

# The Iglehart – Igleheart Family

The spelling of the Igleheart name varies in early records. The name is also found as Iglehart, Inglehart, Egleheart. Icleheart and other variations. Older generations of the family in Maryland and those that remained in the east spelled their name "Iglehart" whereas members of the family that moved west used the spelling "Igleheart". Some of the Kentucky and Indiana Iglehearts later returned to the original spelling.

A 19th century memorandum found in a portfolio of Mrs. James (Anna S. Iglehart) Waddell of Annapolis, Maryland contained the following information on the origin of the Iglehart family:

The family of Iglehart originated in the kingdom of Saxony, Germany. Henry von Iglehart, a baron of Saxony, was one of the nobles taking the heart of the Emperor Sigismund to the Holy Sepulcher at Jerusalem. After the second crusade the ancestor of this family was made a baron of the Holy Roman Empire, which was confirmed to his grandson in 1359; the Baron Igelhartt being one of those concerned in the Count von Benedict's conspiracy against the Emperor Charles of Germany succeeded, in escaping into England in 1690. In 1707 Queen Anne, at the request of the Emperor of Germany, compelled the Baron's three sons to leave England, when two of them came to Maryland, and one settled in New York, on the North or Hudson River.

In 1900 in an answer to an inquiry about this note, Mrs. Mary Brooks (Iglehart) Gassaway, a niece of Mrs. Waddell, stated:

The information you refer to is in my possession, and was found in an old portfolio of my aunt, Mrs. James Waddell, who was Anne Sellman Iglehart. Where she got it I do not know, as she never referred to it during her lifetime, but I am inclined to think that she picked it up when she was abroad after the Civil War. She was in Europe for several years, but apart from this guessing I have no idea where the information came from.

John E. Iglehart (1848-1934) of Evansville, Ind., in an unpublished history of the Iglehart family written in 1914 and first begun by him in 1871, wrote the following concerning the above note:

The only record we have of the origin of the family is one found among the papers of cousin Anna Selman Iglehart of Annapolis, who married Waddell, later commander of the Confederate steamer Shenandoah, during the Civil War, and after the Civil War he was within, the small class of public officials in the South who were not given amnesty by Act of Congress, and he refused to ask for pardon, which would have been given him at his request, and spent much of his time abroad with his wife, part of the time in Germany and a paper found among her papers after her death, was probably found in Germany.

It is believed that Captain John Iglehart who died in 1733 was one of the political refugees from England in 1707 who settled in southern Maryland. A stone bearing his name and year of death was found in the cemetery in All Hallows Parish at Davidsonville in Anne Arundel County, Maryland.

One of Captain John Iglehart's sons, Jacob Iglehart, resided in Prince George's County, Maryland. Prince George's and Anne Arundel counties adjoin and are the two counties directly south of Baltimore and east of Washington, D.C. In pre 1800 Maryland records the Iglehart name is found mainly in these two counties. Anne Arundel County was established in 1650, county seat is Annapolis, and Prince George's County was formed in 1695 from parts of Calvert and Charles Counties, county seat is Upper Marlboro, In Anne Arundel County is located a town by the name of "Igleharts", earlier called "Iglehart Station".

Jacob Iglehart was born about 1720, family tradition passed down was that he was an emigrant or a son of an emigrant. In the early 1740's he married Jane Perry, daughter of John Perry and Elizabeth Millman of Prince George's County, Md. John Perry on May 9, 1753 wrote his will and on the following June 28th it was proven and recorded in Prince George's County (will book I, p.461). By his will he left 1/3 of his estate to his wife, Elizabeth, and to his daughter, Jane, wife of Jacob Iglehart, one shilling. John Perry and Elizabeth Millman had married in Prince George's County on July 11, 1727, John Perry Sr. & Jr. appeared as witnesses on the will of Dr. Richard Pile in Prince George's County in 1731.

Jacob Iglehart died about 1790. His children are proven by probate records in the settlement of the estate of his son, Jacob Jr. The final settlement of Jacob Jr.'s estate was recorded on May 2, 1804 in Prince George's County (Administration account book T.T., no.1, folio 49). Jacob Iglehart Jr. died about 1800, he had no children of his own and his estate was divided among his brothers and sisters. His estate was divided into seven shares, one going, to the heirs of his brother Jeremiah, deceased, another to the heirs of his brother, William, deceased, and the other shares going to his brothers John and James Iglehart and sisters Sarah James, Ann Cross and Mary Cross.

Jacob Iglehart and Jane Perry had nine children: , John, Jacob, Jeremiah, James, William, Rezin, Sarah, Ann: and Mary. No information has been learned about the families of the three

daughters. Jacob Iglehart Jr. married Mary Nicholson, they had no children of their own but raised a nephew, Edward Tyler Iglehart, orphan of Rezin Iglehart. In the 1800 census of Prince George's County is listed a Mary Iglehart, in her household were listed one female over 45 and nine slaves, she was probably the widow of Jacob Jr. Rezin Iglehart died prior to 1790, he had one son, Edward Tyler who was born about 1764. Edward Tyler Iglehart married three times, to Sophia Hearn, Eliza Smith and Miss Davis,

Jeremiah Iglehart, called Jerry, was born about 1750, his wife was named Mary. He died in 1802. In the records of St. John's Parish in Prince George's County is recorded the birth of Elizabeth on April 18, 1775, daughter of Jeremiah and Mary Iglehart. Jeremiah may have later moved to Montgomery County, Md., in the records of Prince George's Parish in Montgomery County is recorded the birth of Mary Iglehart to Jeremiah and Mary on April 23, 1792. Jeremiah and Mary Iglehart's known children are: Elizabeth (married Christopher Sipes), John (married Harriett Beall), James, Susannah (married a Burton), Jesse, Cornelius, Rezin and Mary.

James Iglehart, son of Jacob Iglehart and Jane Perry, was born March 11, 1752 in Maryland. In Anne Arundel County on January 10, 1788 he married Ann Sellman, the daughter of John and Deborah Sellman and was born December 23, 1755. Following their marriage they resided in Anne Arundel County, where in 1790 he was recorded as being a land owner. In Anne Arundel County on December 4, 1825 James Iglehart died, and his wife, Ann Sellman, on June 12, 1835, both recorded wills. They had five children, John born October 24, 1788 (married Mary Elinor Smott), James born December 18, 1790 (married Rachel Ann Harwood), Leonard born May 3, 1792 (married Juliana Watkins), Thomas born February 27, 1794, and Ann Sellman born November 16, 1798 (married Thomas Welsh).

Many of James and Ann Sellman Iglehart's descendants were noted citizens of Annapolis and Baltimore, Maryland. A granddaughter, Anna Sellman Iglehart, daughter of James Jr. and Rachel Ant Harwood, was the wife of James Waddell of Civil War fame, his biography from his biography was published in the National Cyclopaedia of American Biography. Mrs. James Waddell was mentioned earlier in regards to the information she had found on the origin of the Iglehart family. Other grandchildren included John Wilson Iglehart (son of John and Mary Elinor Smott Iglehart) and Thomas Sellman Iglehart (son of Thomas), who were both noted public officials of Anne Arundel County, Md. John Wilson Iglehart served as magistrate and county commissioner of Anne Arundel County, his son, Dr. James Davidson Iglehart was a noted physician of Annapolis and Baltimore. Thomas Sellman Iglehart was a judge of Anne Arundel County, his son, Dr. N. E. Berry Iglehart, was also a celebrated physician and surgeon of Baltimore. Biographies of Doctors James D. Iglehart and N.E. Berry Iglehart were published in the books Founders of Anne Arundel and Howard Counties, Maryland and The National Cyclovaedia of American Biography, respectively.

William Iglehart, son of Jacob Iglehart and Jane Perry, was born about 1754. In Prince George's County he married Susannah Soper on March 27, 1781. At a young age in 1786 he

died. His widow remarried on June 2, 1787 to Jacob Wheeler. William and Susannah Soper Iglehart had three sons: Nathan, Rezin and Dennis Iglehart.

## **John Iglehart** (ca 1745-1810)

John Iglehart, son of Jacob Iglehart and Jane Perry, was born about 1745 in Prince George's County, Maryland. Family history as related by several of his grandchildren concur that he was the oldest son of his family. About 1764 he married Mary Denune, the daughter of Dr. William Denune and Elizabeth Duvall. She was born in Prince George's County March 3, 1752. She was related to the Duvall, Jacob and Cheney families, who were among the early settlers of Maryland, all having arrived before 1665, making her descendants eligible for membership in the Colonial Dames.

John Iglehart was a farmer and resided on a farm adjoining Glendale on the B. & P. R.R. about 14½ miles from Washington toward Baltimore. He bought the farm on January 17, 1772 (Prince George's County, Rec. B.B. 33).

John Iglehart died in September 1810 as shown by the probate records of Prince George's County (administration account book T.T., no.1, folio 374). His wife, Mary Denune, died sometime after the birth of their last child in 1793. In 1816 the heirs of John Iglehart sold his farm (purchased in 1772) to Thomas Hall. In the deed was recorded the following: "out of which one quarter of an acre is reserved to the heirs of John Iglehart as aforesaid forever where the present burial ground is". In September 1872 when this farm was next sold by the heirs of Thomas Hall to John Lynch and Benjamin M. Plumb, a similar reservation was contained in the deed for half an acre containing the graveyard. John E. Iglehart in his 1914 history of the family wrote the following: "There are several grave yards enclosed in this tract of half an acre, but in the center are two graves with stone markers covered up but which showed upon one of them when dug up, the letter "I" cut with a chisel... These two graves are, no doubt, those of John and Mary Iglehart, his wife. The graveyard is about half a mile from the station at Glendale on the road to Good Luck."

John E. Igleaert (1848-1934)., a great-grandson of John and Mary, while compiling information on the family interviewed Margaret Iglehart Green in 1872 (daughter of William Iglehart and Jane Smith and granddaughter of John and Mary Iglehart) she was the only living relative he talked with that could remember seeing John Iglehart, She said the following of her grandfather:

"John Iglehart had a farm in Prince George's County, all his children were born in that county. I think he died about 1813. He was at the date of his death between 60 and 70 years old. I think he was born between 1740 and 1750. He was a heavy set man about five feet eight inches high; my mother said he spoke English with a German accent."

