Mary Hines, daughter of Zachariah Hines & Sarah Brastly, was born 7 January 1843 in Tennessee. She married Thomas L. Midkiff in Ohio County on 30 May 1865. He was born in Ohio County on 17 July 1842. His parents were James G. Midkiff and Elizabeth D. Taylor, his father was a first cousin of the noted western frontiersman: and hero, Kit Carson. Thomas and Mary Midkiff about 1890 left Ohio County and moved to Owensboro, Ky. She died 14 January 1913 in Owensboro at her home, 701 Breckinridge Street. Her husband died 31 May 1928 at Princeton, Ind. They were both buried in Owensboro at the Elmwood Cemetery. Seven children were born to their union - Lois E. (married U. G. Byers); Robert H. (died as a young man); Eunice E. (married Samuel Griffith); Alfred Carter (married Sarah F. Pearce); John W. (married

Marilda Carrie Stein); Eliza (died in infancy); and Bertha M. (married Henry J. Fritz, a noted baker of Owensboro and Princeton, Ind.