John Iglehart's name is listed in the DAR Patriot Index. His descendants are eligible for membership in the organizations Daughters and Sons of the American Revolution by virtue of an oath of allegiance he took to the state of Maryland during the Revolutionary War. John Iglehart's name appeared on a list of Prince George's County, Md. residents who took the Oath of Allegiance. The list was published in the book Maryland Records, Colonial, Revolutionary, County and Church (Vol. II, Gaius Marcus Brumbaugh, Lancaster, Pa., 1928).

In the Parish records of Queen Anna's Parish in Prince George's County the births of the following children of John and Mary Iglehart were recorded:

Records involving the settlement of the estate of John Iglehart name ten heirs; sons, James, John, Richard, Jacob, William, Levi, and Dennis, and daughters, Martha Fairall, Jenima Boyd and Elizabeth Boyd.

The children of John Iglehart and Mary Denune as listed by John E. Iglehart (1848-1934, John-Levi-Asa-John E.) in his history of the Iglehart family (1914) were;

Martha Iglehart, daughter of John Iglehart and Mary Denune, was born August 28, 1765. She married Benjamin Fairall in Prince George's County, Md. on February 19, 1787. They continued to live in her native county of Prince George's. They had a family of eleven children:

John Alexander, Benjamin, Mary, Katherine, Erasmus, Martha, Elizabeth, Jemima, Truman, Sarah and Richard Levin.

Richard Iglehart, son of John Iglehart and Mary Denune, was born September 11, 1772. He married Nancy Anne Hammond on January 19, 1800 in Anne Arundel County, Md. He resided in Prince George's County on his farm in the Piney Wood near Jessup's Cut on the road to Washington. Later he moved to near Bellows Springs in Anne Arundel County. Richard was the administrator of his father's estate and was very involved in the business affairs of his home county. He became a prominent citizen of Anne Arundel County, serving as its representative in the Maryland legislature and as sheriff of the county. On March 17, 1855 he died and was buried in Baltimore in the Loudon Park Cemetery. Richard Iglehart and Ann Hammond had eleven children: William H., John Hammond, Mary D., Richard, Ann, Joseph, Thomas, Edward, Charles Duvall, Charlotte Matilda and Maria Jane.

William Iglehart, son of John Iglehart and Mary Denune, was born October 13, 1778. He married Jane Ann Smith on December 24, 1802 in Anne Arundel County, Md.. She was the daughter of John Smith and Margaret Pindell. The children of William and Jane Iglehart were: Margaret Ann, John Smith, Mary Ann, Nicholas Pindell and Ellen Pindell.

Jemima Iglehart, daughter of John Iglehart and Mary Denune, was born March 31, 1776. On December 29, 1802 she married William Boyd in Prince George's County, Md.. They moved to Franklin County, Ky. Jemima Boyd died before 1825 leaving only one child as her heir. Her daughter, Miranda, in 1825 was residing in Franklin County, Ky. and had not yet married.

Elizabeth Iglehart, daughter of John Iglehart and Mary Denune, was born about 1780. She married Abraham Boyd, a brother of her sister Jemima's husband. They were married on January 23, 1800 in Prince George's County, Md. She died in Anne Arundel County, Md. leaving only one heir, a son, Alfred Boyd, who was born October 28, 1800. Her death probably occurred before 1816 which was about the time her son left Maryland and moved to Kentucky in the company of one or several of his Iglehart uncles. In 1817 Alfred Boyd appeared as a witness on a deed in Ohio County, Ky. whereby his uncle John Iglehart purchased a farm. He lived in Ohio County, Ky. until the time of his marriage in 1823. In Ohio County on November 25, 1823 he married Eleanor Condit, A native of New Jersey she was born October 2, 1803. Her parents, Uzal Condit and Theodocta Pruden, were near neighbors of Alfred's uncles. John and Jacob Iglehart, in Ohio County. Shortly after marrying Alfred Boyd moved to Warrick County, Indiana. He may have made the trip at the same time his uncle, Levi Iglehart, who during the year of 1823 left Ohio County and moved to Warrick County, Ind. Alfred Boyd died in Warrick County, Ind. on August 8, 1836. His wife married second Miles Harper Davis on August 23, 1839 in Warrick County; he had been previously married to her sister, Ruth Ann Condit. Alfred Boyd and Eleanor Condit had six children: Mary J., Silas C., Vashti Ann, Abraham U., Tiberius S. and Elizabeth T. Boyd. Vashti Boyd married her second cousin, David L. Miller, a grandson of Jacob Iglehart and Ann Beall, Jacob being a brother of Vashti's grandmother, Elizabeth

Iglehart Boyd. Eleanor (Condit) Boyd Davis died in Warrick County, Ind. on September 21, 1877, by her marriage to Harper Davis she had one child, Veturia Geraldine.

The other five sons of John Iglehart and Mary Denune left their native state and joined the migration Westward, before leaving Maryland several of them served in the military during the War of 1812. In the early 1800's James, John, Jacob, Levi and Dennis Igleheart all settled in Ohio County, Ky. John was the first to leave Maryland, about 1803 he went to Kentucky, first settling in Nelson County near Bardstown, a few years later he moved to Ohio County in the western part of the state. James Igleheart about 1812 left Maryland and joined his brother, John, in Ohio County, Ky. In Ohio County James died only three years later, Dennis Igleheart made the trip to Ohio County about 1814. In 1816 Jacob and Levi Igleheart and their families made the trip together. Jacob settled near his brother, John, and Ohio County became their permanent home, both have descendants there today. Levi and Dennis Igleheart after a few years in Ohio County took up roots again and moved across the Ohio River into Southern Indiana. Levi settled in Warrick County, Ind. and Dennis in Spencer County, Ind. In recollections of several descendants it was later told that four brothers moved west, two settling in Kentucky and two in Indiana. Since James Igleheart had died many years before the other four brothers most of his brother's families would have had no recollection of him, possibly explaining why in family stories it was told that four brothers came west and not five.

John Iglehart and Mary Denune and their family were members of the Anglican or Church of England which later became the Episcopal Church. After the Revolution the American Anglicans reorganized and became autonomous, appointing Samuel Seabury as their first bishop leader. The First General Conference in 1789 named the new church the Episcopal Church and adopted a constitution and revised Book of Common Prayer. Standards of doctrine are the Apostle and Nicene Creeds and Thirty-nine articles, Of the brothers that moved west, Levi Igleheart converted to the Methodist Church and Jacob and John Igleheart became Baptists.

## **Levi Igleheart** **(1786-1855)**

Levi Igleheart was born August 13, 1786 near Lanham Station in Prince George's County, Maryland. He married Ann Eleanor Taylor on December 19, 1808 in Prince George's County, Md. She was born November 10, 1783 and was orphaned at an early age. Levi's son, Asa Iglehart, later wrote that she was "a distant relative of his". Levi Igleheart had three aunts, Anne, Catherine and Elizabeth Denune who married into the Taylor family.

In the later part of 1816 Levi Igleheart along with his brother, Jacob, and their families left Maryland and journeyed to Ohio County, Ky. Their brothers, John and Dennis, were already

In 1973 the graves of Levi and Ann E. Igleheart and other members of their family in the Igleheart Cemetery were removed from Warrick County to near McCutchanville in Vanderburgh County, Ind., about seven miles west of the original site.

Harriett, the oldest child of Levi Igleheart and Ann E. Taylor, was born at Ellicott's Mills, Maryland on October 17, 1809. She married John Erskine November 6, 1826. On July 31, 1846, one day after the death of her mother, she died at McCutchanville, Ind, and was buried in the McCutchanville Cemetery. John and Harriett Erskine had eight children: Joseph, Mary, James, Levi, Martha, Anne, Charlotte and William J.

Elizabeth Igleheart was born February 8, 1811 in Maryland. On August 28, 1841 she married Mark Wheeler. She died in Vanderburgh County, Ind. on March 4, 1869 and was buried in the Blue Grass Cemetery in Scott Township in that county. They had two children: Robert and Anne.

Mary Ann Igleheart was born in September 1813 in Maryland. She married William Odell on September 16, 1832, She died in 1851 in Vanderburgh County, Ind. They had six children: Ann Maria, Frances Elizabeth, Margaret Ellen, Vashti, Isaac Henry and James M.

Catherine. "Kitty" Igleheart was born August 17, 1815 in Maryland. She and John Johnston were married on November 6, 1834. They lived on a farm in Warrick County, Ind. She died on June 29, 1861 and was buried in the Igleheart Cemetery, originally in Warrick County, now in Vanderburgh County, Ind. To their marriage eight children were born: Amanda, William Levi, Susanna and five others who died in infancy or childhood.

Asa Iglehart was born December 8, 1817 in Ohio County, Ky. married Ann Cowle on May 5, 1843. For several years he farmed in Warrick County, Ind., during which time he also studied the law. In 1849 he left the farm and moved to Evansville, Indiana and began the practice of law as a profession. As an attorney and judge he had an illustrious career and became one of the most recognized in his profession in Evansville and in the state of Indiana. He wrote two books on Indiana law. Biographies of Asa Iglehart were published in the books, Evansville and Its Men of Worth (Edward White, ed., Historical Publishing Co., Evansville, Ind., 1873, pp54-56), History of Vanderburgh County, Indiana, (Brant & Fuller, 1889), A History of Evansville and Vanderburgh County, Indiana (Joseph P. Elliott, Keller Printing Co., Evansville, Ind., 1897, pp458-463), and History of Indiana: An Account of Vanderburgh County, Volume 3, John E. Iglehart, Dayton Historical Publishing Co., Dayton, Ohio, 1923, pp465-468) give some of the accolades of his career and a glowing testimonial of his character.

Asa Iglehart decided to change from the spelling of the name as used by his father. For some reason Levi Igleheart and his brothers that came west spelled their name with an "e". Their father, John Iglehart, and other members of the family that remained in Maryland signed their name "Iglehart".

Asa Iglehart died in Evansville, Ind. on February 5, 1887. Asa and Ann Cowle Iglehart were the parents of eight children: Ferdinand Cowle, John Eugene, Anne E. and five other children died in infancy. Their son, John E. Iglehart (1848-1934), like his father also became a celebrated lawyer of Evansville, Ind. He also became recognized as a Historian, being very active in several historical societies. In 1871 he began compiling information on the Iglehart family. Over several years he contacted many relatives of the Kentucky and Maryland branches of the family. In 1914 he wrote an article giving his findings. The article was never published but was circulated among the family, copies are in the Willard Library in Evansville, Ind, and in the Boonville, Ind. Library in Warrick County, Ind. This article does contain a few mistakes but by other sources it is proven to be largely reliable and accurate. The efforts of John E. Iglehart preserved a great deal of the Iglehart family history which no doubt would have otherwise been lost forever, thank-you Mr. Iglehart.

Levi Igleheart, Jr. was born March 8, 1820 in Ohio County, Ky. He married Susan Ingle in 1844. He farmed in Warrick County, Ind. until 1853 when he moved to Evansville and started a sawmill. He later expanded adding a grist mill which ground corn and wheat. Meeting with success he in 1856 along with his brothers, Asa and William, founded the flour milling firm of Igleheart Bros. Asa became a silent partner, conducting only the legal affairs of the company, following his death his interest was sold. The company continued to grow, conducting an extensive business throughout Southern Indiana and Western Kentucky. The other partner, William Igleheart, died in 1895 leaving Levi and his three sons, Leslie, Addison and John to run the business. In 1896 Addison found a means of making flour, which was of superior quality for cake baking and after experimenting and perfecting it, he began the manufacture and sale of the new product called "Swans Down Cake Flour", Levi Igleheart died in 1904 and the company

under the direction of his three sons, continued to grow, becoming one of the largest enterprises of its kind in the mid-west. In 1926 control of the Igleheart Brothers was acquired by the Postum Cereal Co. (later General Foods, Inc.) but it was continued under the firm name of Igleheart Bros., Inc.

Levi Igleheart, Jr. and Susan Ingle had four children: Leslie Thring, Addison Weeks, John Levi and Martha A. who died young. Biographies of John L. (1862-1933) and Leslie T. (1848-1930) Igleheart were published in the National Cyclopaedia of American Biography.

Eleanor Igleheart, youngest daughter of Levi Igleheart and Ann E. Taylor, was born in 1822 in Ohio County, Ky. She married Amos G. Wright on February 23, 1843. They lived in Warrick County, Ind. She died on March 9, 1883 at Chandler Station in Warrick County, Ind. They had six children: George Allen, Melissa Ann, Mary Jane, Emma Harriett, Alice Ella and another child died in infancy.

William T. Igleheart, son of Levi Igleheart and Ann E. Taylor, was born August 29, 1825 in Warrick County, Ind. He married twice, first to Mary A. Ingle on May 11, 1848 and second to Florence Barton on January 18, 1873. In 1856 with his two brothers founded the milling company of Igleheart Bros. He died in 1895 in Evansville, Ind., he had seven children: Mary Sutton, Elinor, William and the others died young.

## **Dennis Igleheart** **(1780's-1846)**

Dennis Igleheart in an early family history was reported to have been born in 1793 in Prince George's County, Maryland. The 1830 & 1840 censuses, however, indicate he was born in the 1780's. This is also suggested by the fact that he married in 1810. On December 24 of that year he married Catherine Atwell in Anne Arundel County, Md. About 1814 he moved to Ohio County, Ky., where he is first listed in the tax lists in 1815. In Ohio County on March 23, 1815 he married Winifred Humphrey. The daughter of Daniel Humphrey, she was born in Virginia in the early 1790's. Her sister, Sally, two years earlier, had married Dennis' brother, James Igleheart.

During the early 1820's Dennis Igleheart left Ohio County and moved north into the adjoining county of Daviess. The Ohio County tax lists last enumerate him in 1821 and he was first found in the Daviess County tax books in 1825. In 1820 he had been listed in the census of Ohio County and in the 1830 census he was enumerated in Daviess County. The census takers listed his household as follows:

Dennis Igleheart last appeared in the tax lists of Daviess County, Ky. in 1830. He then left Kentucky and moved to Southern Indiana and settled in Spencer County, just across the Ohio River from Daviess County, Ky. Spencer adjoins Warrick County, Ind., where his brother, Levi Igleheart, had made his home about 7 years earlier. In Spencer County Dennis married a third time on January 4, 1834. Apparently his wife, Winifred, had died between 1830-1833. His new wife, Mrs. Margaret M. Ross, was a native of Kentucky, having been born about 1798. By her earlier marriage she had had several children. The residence of Dennis Igleheart in the 1840 Spencer County census appeared as follows:

John Iglehart in his history of the Iglehart family had little information on his great-uncle, Dennis Igleheart and his family. He did write that Dennis died in 1846 and was the father of the following children: Julia Ann, James H., Mary Ann, Elizabeth and Jackson. This list of his children is incomplete, since the children of Dennis' third marriage, Thomas Osborn and Martha Jane, were omitted. The children named by John E. Iglehart all appear to be by Dennis' second wife, Winifred. It is not known if there were any children born to his first wife, Catherine Atwell.

The death of Dennis Igleheart probably occurred in Spencer County, Ind., where his widow and several children, continued to reside. Mrs. Margaret Igleheart is listed in the 1850 and 1860 Spencer County censuses, in the latter she was in the home of her son, Patrick H. Ross. The children of Dennis Igleheart were:

Julia Ann Igleheart, daughter of Dennis & Winifred, was born March 1, 1816. In 1850 she was living in the home of her sister, Mary A. Wilson, in Spencer County, Ind. At the age of 39 she married Silas E. Wård in Spencer County in 1855. She died in Spencer County on

December 15, 1903 and was buried in the Sunset Hill Cemetery in Rockport, Ind. She had no children.

James H. Igleheart, son of Dennis &- Winifred, was born about 1819. In Spencer County, Ind. he married Katherine Ann Mackey on December 26, 1841. He died in 1852 and his wife died in 1905 and was buried in the Sunset Hill Cemetery in Rockport, Ind. To their union were born: Susan Harriet, Amanda E., Mary E. and Isabel.

Mary Ann Igleheart, daughter of Dennis & Winifred, was born about 1822. She married John S. Wilson in Spencer County, Ind. on March 10, 1844. Their family was listed in the 1850 & 1860 censuses of Spencer County. Their children were: Charles, Margaret and Mary.

Elizabeth Igleheart, daughter of Dennis & Winifred, was born August 11, 1824. In Warrick County, Ind. she married George Lockyear on April 6, 1848. In the 1850 Warrick County census she was listed a short distance from her uncle, Levi Igleheart. She died in Warrick County on December 17, 1862. Of the four children born to her marriage only one, George C., survived to adulthood.

Jackson Igleheart was listed by John E. Iglehart as a child of Dennis. In the records of Spencer County, Ind. no record of him could be found, possibly he died young. The 1830 and 1840 censuses suggest he may have been born between 1825-1830 and died subsequent to 1840.

Thomas Osborn Igleheart, son of Dennis & Margaret, was born about 1834. At the time of the 1850 Spencer County, Ind. census he was living in the home of his brother, James H. Igleheart. About 1859 he married Eleanor and in Spencer County on May 7, 1871 he married Sarah M. Tracy.

Martha Jane Igleheart, daughter of Dennis & Margaret, was born about 1835. She married William C. Trammel on July 22, 1851 in Spencer County, Ind.

## **James Igleheart** **(1767-1815)**

John E. Iglehart in his record of the Iglehart family lists his great-uncle, James Igleheart's, birth as July 21, 1767. He does not cite is source for his birth. Most dates he gives in his article were from various relatives and generally prove compatible with other sources. However, in the case of James Igleheart's birth there seems to be some question and without knowing more about its source one cannot reliably judge its accuracy.

In the register of Queen Anne's Parish in Prince George's County, Md. it is recorded that a "daughter" was born to John and Mary Iglehart on July 21, 1767, the name of the child was not recorded. This is the date that John E. Iglehart gives as James Igleheart's birth date. Since the child was unnamed a mistake could have been made in noting whether the child was a son or a daughter. Francis B. Culver of Baltimore, Md. in 1924 in his compilation of the family of John Iglehart and Mary Denune the date of July 21, 1767 is given as the birth of the oldest child, Martha, and James is listed as the ninth child following Levi (born 1786) and no date was given for his birth. Asa Iglehart, son of Levi and grandson of John & Mary, wrote that his father was the fifth son of his family. If James was born in 1767 that would make Levi the sixth son and not the fifth. Culver in his listing has Levi as the fifth son, John E. Iglehart quotes Martha Iglehart Fairall's birth as being August 28, 1765. He talked personally to several members of the Fairall family and it appears that this date would thus be accurate. It may be possible that James Igleheart was not born in 1767 and may have been considerably younger, born closer to 1787 (after the birth of his brother, Levi, in 1786). The 1787 date seems more compatible with the date of his marriage and the births of his two children (1814 & 1815). James Igleheart was not located in the 1800 census of Maryland. The 1810 Maryland census was not available and if James is listed in this source some proof of which date is more accurate may be indicated.

In 1812 James Igleheart moved to Ohio County, Ky. and settled on a farm of 100 acres on the Green River near his brother, John. Shortly after arriving in Ohio County he married Sallie Humphrey on March 16, 1813. In 1815 James Igleheart died, an inventory and sale of his estate was recorded in Ohio County will book B. page 231. The farm where James was living he was in the process of purchasing from Samuel Herman and no deed had yet been recorded for it. Shortly after his death on December 13, 1816 his brother, Jacob Igleheart, took over payment on the farm and recorded a deed whereby he became the purchaser (Ohio County deed book D, page 285). This same farm became the home of Jacob Igleheart for the remainder of his life and is today owned by Jerry Shultz. It is not known where James Igleheart was buried but his remains may repose on this farm in the "Patterson - Igleheart Family Cemetery".

James Igleheart may have been married before his marriage to Sallie Humphrey in March 1813. In the probate records in Prince George's County, Md. "James Iglehart and his wife, Nancy, of Anne Arundel County, Maryland" signed receipts for monies received in the settlement of his father's estate filed December 9, 1812. No marriage for James has been located in Prince George's or Anne Arundel Counties and if he was married earlier it is not known if there were any children. In records in Ohio County only two children by his marriage to Sallie Humphrey appear.

James Igleheart and Sallie Humphrey had two children: Winifred born January 13, 1814 and William Humphrey born March 27, 1815. Winifred was placed under the guardianship of her uncle, John Igleheart, and William under the guardianship of his uncle, Jacob Igleheart, (Ohio County order book 5, page 34). Winifred married Edward B. L. (Edward Byram Lewis) Condit on January 3, 1833 in Warrick County, Ind. He was the son' of Byram Condit and Polly Lindley

and was a native of Ohio County, Ky. Following their marriage they resided in Muhlenberg County, Ky. where they were listed in the 1850 census. A few years later they moved to Ingram, Randolph County, Arkansas where they died, he died on August 23, 1877, and she followed him on April 24, 1893. They were the parents of ten children: Caroline N., Martha G., Mary Ann, Jacob L., Sarah E., James W., John A., Rhoda E., Caloosa E. and Lucinda F. William Humphrey Igleheart married Mrs. Elizabeth Donohoo on March 14, 1839 in Muhlenberg County, Ky. They resided in Muhlenberg County, in the area of Sacramento which in 1854 became part of the new county of McLean. William H. Igleheart died February 22, 1854 and was buried in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church Cemetery at Sacramento, Ky. Following his death his widow, Elizabeth, married Zachariah Stringer, 20 November 1854 McLean County, Ky. William and Elizabeth Igleheart's children were; Sarah Jane, James B., John Johnson, Benjamin Franklin, William Humphrey, Jacob and Lucinda.

Sallie Humphrey Igleheart, widow of James Igleheart, married second Samuel Tanner on December 14, 1824 in Ohio County, Ky. By this marriage she had four daughters: Elizabeth, Nancy M. (born 26 August 1828, married William S. Byers), Phoebe (born c1829 married Lorenzo Dow Hall) and Sarah A. (born c1831). Samuel Tanner born April 1, 1787 died February 23, 1847 and was buried in the Tanner Cemetery in McLean County, Ky. beside his first wife, Phoebe (September 17, 1787 - August 10, 1817). Sallie Humphrey Igleheart Tanner does not have a monument in this cemetery. She was still living at the time of the 1850 Daviess County, Ky. census. She was born in Virginia about 1788 and was the daughter of Daniel Humphrey. Two of her sisters also married into the Igleheart family, Winifred Humphrey married Dennis Igleheart (brother of James) and Ellen married James N. Igleheart (nephew of James, a son of his brother John).

Mrs. George E. (Mary Riggs) Hill of McLean County, Ky., a great-great-granddaughter of James Igleheart and Sallie Humphrey (James-William H.-William H.-Lydia Winifred Riggs-Mary Riggs Hill) is a member of the William Rowan Chapter of the DAR. She joined by virtue of the "Patriotic Service" of John Iglehart (c1745-1810), Mrs. Hill's NSDAR # is 686452.

## **John Igleheart** **(1770-1859)**

John Igleheart was born June 23, 1770. His birth was recorded in the register of Queen Anne's Parish in Prince George's County, Maryland. On February 12, 1797 he married Rachel Nichols in Anne Arundel County, Md.

About 1804 John Igleheart left Maryland and moved to Kentucky, first settling in Nelson County. His first three children born in 1797, 1800 and 1802 were born in Maryland and his

fourth. Sarah, was born December 26, 1804 in Kentucky. Sources on Sarah's birth and of her brothers and sisters born after her consistently give Kentucky as the place of their birth. In 1805 and 1806 John Igleheart is listed in the tax books of Nelson County, Ky. On the marriage record of one of John's granddaughters, Sallie M., she reported that her father, Thomas N. Igleheart, was born in Nelson County, Ky. (Daviness County, Ky. marriage book G, page 356). Even though other records indicate, her father was born while the family was still in Maryland, this record does give support to the fact the family resided in Nelson County, Ky. for a time. John Igleheart did not remain in Nelson County long, he does not appear in the 1807 or later tax records there.

John Igleheart by 1812 moved to Ohio County, Ky. In 1812 his name was first located in the tax books of Ohio County, during the years 1812, 1813 & 1814 his name was spelled "Eiglehart". He may have been in Ohio County before 1812. A son, William, was born in 1810 and several sources give Ohio County, Ky. as his birthplace. In the 1810 census of Ohio County is listed "John Inglebright", in his household were enumerated 3 males 0-10, 1 male over 45 and 1 female 26-45. "Inglebright" may be a misspelling of the Iglehart name and this could be John Igleheart. The 1810 Ohio County tax book is missing but before and after 1810 the name "Inglebright" never appears again. In 1810 John Igleheart did have three sons under the age of 10 but he also had three daughters under 10, which do not appear in the listing for John Inglebright, and John was then aged 40 and was not over 45.

Following the death of his father in September of 1810 John Igleheart may have returned to Maryland from Kentucky. In some of the probate records involving the settlement of his father's estate in 1811 it was indicated he was then in Maryland. By 1812 John Igleheart was in Ohio County, Ky. where he settled on a 112 acre farm. From the 1812 tax list he is shown as paying taxes on this land but a deed for the farm was not recorded until March 25, 1817 (Ohio County deed book D, page 335). John Igleheart paid John Howell \$224 and the transaction was witnessed by his brother, Levi Igleheart, and nephew, Alfred Boyd. The farm is located in the western part of Ohio County in the area known as "the Point" (several miles east of where the Green and Rough Rivers meet at Livermore, Ky.). On this farm John Igleheart reared his family and lived the remainder of his life. John Igleheart was listed in the 1820, 1830, 1840 and 1850 censuses of Ohio County, Ky., the census takers recorded the following information on his family:

John Igleheart died in Ohio County, Ky. on December 14, 1859. His death appears in the vital statistics recorded by the state of Kentucky during the period of the 1850's. On this death certificate it was also recorded he was age 89, born Maryland, occupation farmer, died of asthma, parents John & Mary Iglehart. The death of Rachel Nichols Igleheart was recorded in the Mortality schedule of the 1860 Ohio County Federal census, on this record it was written that she died in May of 1860 in Ohio County, she was 80 years old, born in Maryland and died of old age.

John and Rachel Nichols Igleheart were buried in the "Igleheart Family Cemetery" on their farm. No monuments mark their graves. The cemetery is on the farm now owned by Mrs. J. P. Tichenor, about a mile south of Matanzas on the east side of the Matanzas-Equality Road on a steep hill just south of intersection with first road. At top of hill pull over and walk west about 100 feet and the cemetery is in the edge of woods on the right. The cemetery contains about 14 inscribed monuments and signs of many other unmarked graves. The oldest gravestone is for Alfred I. Ashby (1840-1841), a grandson of John & Rachel. John's brother, Jacob Igleheart (1774-1856) is buried on his farm, less than a mile to the northwest. The John Igleheart farm and Cemetery is about a mile south of the farm where his brother, Jacob Igleheart, lived and was buried. John and Rachel Igleheart and their family were members of the Walton's Creek Baptist Church which they had joined in 1814.

John Igleheart wrote his will on March 29, 1844 and it was recorded in September 1860 In Ohio County Will book C, page 228. In his will he names his ten surviving children: James N. Igleheart, Thomas Igleheart, Polly Bell, Sally Addington, Elizabeth Ashby, William D. Igleheart, Anne Southard, Martha Southard, Margaret Igleheart and Henry D. Igleheart. He left his farm to his son, Henry D., who was also appointed the administrator of his estate. Henry D. Igleheart continued to own the farm until his death in 1890.

James N. Igleheart born December 2, 1797 in Maryland married Ellen Humphrey on January 6, 1820. Following their marriage they resided in Daviess County, Ky., in the vicinity of Glenville, where they owned a 107 acre farm on Panther Creek. His family was listed in the 1830, 1840 and 1850 censuses of Daviess County. He died in Daviess County on September 7, 1851 and was buried in the Old Brushy Fork Baptist Church Cemetery in McLean County, Ky. just across the Daviess-McLean County line, and about three miles south, of the present site of the Brushy Fork Church in Daviess County. James N. and Ellen Humphrey Igleheart had the following children: John, Thomas N., Henry N., James M., Elizabeth, Lucinda M., Francis Marion and Sarah E.

Thomas N. Igleheart born March 10, 1800 in Maryland married first his cousin, Eliza Igleheart, on March 11 1826. She was the daughter of Jacob Igleheart and Ann Beall and was born in Maryland on December 14, 1805. Eliza Igleheart died on August 12, 1834 in Ohio County, Ky. To their marriage three children were born: Nancy, Martha Ann and Betty, the latter it was later told in the family died from eating poison berries during recess at school, Thomas N. Igleheart married second Nancy Warden on February 17, 1835. Three children were born of this marriage: William Henry, Joseph Warden and Sallie Mary. Thomas N. Igleheart resided in Ohio County until 1849 when he moved to Daviess County, Ky. In Daviess County he made his home in the Glenville neighborhood, near where his brothers, James and William, had been living for several years. He died in Daviess County on February 20, 1855, on his death certificate it was recorded that he died as the result of an accident, he was age 54, married, born Maryland, parents John and Rachel Igleheart. Thomas N. Igleheart and his second wife, Nancy Warden, born July 10, 1803 & died December 16, 1873, were buried in the Old Brushy Fork Baptist Church Cemetery in McLean County, Ky.

Mary Igleheart born January 21, 1802 in Maryland married David Bell February 12, 1824 in Ohio County, Ky. David Bell also a native of Maryland, came to Ohio County in 1815, his coming to Ohio County closely coincided with the arrival of members of the Igleheart family but it is not known where in Maryland he came from or if he made the trip with the Iglehearts. Jacob Igleheart (1774-1856) wife was Ann Beall, the Beall and Igleheart families were neighbors in Maryland, and some of the Beall families spelled their name Bell. David and Mary Bell lived on a farm in Ohio County about a mile southwest of Matanzas and a short distance west of her father's farm. Here they reared a family of six children. John David, Otha N., Sarah E., Thomas Isaac, Eliza Ann and William W. David Bell died in 1871 and his wife, Mary Igleheart Bell died sometime after 1870, they were buried on their farm in unmarked graves.. Their son, John D. Bell, became a large land owner, owning about 1500 acres, and was a very successful businessman of Ohio County. He lived near Matanzas and was buried in the Bell Cemetery on his farm, a few hundred feet west of the West Point Baptist Church at Matanzas.

Sarah Igleheart born December 26, 1804 in Kentucky, married Joshua B. Addington on October 7, 1834 in Ohio County, Ky. (note: in a record of the Addington family bible recorded in the book Warrick County, Ind. Bible & Family Records, Vol. II (p.26), Sarah's birth is listed as being December 16, 1804). Joshua B. Addington was first married to Sally Cooper and by this marriage had three children: Dorcas, John Henry and Nancy E. Joshua B. Addington and Sarah Igleheart had seven children: Mary Jane, William R., Davis (known as "Doe"), Rachel, Andrew, Elijah P. and Martha Emily. Joshua B. Addington was born November 11, 1804 and died during the 1860's in Ohio County, and Sarah Igleheart Addington died following 1870. Their son, William R. Addington, was a corporal of Co. I in the 17th Kentucky Infantry during the Civil War. While stationed at Murfreesboro, Tennessee he died of typhoid fever on June 28, 1863, he was 24 years old.

Elizabeth Igleheart born December 16, 1806 in Kentucky, married Jesse Ashby on March 22, 1830 in Ohio County, Ky. Her husband was the son of Thomas Ashby and Catherine Taylor, and was born in Ohio County on November 20, 1808. They resided in Ohio County and were the parents of eight children: William Devon, Thomas Jefferson, John Igleheart, Margaret Ann, Alfred Igleheart, Polly Ellen, Richard Coleman and Martha Elizabeth, all of whom lived and died in Ohio County. Elizabeth Igleheart Ashby died on June 14, 1890 and Jesse Ashby on April 5, 1895; they were buried in the Walton's Creek Baptist Church Cemetery, where she had been a member for about 75 years.

William D. Igleheart was born March 10, 1810 in Kentucky, he was probably named after his great-grandfather Dr. William Denune. After coming of age he left Ohio County and moved to Daviess County, Ky. about 1832. In Daviess County he married Lydia Sheckles on December 23, 1833. They made their hone in the Vanover Precinct in Daviess County, where in 1834 he purchased 71 acres near Glenville on the Owersboro-Calhoun Road (now Highway 81). He died on October 16, 1865 and his wife on January 16, 1885. They were buried in a family cemetery on their Farm (the William D. Igleheart Cemetery) on Highway 81 near the Mount Pleasant Cumberland Presbyterian Church, three miles south of Moseleyville, six graves are marked by monuments in the cemetery. William B. Igleheart and Lydia Sheckles were the parents of: John Lloyd, Rachel, Frances M., Emily, Malinda, Jemima, Martha, Ann, William, Matilda J. and Louvenia. An infant, Jefferson Igleheart, born February 3, 1862 and died July 7, 1862, buried in the Igleheart cemetery may be another child of William and Lydia or a grandson, the child of John and Amanda. The William D. Igleheart farm was later owned by his son, John L., who added to the farm owning 430 acres laying on both sides of Highway 81. John L. Igleheart's son, Louis I. (1879-1940) was for many years a lawyer in Owensboro, Ky.

Henry D. Igleheart was born April 18, 1813 in Ohio County, Ky. He married first Amelia Ann Bennett on December 10, 1834 in Ohio County, she died about 1852. Their children were: Elizabeth D., Josephine, Martha J., Alfred, James B., Sallie M., Sylvester and Delilah V. After his first marriage Henry D. Igleheart lived in Daviess County for three years before returning to Ohio County where he bought a farm near Point Pleasant. He married second Cynthia Ann

Ashby on October 5, 1852 in Ohio County. To this marriage were born: Amelia Ann, Richard Tiberius ("Tybee"), John W. and an infant who died at the age of two months. Henry D. Igleheart died in 1890, his will was proven and recorded in the October 1890 term of the Ohio County court. He and his wives were buried in the Igleheart Cemetery, on the farm owned, by his parents and where they had been buried.

Margaret Igleheart was born Oct 4, 1815 in Ohio County, Ky. She continued to live at home with her parents until the age of 36 when she married Sanders Boykin on November 17, 1851 in Ohio County. He was a native of Tennessee and had been earlier married to Mary Greer, by whom he had several children including: John, Amanda, George W. and Rebecca J. Sanders Boykin and "Peggy" Igleheart both died sometime after 1860. Margaret and Sanders Boykin had one child: Rachel N., who married Felix Jackson.

Frances "Ann" Igleheart was born May 1, 1818 in Ohio County, Ky. She married Robert Southard on October 17, 1839 in Ohio County. He was the son of Benjamin Southard and Ann Rowe, he was born in Virginia about 1803. Robert Southard was first married to Sarah Ann Maddox, they had three children: Tilatha, Amelia Ellen and Quinton S. Robert Southard and Ann Igleheart had four daughters: Sarah A., Eliza Jane, Serena M. and Alice S. They lived in Ohio County near McHenry, where Robert Southard died about 1881 and his wife, Ann Igleheart Southard, died on May 10, 1889. They were buried in the Chapman Cemetery on Highway 62 in Ohio County between McHenry and Rockport, no monuments mark their graves.

Alfred Igleheart was born October 10, 1820 in Ohio County, Ky. He died before he was grown sometime between the 1830 and 1840 censuses, Most likely he was buried in the family cemetery on his parents farm.

Marthan Emily Igleheart was born March 1, 1823 in Ohio County, Ky. On March 9, 1841 in Ohio County she married Edmond S. Southard. He was the son of Benjamin Southard and Ann Rowe and was born in Ohio County on November 8, 1824. Martha Igleheart Southard died at the age of 91 on December 17, 1914, her husband had preceded her in death on May 8, 1894. They were buried in the Chapman Cemetery near McHenry in Ohio County. To their union were born: Amelia Rachel, John Berry, Jacob Levi, Lucinda, Sarah Emaline, Charlotte A., James E., Martha Jane and Nancy.

## **Jacob Igleheart** **(1774-1856)**

Jacob Igleheart was born March 30, 1774. His birth was recorded in the register of Queen Anne's Parish in Prince George's County, Md. On January 24, 1798 he married Ann Beall in

Anne Arundel County, Md. Ann's sister married Jacob's first cousin, John Iglehart, son of Jeremiah and Mary Iglehart, The Beall family, also spelled Beale, was a very old Maryland family and was of Scottish descent, In Scotland the name was spelled "Bell" but pronounced "Beau". In the Colonial period several Beall, Beale, Bell immigrants arrived in Maryland from Scotland. One of the first to arrive was Colonel Ninian Beall who later had many descendants in the counties of Anne Arundel and Prince Georges. He was born in Fifeshire, or near Edinburgh in Scotland, about 1625. Having fought, in 1650, against Cromwell at Dunbar, he was captured and transported to the Maryland Colony, In 1655 he arrived and settled in Calvert County, Maryland. Col. Ninian died in 1717, age 93. Elizabeth B. Heterick compiled a book on the Beall family in Maryland entitled Five Families Beall of Maryland, the ancestry of Ann Beall Igleheart may be proven and included in this source,

Ann Beall Igleheart died in Maryland between 1810 and 1812. Her death may have occurred in Baltimore, in 1807 a son was born there and when her husband remarried he was still there. In Baltimore County, Md. on January 8, 1813 Jacob Igleheart married Esther Soper.

In the later part of 1816 Jacob Igleheart and his family of nine children loaded up their possessions and along with the family of his younger brother, Levi Igleheart, they departed from Maryland and headed west to Ohio County, Kentucky to join other members of his family there. Mrs. Sarah Cole, a daughter of John and Harriett Beall Igleheart and a niece of Jacob and his first wife Ann Beall, in later years, about 1895, at the age of 87 told John E. Iglehart, the historian, that she remembered distinctly when a small child, that her uncle Jacob, with his wife and children, stopped at her father's house in Maryland overnight while enroute to Kentucky in covered wagons. Asa Iglehart, son of Levi, wrote that the family travelled along the route of the National Road, which brought them over the Allegheny Mountains, almost in the exact line of the later route of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad. They passed through Wheeling, Pa., to Chillicothe, Ohio, down to the Ohio River, at Maysville, Ky. crossed over into Kentucky, and journeyed across northern Kentucky until they arrived in Ohio County in west central part of the state. They were on the road seven weeks and traveled over 600 miles.

After arriving in Ohio County in the late summer or early fall of 1816 Jacob Igleheart shortly afterwards on December 13, 1816 purchased the 100 acre farm which his brother James had been in the process of buying. James Igleheart had paid Samuel Harman \$300 for the land and in 1815: when James died he was living on the land but a deed for it had not yet been recorded. Jacob Igleheart completed the transaction with Samuel Harman (Ohio County deed book D, page 235) and settled on the farm. The deed for the land describes it as being on "the new Cut road leading from Hartford to Byram Condicts ferry across Green river". The section of this road bordering the farm is now Highway 85, traveling west on it as you leave Matanzas the farm runs along the south side of the roadway. The east side of the farm runs along the Matanzas-Equality Road. The farm is now owned by Jerry Shultz. "Byram Condict's ferry" is now where Point Pleasant is on the Green River, a ferry was operated here until a bridge was opened in 1986. Highway 85 east of Matanzas from a point near Walton's Creek Baptist Church

does not follow the course of the old road to Hartford ("the New Cut Road"), The old road did not go through the present site of Centertown (then no town was there) but instead went east farther to the north, intersecting with what is now Highway 69 a short distance from Hartford.

Jacob Igleheart's farm was about a mile north of the farm of his brother, John Igleheart. Soon after purchasing the farm he added to it by buying another 44 acres adjoining it, giving him a total of 144 acres. Jacob Igleheart improved and farmed this land, he lived here just a few months short of 40 years. He worked his farm with the help of several slaves. The 1820 census shows him owning three slaves, in 1830 he had four, in 1840 three. At the time of his death in 1856 he owned three blacks, a man John (Jack), a woman Ann and her child Joshua. The vital statistics of Ohio County show that a black child named Margaret, owned by Jacob, died on July 10, 1852 at the age of six months.

Jacob Igleheart appeared in the 1820, 1830, 1840 and 1850 censuses of Ohio County; the census listings were as follows:

Jacob Igleheart died on May 9, 1856. His death was recorded in the vital statistics of Ohio County, on this record it was written that he was a farmer, age 82, married, died of dropsy, parents were John & Mary Iglehart, Ten months later his wife, Esther, died on March 18, 1857,

On her death certificate her name was spelled "Easter" (in Jacob's will this spelling was also used, on her monument "Esther" appears). On her death record it was reported that she was 79 years old, died of pneumonia, born Montgomery County, Maryland, parents John Soaper (mother not listed). John E. Iglehart in his article on the Iglehart family states that Esther's parents were Joseph and Ann Soper. Jacob and Esther Igleheart were buried in the family cemetery on their farm at Matanzas. The cemetery is generally referred to as "the Patterson - Igleheart Cemetery" to distinguish it from the family cemetery of his brother John's family a short distance away (referred to as the Igleheart Cemetery).

John E. Iglehart. in his history wrote that it was said that "Jacob was a man of splendid physical proportions and was a prominent man in his section, and was the head of a large family among which were some men and women of marked ability and strength of character, as well as prominence in the sphere of their influence". John and Mary Denune Iglehart and members of their family were members of the Episcopalian Church in Maryland. Their son Jacob in his early life was probably also a member of this church. On the Kentucky frontier there was no church of this faith and except for an occasional minister passing through no clergy of this church were to be found in the domain of Ohio County. After settling in Ohio County Jacob Igleheart's family became members of the Baptist Church, joining the Walton's Creek Church about two miles from their home. Jacob's son, Jacob Henderson Igleheart, and grandson, Benjamin Tolbert Igleheart, both became ministers of the Baptist Church, and a son-in-law, James M. Bennett, was a noted pioneer minister who organized several churches in the region.

Jacob Igleheart wrote a will on March 10, 1852 and it was recorded on June 2, 1856 (Ohio County will book C. page 161). His farm was willed to his son, James Soper Igleheart. Of Jacob's ten children five had preceded their father in death.

Five of the families of Jacob Igleheart's children later removed to Warrick County, Indiana, where his brother, Levi Igleheart, and nephew, Alfred Boyd, had been living for a number of years. Jacob has no descendants of the Igleheart name in Warrick County today but descendants through the Miller and Bennett families reside there. Of the family of Jacob's brother, John, none of his children and only one grandchild, Davis Addington, made his home in Warrick County.

Jacob Igleheart raised a family of ten children, eight by his first wife, Ann Beall, and the last two by Esther Soper:

Julia Ann Igleheart born November 8, 1798 married James Bennett on September 14, 1817 in Ohio County, Ky. A native of Virginia he was a son of Thomas Bennett and Nancy Ann Tillett. James and Julia resided in Ohio County on a farm near Point Pleasant, Julia Ann was left a widow at an early age when her husband died in 1839, all of their children were still under age. She never remarried and died on March 1, 1861. James Bennett and Julia Ann Igleheart had ten children: Joseph, William W., Alfred, Delia, Charles, Matilda Ann, Samuel, James S., Mary Jane and Jacob Thomas. Joseph Bennett died in childhood. William W. Bennett married Mary Tichenor, lived in Ohio County, and had: James, Lewis W., Samuel H., Elvira A., Eddie and Mattie E. Alfred Bennett married his cousin, Ann William Igleheart, and second, Albina Chapman, lived in Warrick County, Ind.; had four children all by first marriage: Alice J., Mary Ida, William R. and Jacob Union. Delia Bennett married Thomas Young, a shoemaker, and had: Charles and Blanche. Charles Bennett married Nancy Bennett, lived Ohio County, had: Joseph C., Alvin L. and Fidelia. Matilda Ann Bennett married Joseph Pace, lived Warrick County, Ind. Samuel Bennett married Fannie A. Brown, lived Ohio County, had: Sarah and Annie. James S. Bennett married Elizabeth and left Ohio County. Mary Jane Bennett married George W. Barnard, lived Ohio County, had: James S., Semiramis, Emma, Jacob H., Annie and Herman W. Jacob Thomas Bennett married Frances Jagoe, lived Ohio County, had: Alfred Lee, Horace Owen, Eudocah, Mary Susan, William E., Nannie, Lola, Adosie, Joy Myrtle and Nellie.

Sarah Igleheart born November 24, 1800 in Maryland married John Thompson on February 1, 1820 in Ohio County, Shortly afterwards they moved to Warrick County, Ind., where they were residing at the time of the 1850 census, They later moved to Iowa, where she died on February 5, 1877, They had nine children: William T., Jacob, Benjamin F., Martha, John, Jackson, Mary Ann, Marion and James.

William B. Igleheart born March 21, 1802 in Maryland married Rhoda Condit November 1, 1827 in Ohio County. Only five months after their marriage he died on April 10, 1828. He drowned in the Ohio River at the time of a collision between the steamboats Carrol and Lady Huntrys at Owensboro, Ky. On September 29th following his death his only child, Ann William, was born and named in his memory. William's widow, Rhoda, was born in Jefferson County, Ky. on November 17, 1800 and in 1808 came to Ohio County with her parents, Timothy Condit and Elizabeth Spangler. On April 12, 1836 in Ohio County she married Rev. Thomas Sailes Davis, a Methodist minister. In 1839 they moved to Warrick County, Ind., where she died on August 14, 1873. By her second marriage she had two daughters: Mary E. and Martha D. Davis, Ann William Igleheart married Alfred Bennett, her cousin, on September 13, 1847 in Warrick County, Ind. She died in Warrick County on September 25, 1865. Alfred and Ann Bennett had four children: Alice J. (died age 3), Mary Ida, William A. and Jacob Union Bennett.



Janet Igleheart born December 21, 1803 in Maryland married Jesse B. Miller on March 17, 1825 in Ohio County. In the fall of 1832 they left Ohio County and moved to Warrick County, Ind. Janet died there on February 5, 1843. Jesse B. Miller remarried and died in 1884, he did not have any children by his second wife Sarah. Jesse B. and Janet Igleheart Miller's children were: David L, Jacob H., Hester, John, Isaac Newton, Jesse B. and Janet. David L. Miller married Vashti Ann Boyd, a second cousin; she was the daughter of Alfred Boyd and Eleanor Condit and granddaughter of Abraham Boyd and Elizabeth Igleheart, the latter a sister of David L. Miller's grandfather, Jacob Igleheart. Jacob H. Miller during 1867-1870 served as sheriff of Vanderburgh County, Ind. John Miller was a doctor.

Eliza Igleheart born December 14, 1805 in Maryland married her cousin, Thomas N. Igleheart, son of John Igleheart and Rachel Nichols, They were married in Ohio County on March 11, 1826. They resided in Ohio County where Eliza died on August 12, 1834. She had three children a Nancy, Martha Ann and Betty. Nancy married Thomas N. Igleheart, lived in Daviess County, Ky., had: Elizabeth, James, William and Mary. Martha Ann married John P. Ashby, lived in Ohio County, had: Nancy Mary, Lucy A., Commazele and Sallie M. Eliza's daughter, Betty, died young, family story is that she died from eating poison berries while on recess at school. Eliza Igleheart's husband, Thomas N. Igleheart, remarried in 1835 to Nancy Warden, in 1849 moved to Daviess County, Ky., where he died on February 20, 1855.

Matilda J. Igleheart born February 17, 1809 in Maryland married Hiram Miller on August 30, 1828 in Ohio County, Ky. Shortly after marrying they moved to Warrick County, Ind., where she died at an early age sometime between 1830 and 1850. They had two children: Elizabeth Ann and Fielding. Elizabeth Arm married Joseph Humphrey, they had a son Richard, in 1850 they were living in Ohio County. Fielding Miller in 1850 was living with his father in Warrick County, Ind. Hiram Miller remarried and died in Warrick County in April of 1857.

John D. Igleheart born November 24, 1810 in Maryland married Emaline Condit on November 28, 1832 in Ohio County.. At the age of 23 he died on July 20, 1834 in Indiana. His death probably occurred in Warrick County where his widow remarried on November 22, 1846 to Horatio N. Miller, In 1850 she and her second husband were living in Warrick County; the Genealogical Record of the Condit Family, 1916, indicates that Emaline Condit Miller later lived in Texas. Her husband, Horatio N. Miller, and her brother-in-laws, Jesse B. Miller (husband of Janet Igleheart) and Hiram Miller (husband of Matilda J. Igleheart), were all in 1850 living in Warrick County, they were probably all brothers and sons of Fielding Miller, an early settler of Warrick County.

John D. Igleheart and Emaline Condit had two sons: Moses C. born 1833 in Indiana and John D. born December 29, 1834 in Indiana. In 1850 both were living in Ohio County with their grandfather, Jacob Igleheart. Moses C. Igleheart married Hannah Adaline Bennett, in 1860 they were living in McLean County, Ky., his brother, John, was living with them. John D. Igleheart after the Civil War broke out joined the Union Army, serving with Co. I of the 17th Ky. Infantry.

He was with the 17<sup>th</sup> when they were in the thick of the action at the bloody and costly battle at Shiloh, Tenn. Late in December of 1862 the 17th moved to Clarksville, Tenn. and remained there until the following March. In camp at Clarksville the men performed many duties, such as patrolling, keeping watch for the enemy, guarding supply trains, railroads, bridges, and military equipment. In the Clarksville camp on January 1, 1863 John D. Igleheart died of typhoid fever. He was initially buried in the National Cemetery in Nashville, Tenn., but later his remains were brought back to Ohio County, Ky. and interred in the Patterson - Igleheart Cemetery on the farm of his grandfather, Jacob Igleheart. He had never married. Moses C. Igleheart and his family in 1870 were living in Ohio County, He later moved to Marshall County, in western Ky., where he died about 1908.

Rebecca Igleheart born November 19, 1813 in Maryland married first David Moore or May 22. 1833 in Ohio County, they had no children. She married second James M. Bennett on January 13, 1838 in Ohio County. He was a nephew of Rebecca's older sister, Julia Ann's husband, James Bennett. In 1843 James M. Bennett was ordained a minister of the Baptist Church. During the next ten years he pastored several churches in the area, including Walton's Creek & Mt. Cannel in Ohio County, Green Brier in Daviess County, Nelson's Creek, Mt. Carmel & New Hope in Muhlenberg County. In 1853 they moved to Todd County, Ky., later left the state. Still later he returned to Kentucky where he died in Louisville about 1910. Rebecca Igleheart Bennett died sometime after 1856. They had four children: William G., Alfred Taylor, Heseltine and James B. Their sons, Alfred T. and James B. Bennett, both became doctors.

James Soper Igleheart born May 15, 1818 in Ohio County, Ky. On January 10, 1847 he married Lucinda Bennett in Ohio County. Also a native of Ohio County she was born on October 21, 1819 to Asa Bennett and Delilah Woodward. He was a farmer and resided in Ohio County. At the age of 90 James S. Igleheart died on November 11, 1908, his wife had died 36 years before him on March 10, 1872. They were buried in the Patterson - Igleheart Cemetery near his parents. Their children were: Lycurgus Winfield, Warren Levi, Emma, Leslie, Clayton. Eugene and Edgar.

#### Patterson - Igleheart Cemetery

In Ohio County, Ky. on Highway 85 turn south into first lane west of Matanzas. Cemetery is in edge of woods on hill to the right of the home of Jerry Shultz. Cemetery was copied 22 March 1987 by Jerry Long, of Owensboro, Ky.

## **Jacob Henderson Igleheart (1807-1871)**

Jacob Henderson Igleheart was born May 27, 1807 in Baltimore, Maryland. He was the sixth of eight children born to Jacob Igleheart and Ann Beall. Named after his father, it is not known if the "Henderson" name was also part of his father's name. The name of Jacob Henderson may have been passed down in the family in honor of a noted Anglican minister of that name. The Rev. Jacob Henderson had been rector of the church of Queen Anne's Parish in Prince George's County, Md., where the Iglehart family were parishioners. He was the celebrant

at the marriage of Dr. William Denune and Elizabeth Duvall in 1728, Jacob Henderson Igleheart's great-grandparents.

At the age of nine Jacob H. Igleheart came to Ohio County, Ky. with his parents. The remainder of his life was spent in Ohio County. On his father's farm, near where the small town of Matanzas is today, he grew to manhood. When he was 22 years old he married Miss Ann Tichenor, who lived in the Walton's Creek community about three miles from the Igleheart home. Rev. William Downs, a Baptist minister, married them on September 17, 1829. Ann, the daughter of Timothy Tichenor and Elizabeth Humphrey, was born in Ohio County on June 25, 1812.

Jacob and Ann Igleheart for several years lived on a farm near his father's. About 1840 they moved to the Walton's Creek area where he bought the farm of his father-in-law. Timothy and Elizabeth Tichenor in their remaining years lived with their daughter, Ann's family. Jacob H. Igleheart besides being a farmer also served in his community as an ordained minister of the Baptist Church. He and his wife at a young age had become members of the Walton's Creek Baptist Church.

Ann Tichenor Igleheart died on May 7, 1860. The 1860 Ohio County census mortality schedule records that Ann Igleheart died in May of 1860 of consumption, at the age of 47, she was married & was born in Ky. She was buried in the Patterson - Igleheart Cemetery near Matanzas. Ann's third great-grandfather, Martin Tichenor, resided in the colony of Connecticut, at New Haven, by 1644. One of her nephews was the noted Dr. George H. Tichenor (1837-1923), inventor of "Dr. Tichenor's" mouthwash antiseptic.

Jacob H. Igleheart remarried on February 28, 1861. On that date he & Mrs. Catherine (Rone) Perkins were married in Ohio County. In the 1870 census she was listed as being 49 years of age and born in VA., in the 1880 Ohio County census her age was recorded as 63. Catherine had earlier resided in Muhlenberg County, Ky., where in 1859 a daughter, Elizabeth Perkins (born c1842 Ky.), married Barnet Patterson. Another child, William A. Perkins (born c1849), was living with Jacob & Catherine Igleheart in 1870.

Jacob Henderson Igleheart died on August 19, 1871, he was 64 years old. Four days following his death his brother, James Soper Igleheart, was appointed the administrator of his estate. He was buried beside his wife on the farm on which he grew up, in the Patterson - Igleheart Cemetery. Twelve children were born to Jacob and Ann Tichenor Igleheart: Betsy Mary, William Bell, Benjamin Tolbert, Matilda J., Rebecca Ursula, Levi Judson, John Collins, Nancy Sydney, Edwin C. Macay, Sallie Christine, Lula Melvin and James Wade. Betsy Mary and James Wade died in infancy or childhood. All of their children were born in Ohio County, Ky. and all but Nancy Sydney and Edwin remained in the Ohio County area.

William Bell Igleheart was born March 4, 1831 and married Davidella Long. He was a farmer and resided in Ohio County near Centertown. They had three children: Jacob H., David

B. and Lula Belle. William B. died at the home of his son, Jacob, near West Point in Ohio County on December 31, 1921 and was buried in the Centertown Cemetery.

Benjamin Tolbert Igleheart was born February 11, 1834. A maternal uncle bore the same name, they were named for Rev. Benjamin Tolbert, a pioneer minister of Ohio County, who had served as pastor of Walton's Creek Baptist Church. Benjamin T. Igleheart married first Matilda Catherine Patterson 6 December 1860 in Ohio County, Ky.; to them were born: Clinton, Deborah A., Harvey Lewis, Archibald ("Archie") and Clark M. After his wife's death in 1874 he married Lucinda Ann Tichenor, 29 November 1876 Ohio County, Ky., and to this marriage one daughter, Eunice, was born. He was a farmer in Ohio County. About 1880 he was ordained a minister in the Baptist Church and like his father served his local community. He married third Mrs. Lou V. Davis, 24 January 1894 Muhlenberg County, Ky. In Muhlenberg County, Ky. at the home of his son, Clark, he died on December 5, 1912. He took his own life by taking carbolic acid. He was buried in Ohio County in the Equality Cemetery.

Matilda J. Igleheart was born about 1835. She married Elias Atherton on February 19, 1857 in Ohio County. They had two children: William P. and Jacob, the later died in childhood. Matilda died at a young age, her son William, lived with his grandfather Jacob Igleheart, with whom he was living at the time of the 1870 Ohio County census, he then was 12 years old. In 1880 William P. Atherton was living with the family of his uncle, William Igleheart.

Rebecca Ursula Igleheart was born December 11, 1836. On June 6, 1852 in Ohio County she married John Plain Rowe. They resided in Ohio County most of their lives until their later years when they moved to the home of their son, Richard P. Rowe, near Dermont in Daviess County, Ky. There she died on May 26, 1922 and was buried in the nearby Macedonia Baptist Church Cemetery. They had four children; Richard Perry, James Albert, Jacob Edwin and Robert Lewis. Jacob Edwin Rowe was a noted attorney of Ohio and Daviess Counties, serving several years as Commonwealth Attorney.

Levi Judson Igleheart was born November 25, 1838. He married Levina Chapman on September 12, 1861. He was a farmer and resided in Ohio County. He died in Ohio County at Centertown on July 27, 1933, he was 94, years old. He was buried in the Central Grove Baptist Church Cemetery near Centertown. They had four children: Ellis F., William I., Ada Bee and Etta M.

John Collins Igleheart was born November 25, 1840. He was married twice, by his first wife Pelina Ellen Prewitt (Pruitt) he had one daughter, Myrtle Ann. His wife died in 1873 and he married second Martha E. (Mattie) Tichenor, they did not have any children. John C. Igleheart was a farmer and lived in Ohio County near Equality. He died on November 16, 1927 and was buried in the Equality Cemetery.

Nancy Sydney Igleheart was born September 18, 1845, a twin sister died at birth. She married James Edward Coleman in Ohio County on December 17, 1863. In the early 1900's they

moved to Kansas, where she died 30 April 1931. They had four children: Cortes Berry, Iona Ursula, Mary Ellen and Jacob Edward.

Edwin C. Macey Igleheart was born November 23, 1847, At the age of 24 he married Laura Ware. Soon after coming of age he left Ohio County and went out west. He died in Pony, Montana on March 18, 1923. They had ten children: Orville H., Millie, Ursula Belle, Jacob Henderson, Bessie, Grover C., Samuel Dewitt, Rosie B. and two other children died in infancy. At the time of his death in 1923 his eight surviving children were residing in five different states, Oklahoma, Montana, Oregon, Washington and Missouri,

Sallie Christine Igleheart was born March 15, 1850. In Ohio County on March 2, 1876 she married Thomas Jefferson Bishop. They lived in Ohio County. At the age of 35 she died on July 2, 1885, leaving two small girls: Zada and Minnie E. She was buried in the Patterson - Igleheart Cemetery.

Lula ("the") Melvin Igleheart was born April 6, 1854. She married Elijah Collins Brown on January 23, 1873. They lived in Ohio County, where she died on September 3, 1937 and was buried in the Walton's Creek Baptist Church Cemetery. They had: William Sanford & Hylas Judson (Jut) twins, Hardin Chelton, Otis Windfield, Ida Ree, Ora Ellen and Lizzie.

## **The Denune Family of Maryland**

Mary Denune, wife of Johrr Iglehart (c1745-1810), was the daughter of Dr. William Denune and Elizabeth Duvall. She was born March 3, 1752 according to the register of Queen Anne's Parish in Prince George's County, Md. At a very young age she married John Iglehart. They were married sometime between June 14, 1764, the date of her mother's will, and August 28, 1765, the birth of her first child.

Mary Denune Iglehart's father was a prominent physician in Prince George's County, Md. The Denune family was of Scottish origin. William Denune was born about 1699. In 1721 he graduated from a medical school in Paris. Between 1721 and 1728 he immigrated to the American colonies. He settled first in Queen Anne's County on the eastern shore of the Maryland colony. And later moved to Prince George's County, Md., where he practiced his profession and maintained a plantation on the Patuxent River. His record books showed his services were in great demand, serving an extensive clientele, among whom were many of the most notable families of Prince George's and Anne Arundel Counties.

In the books of St. Barnabas' Church, Queen Anne's Parish in Prince George's County, the following was recorded: "William Denune was married to Elizabeth Duvall, dau. of Mareen,

at the 'Marsh', by the Reverend Mr. Jacob Henderson, the 24th October, 1728". The celebrant, Rev. Henderson, was an English clergyman of the Anglican Church, who had been sent by the Church of England to the colonies, where he served as rector of Queen Anne's Parish in Prince George's County, Md. He was born about 1684, his wife Mary, was the very wealthy widow of Mareen Duvall, Sr. and the step-grandmother of Elizabeth Duvall Denune. One of the grandchildren of Mary Denune Iglehart born in 1807 was named Jacob Henderson Igleheart, who may have been named in part in memory of this noted early minister.

In the same parish church in which William Denune and Elizabeth Duvall were married their family was assigned pew number 12. And in the church's register the births of their eleven children were recorded.

Dr. William Denune died in 1763. His wife, Elizabeth Duvall Denune, died in 1766. Her will written on June 14, 1764, was recorded in Prince George's County. Their estate was divided among their eight surviving children: Jane Howard, Anne Taylor, Susannah Hardesty, William Denune, Catherine Taylor, Elizabeth Denune, Jacob Denune and Mary Denune. Three other children, Elizabeth, Alexander and Martha, had died in infancy or childhood. Jane was the wife of Vachel Howard. Anne, Catherine and Elizabeth all married Taylors; Richard Taylor was the husband of either Anne or Catherine, and Elizabeth married Caleb Taylor. William married Elizabeth Forrest. Jacob married Margaret Duvall. And Mary married John Iglehart.

## **Mareen Duvall, The Huguenot**

Elizabeth Duvall, wife of Dr. William Denune, was the daughter of Mareen Duvall ("the Younger") and Elizabeth Jacob. She was born July 20, 1706 at the Great Marsh in Prince George's County, Md. Her grandfather, Mareen Duvall, was the Huguenot immigrant.

In 1659 Mareen Duvall emigrated from Nantes, France and settled on the south side of South River in Anne Arundel County, Maryland (The Early Settlers of Maryland, Skordas). His arrival in Maryland followed only 25 years after the first settlers of Maryland came over on the Ark and the Dove, 39 years after the Pilgrims sailed on the Mayflower and 52 years after the first settlement in the American Colonies was made at Jamestown,

Mareen Duvall, the immigrant, was the son of Thomas Duvall and Nicola Stagard and was born in Normandy, France (Register of Maryland's Heraldic Families, Vol. I, p.235). In Normandy his ancestry has been traced to the 8th century. The old "Chateau de La Val" in Normandy, the ancestral home of the Duvall family, was commenced in the 9th century (picture published in Mareen Duvall of Middle Plantation, Newman, 1952). After settling on South River, in Maryland Mareen Duvall named his homestead "La Val" after the family estates in

France. In Anne Arundel County, Md. Mareen Duvall became one of the county's most prominent and wealthiest merchants and planters, owning an estate of several thousand acres.

Mareen Duvall was probably born in the 1630's, when he was transported in 1659 by Colonel William Burgess he was most likely of age, which would indicate he was born by 1638. About the time of his immigration or shortly afterwards he was married, one of his older sons, Mareen ("the Elder") was born about 1661, Mareen Duvall was married three times. His first wife's name is unknown, by this marriage he had at least five children:

1. Mareen, the Elder, born about 1661 in Anne Arundel County, Md., married Frances Stockett, died in 1730's.
2. John married Elizabeth Jones.
3. Lewis married Martha Ridgely 5 March 1699, died 1724 in South Carolina.
4. Samuel, born about 1667 in Anne Arundel County, Md., married Mrs. Elizabeth (Ijams) Clarke 16 July 1697, died 1741 in Prince George's County, Md.
5. Eleanor married John Roberts before 1694.

Mareen Duvall's first wife died and he married second, Susannah, her last name unknown; both occurred approximately during the decade of 1667-1677. To Mareen and Susannah the following children were born:

6. Susannah, born about 1677, married Robert Tyler before 1694.
7. Mareen, the Younger, born about 1680 in Anne Arundel County, Md., married Elizabeth Jacob 21 October 1701, died 1741.
8. Catherine married William Orrick 22 October 1700.
9. Mary, born about 1682, married Rev. Henry Hall 5 February 1701.
10. Elizabeth married Abraham Clarke after 1694.
11. Johanna, born about 1685, married Richard Poole 12 August 1703.
12. Benjamin married Sophia Griffith in 1713.

Mareen Duvall married a third time to Mary, it is not believed they had any children. Several earlier sources state she was Mary Stanton (The Founders of Anne Arundel and Howard Counties, Maryland, 1905, p.106) but Harry Wright Newman in his book Mareen Duvall of Middle Plantation, 1952, concluded that this was not correct. Following the death of Mareen Duvall, Mary, married the powerful Colonel Henry Ridgely (between 1694-1700) and sometime following 1710 she became the wife of Rev. Jacob Henderson. She was buried beside Rev. Henderson in a vault at the chapel in Darnell's Grove in Queen Anne's Parish graveyard, Prince George's County, Md. Her monument bears the inscription: "Here lieth the body of Mary, wife of Rev. Jacob Henderson, who departed this life ye 19 January 1735."

Mareen Duvall died in August 1694. On the 2 August 1694 he wrote his will and eleven days later on 13th of August it was recorded in Anne Arundel County. No monument marking the grave of Mareen Duvall survives, but his final resting place was reported to have been a few miles northeast of the Governor Bridge on the Patuxent River. The Patuxent River was the



boundary between the counties of Anne Arundel, on the north and east, and Prince George's, on the south and west

The following abstract of Mareen Duvall's will was published in Baldwin's Maryland Calendar of Wills, Vol. II, pp.76-77

Duvall, Mareen, A. A. Co., 2nd Aug., 1694; 13th Aug., 1694.

To wife Mary, extx., part of 600 A., "Middle Plantation" during life, and she is not to be molested by any of testator's children.

" son Lewis and hrs., 300 A., part of "Middle Plantation," on which eld. son Mareen now lives; also to inherit wife Mary's portion at her decease.

" dau. Eliza: and hrs., 375 A., "Bowdell's Choice" in Calvert Co.

" son Benjamin and hrs., 200 A., part of 400 A., "Howerton's Range" in Calvert Co.

" dau. Catherine and hrs., residue of "Hoertens' Range."

" son Mareen, the younger, son of late wife Susannah, and hrs., 300 A., "The Plains" in Calvert Co.

" dau. Mary and hrs., 320 A., "Marley's Grove," and 300 A., "Marley's Lot," A. A. Co.

" young. dau. Johanna, 311 A., "Larkin's Choice," and 200 A., "Duvall's Range."

" son John, 5 shillings.

" dau. Eliza:, wife of John Roberts, and to son Samuel, personalty.

Sons John and Lewis and son-in-law Robert Tyler to assist wife in executorship. Sons to be of age at 18 yrs. and daus at 16 yrs.

(note: "Middle Plantation" was Mareen Duavll's home plantation, the plantations "Bowdell's Choice", "Howerton's Range" and "The Plains" in Calvert County in 1695 became part of the newly formed county of Prince George's; "The Plains" was also called "Wilson's Plains" and "The Great Marsh").

Harry Wright Newman, published a book entitled Mareen Duvall of Middle Plantation, 590 well documented pages on Mareen Duvall and his descendants. Numerous descendants of Mareen Duvall were influential public officials and esteemed citizens. Mary have become nationally known and have left their names etched in the history of this country. One of the most celebrated descendants bearing the Duvall name was Gabriel Duval (1752-1844), an associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. He was the son of Benjamin Duvall & Susanna Tyler, grandson of Benjamin Duvall & Sophie Griffith and a great-grandson of Mareen Duvall, the immigrant. Gabriel Duvall and Mary Denune Iglehart were second cousins.

## **Mareen Duvall, The Younger** **(c1680-1741)**

Mareen Duvall, the Younger, son of Mareen and Susannah Duvall, was born about 1680 in Anne Arundel County, Md. Called "the Younger" to distinguish him from an older half-

brother also named Mareen. On October 21, 1701 he married Elizabeth Jacob in Anne Arundel County. They resided at "the Great Marsh", in Prince George's County near the Anne Arundel and Prince George's County line. "The Great Marsh" was a 300 acre plantation ("the Plains") which he had inherited from his father. To Mareen Duvall, the Younger, and Elizabeth Jacob eleven children were born: Mareen, Susannah, Elizabeth, Samuel, Anne, Benjamin, John, Jacob, Mary, Lewis and Gabriel, their births were recorded in the parish register of Queen Anne's Parish in Prince George's County.

Mareen Duvall, the Younger, wrote his will on December 9, 1740 and it was recorded in Prince George's County on June 9, 1741. The following abstract of his will is from Baldwin's Maryland Calendar of Wills, Vol. VIII, p.130:

Elizabeth Jacob, wife of Mareen Duvall, was the daughter of John Jacob and Ann (? Mary) Cheney. She was born in 1683 and died in 1752; she wrote her will on December 4, 1750 and it was probated in Prince George's County on February 27, 1752. Her father Capt. John Jacob, born 1644, in 1665 came from Kent, England and settled in Anne Arundel County, Md. (The Early Settlers of Maryland, Skordas). He was a tobacco planter and an extensive land owner. He died in 1702 and his wife, Ann Cheney Jacob died in 1724. She was the daughter of Richard Cheney (Chaney, Cheyney, Cheiney) who immigrated to Maryland in 1658 (The Early Settlers of Maryland, Skordas). In 1660 Richard Chaney was granted a patent for "Chaney's Neck" on the South River in Anne Arundel County. The following abstract of Richard Cheiney's will is from Baldwin's Maryland Calendar of Wills, Vol. II, p,27:
