Sixty Years of Owensboro, 1883-1943, by William Foster Hayes (Owensboro, KY: Messenger Job Printing Co., 1943, pp.285-287):

THE INVESTIGATORS CLUB

As shown by the minutes of the club, it was formed on February 21, 1894, at "Waveland," on south Frederica Street, the residence (long since removed) of the late Mr. James Weir. The meeting held for the purpose was at the invitation of Mr. Weir's son, Dr. James Weir, Jr. now also deceased. The following gentlemen were recorded as charter members of the club, and presumably were all present at the meeting:

So far as the writer is informed Mr. Elliott is the only one of these gentlemen now living, though as to one or two of them he is uncertain.

At that meeting Dr. Weir, who had evidently given the matter some thought, introduced a long resolution, stating the name of the club and various regulations, designed to constitute a sort of program or constitution for the club, and the resolution was adopted. Subsequently, either by formal action or usage or both the provisions were much reduced in number or content, and the customary program of the Club settled down to what is presently stated.

At the beginning of this meeting Mr. Leigh was made Chairman and Mr. Elliott secretary and after the resolutions had been adopted it was ordered that the temporary organization of the club be made permanent, and in addition Dr. Weir was elected Vice-Chairman, The office of Chairman has since then usually been designated as President, and the following persons have acted as president of the club:

As stated above the original resolutions seem to have been found to be too elaborate in detail, but in the main the important features have been preserved in the usage of the club. One of the resolutions was that the purpose of the club "shall be the investigation of universal knowledge," and the variety of subjects discussed from time to time indicates that this ambitious purpose has not been discarded.

As originally provided, the membership of the club has remained limited to twenty-five, and generally speaking the club has maintained that membership. It was provided originally that the club should meet bi-weekly, but for a number of years the meetings have been only once a month on the Friday night falling on or next after the fifteenth day of the month. The program for each meeting has remained substantially as originally provided. The regular program consists of (1) an original paper; (2) a scientific discussion; (3) a book review; and (4) a supper. It was provided at first that the refreshments should not be costly, but should consist of cold meats, cheese, bread, crackers, coffee or chocolate. This, however, has been liberally interpreted, and as a rule very delightful repasts have been provided.

The original resolutions contemplated that the original papers should be kept in some safe place and that at the end of the year or at some time to be decided on they should be printed in book form at the expense of the club. The papers have indeed been preserved, though it seems that some of them have been lost, but there has been no publication of them in book form. Occasionally a paper has been published in the local press at the request of the club, but otherwise there has been no publication.

There have always been a number of bright, able men in the club and the programs have been usually, if not always, interesting, instructive, and stimulating. Some of these outstanding members I have spoken of at some length elsewhere in these pages, and in addition to these I may mention one who is still living at an advanced age, McHenry Rhoads, for a time superintendent of the Owensboro Public Schools and later superintendent of Public Instruction of Kentucky. Among those who have passed away (without attempting an exhaustive list) there may be mentioned: Paul Weir; Judge John D. Atchison; M. H. Newton, who was about as witty as Will Rogers; W. G. Archer, manager of the first Chautauqua at Owensboro, witty and versatile; S. W. Anderson, and J. C. Frederick, merchants whose interest far transcended their commercial pursuits.

The Investigators Club is really one of Owensboro's important institutions and the fact that it has been main-tamed so long justifies the hope that it may be a permanent one. It

is composed of men only, and men of various occupations, held together by a lively interest in a wide variety of subjects. It is an institution of which Owensboro may well be proud.

A NEW LITERARY CLUB ORGANIZED
LAST NIGHT.

Scientific and Literary Research and Self
Improvement the Purposes of the Or-
ganization—Meetings to Be Held Every
Two Weeks.

At a meeting held last night at the residence of Mr. James Weir, an organization was effected of a number of gentlemen for the purposes of literary and scientific research and self improvement. The organization will be known as the Investigators' club. The discussions and researches of the club will be confined to no particular line, but will embrace universal knowledge. Meetings will be held bi-weekly on Friday night. At each meeting some member will read an original paper on a topic to be chosen by himself, another will discuss some new book, and there will be a paper on some scientific subject. Each will be discussed by other members. The meetings will be held at the houses of the members. The membership is limited to 25, and 15 enlisted as charter members as follows: George V. Triplett, W. R. Griffith, Rev. J. C. Mohoy, Charles Elliott, J. D. Shortelle, Dr. James Weir, Jr., Gus T. Brannon, E. G. Buckner, J. A. Dean, Dr. H. G. Artis, Paul Weir, John W. Harris, F. A. Ames, Clint. B. Leigh and Judge J. D. Atchison.

Clint. B. Leigh was elected chairman, Dr. James Weir, Jr., vice chairman, and Charles Elliott, secretary and treasurer. The first regular meeting will be held Friday, March 9, at Mr. James Weir's residence, from 8 to 11 o'clock. On this occasion Dr. H. G. Artis will discuss a scientific topic, Mr. Gus T. Brannon will give his impressions of a new book, and Mr. George V. Triplett will read an original paper, with Dr. James Weir, Jr., as alternate. The club starts out very favorably and with a manifestation of much interest on the part of the members.

Investigators Club, City's Oldest For Men, Traces Its History Back 60 Years To 1894

Some 60 years before McCarthy, a group of Owensboro men organized to do some investigating of their own. The probe they started goes on today in the name of the Investigators Club. Their purpose is to expose not others but themselves, to universal knowledge.

The city's oldest male club, Investigators dates back to Feb. 21, 1894. That night 14 men met at Waveland, the home of Dr. James Weir. Young James Weir, his son, had called them together for the purpose of forming a literary group. Present and constituting charter membership were Fred Ames, H. Grant Artis, J. D. Atchison, Gus T. Brannon, E. G. Buckner, Allen Dean, C. B. Elliott, Will R. Griffith, John W. Harris, Clint B. Leigh, J. C. Malloy, J. D. Shirtell, George V. Triplett, Paul and James Weir Jr. Leigh was the first president.

The founders decided that the group would meet bi-weekly on Friday nights. The program would have four parts—an original paper, not to exceed 3,000 words in length; a scientific discussion, a book review and refreshments. Membership was limited to 25.

No Subject Barred

No subject was to be barred from discussion, and each member had the privilege of criticizing,

for not more than five minutes, any topic introduced. The secretary of the club was instructed to collect all original papers to be bound as reference material.

With minor exceptions, the by-laws at that meeting hold today. In 1897 the club went to a monthly meeting schedule and later closed the membership at 24. This makes its program function smoothly. Every six months each member takes over one phase, so that in a two-year period, he has presented an original paper, spoken on a scientific subject, given a book review and been host to the club for dinner.

Enter The Women—Once

One rule apparently died its own death soon after it was adopted. Shortly before the club's first anniversary, it was voted to have a social meeting once a month, with ladies invited. The secretary's book shows that Gus Brannon was host to the first such gathering, held at the Osceola Club Rooms. The ladies entered into the discussions. No further record of them attending future meetings is to be found in Investigators' proceedings. Instead the book noted that "members may bring male guests, with the permission of club host for the meeting."

The files now contain more than

300 of the original papers, including the first one read before the club, by George Triplett. "Dialectic Tendencies in America" was his subject. After the club had been established a year, its first volume of original papers was bound. Each member was assessed for its publication. A second volume was planned, but never published. Instead the works were kept and filed in the library beginning in 1917.

The subjects of the papers through the years provide interesting browsing. The works not only represent the thought of the times, but often prophesied things to come, years in advance of their happening. S. W. Anderson wrote an original paper in 1907 called "Is War With Japan Probable?" concluding that it was, and that the current unrest would brew some time before exploding.

Some Predictions Came True

"Social Treatment of Juvenile Delinquents" was a topic explored by James H. Risley in 1909, seeing delinquency as a major problem nearly 50 years ago. He was an early advocate of home-like detention houses built on the cottage plan, and instruction in useful trades instead of confinement and punishment for the young offenders.

One prophecy is still in the making. Perhaps the coming improvements through government aid will help it come to pass. Ray Gilbert, writing in 1911, saw the Green River area as a future Pittsburgh, and the river itself as a someday rival to the Hudson. Prof. J. L. Foust, whose club membership dates back to 1910, wrote one paper after another on needed school reforms as are in effect today in Daviess County.

In "The Lure of the Great Cities," J. C. Frederick in 1912 saw evil in the rise of the urban population of from three to 45 per cent in the previous century. "The cities are dealing death to the country boy in their damnable saloons and bawdy houses," he wrote, predicting the nation would soon be overrun by abnormals and degenerates.

George H. Cox reviewed the progress of Owensboro in that year, when the population had reached 16,011. "Would you like to have Owensboro larger and greater? Then 'git' up and 'git,'" he told fellow investigators.

In 1914 E. M. Barnes advocated woman suffrage. Four years later, just after the Armistice, it was Frederick who predicted the coming depression in a paper titled "Economic Warfare After the War." Two conflicting views about prohibition are on file. The Rev. Horace Kingsbury in 1919 saw it

as "America's opportunity to lead the nations of the world to larger and freer life." "An unenforceable law . . . not only worthless but pernicious discrediting all laws" was the opinion of W. C. Huston when the country was good and dry six years later.

In Depression, Rejoice

A common sense outlook on the depression was outlined by E. E. Owsley in 1931. His papers were largely humorous, and even this one urged Americans to look on the dark days good naturedly, poking around for the silver lining behind the black, black clouds. "After we had fooled ourselves with overproduction and the filling of warehouses with goods for which there was no need, then we found out that we had been playing in the very back-yard-of-the-Wall-Street barons and robbers, and they had gotten all our marbles. . . . Some of us wanted to blow out our brains, swallow poison or jump out a window. We might compromise by crying like children from whom candy has been taken.

"This is no time for radicalism and warped thinking," Owsley wrote, "but a time for patriotism, sacrifice and service. It is time for men who are capable of thinking to be doing that very thing and thank God for the many blessings they do have. . . ."

In 1939 Dr. John Dixon drew a word picture of the threat of the atom bomb and the coming age of atomic warfare. J. E. Hare pointed to the coming Kremlin cold war in 1945, writing a tongue-in-the-cheek discourse on "A Year of Peace with Russia."

Investigators have chosen an encyclopedia of topics, from deep discussions of theology and international law to lightweight subjects like wrestling or planting by the "sign." Just as the rules said, no subject has been barred. The book reviews have followed the same pattern. Heavy works on world government or sociological problems have been selected; Lawrence Weill once held the membership enthralled with a review of an Owensboro 1886 city directory.

Myth-Ing Link

Scientific topics have been that and also pseudo-scientific. Dr. Jack Keeley, who with his dad constitutes an Investigators' father-son team, recently gave a revolutionary discussion on the finding of the missing link. He called it "The Loogootee Man," with the ape-man so named because his skeleton had been found near here in Southern Indiana. As soon as the young physician finished, the first critic was on his feet, ready to put in his five minutes' worth. The doc-

tor raised his hand to call a halt. It was all a hoax, he smiled—something he had wanted to write for years.

Even the monthly meal has been the subject of club fun. Once when it fell Dr. Dixon's time to entertain, he served chicken necks to all the members except three Catholics present, who had delicious helpings of shrimp salad. It was his playful protest of the Friday meeting night, but the old 1894 rule still holds.

Present club officers are Mr. Foust, president; Dr. J. M. Coffman, a member since 1921, vice president, and C. F. Criley, secretary.

Members are Marshall Barnes, the Rev. Leonard W. Boynton, David Brodie, Don Cawthorne, Dr. Ralph Cherry, Howard Daniel, W. J. Foster, Col. Benjamin W. Hawes, Morton Holbrook, Jack Keeley, Dr. Jack Keeley, Willard Lape, R. L. Lyon, J. E. McClure, Jim Mobberly, John W. Polkinghorn, Dr. E. Dargan Smith, the Rev. Wade Welton, Ridley Sandidge and Or. Oscar W. Lever. Wilbur Miller, justice in the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia, was an active member and the club secretary at the time of his resignation in 1945. He now holds an honorary membership.

Investigating 'Universal Knowledge' Keeps Owensboro Group Interested

Owensboro harbors a venerable institution dedicated to the exploration of "universal knowledge."

Regularly for more than 65 years, members of the Investigators Club have been getting together for a mutual extending of horizons.

This unusual organization, loosely tied together by a common interest in looking beyond the limits of their daily occupations, has attracted a variety of members over the past six decades.

Doctors and lawyers have always been prominent on the membership rolls of the Investigators, where they have been joined by bankers, school administrators, ministers, farmers, newspapermen, and of late, a college president.

This panorama of backgrounds makes for some lively discussions on the one Friday night each month when club members get together.

Basis for their discussions is an original paper of around 3,000 words, written by one of the Investigators and read by him to his colleagues. After the reading is when the meeting begins to liven up.

Each member has up to five minutes to comment on the ideas expressed in the paper. Among the two dozen Investigators, there is always some sharp criticism. But the last word goes to the author of the paper.

Rules of the club stipulate that no subject shall be barred from discussion.

A survey of original papers on file at the Carnegie Free Public Library supports this. Titles range from "Trees" through "The Comic Strip," "Owensboro's Sewers," "Five R's Of Education," "Gambling," "Treasure," "Some Racial Problems" to "Must We Fight Russia?" the latter presented 12 years ago.

In May of 1897, J. B. Griffin presented to the club his work on "Friendship True and False." The manuscript is on ledger paper

bearing the letterhead of Griffin's lumber business. On the back of one of the sheets is sketched a building problem.

Everett Edward Smith, who wrote "Lessons From The Recent Local Option Campaign In Owensboro" took the position that citizens were swayed by commercial considerations when they "voted to save the city, rather than the boy." Smith served as president of the club for 20 years.

Memberships of 30 to 40 years have not been uncommon in the history of the club. The current president, E. Dargan Smith, first joined the organization in 1928.

In its early days, however, the club suffered a considerable turnover in membership. As the club settled into a regular procedure, and its purpose and ideals became more clear to all persons involved, the turnover slackened.

Although no subject is barred from discussion in an original paper, two areas are avoided. To preserve a friendly atmosphere among the Investigators, politics and religion are passed over in searching for subjects.

That leaves members plenty of room to select a topic, and the scope can be broad.

A few years ago, one of the membership stood up to read his version of "What's Wrong With The World." Among the major troubles he cited were these: "We work too hard; we are too much dependent upon each other; and things cost too much."

This subject, large as it is, was presented in such a way that it must have stirred investigators to considerable debate.

A few years earlier, a minister had written on the subject, "Toward An Alternative to World Chaos," offering no pat solutions but a more orderly approach to global situations.

Not all original papers have attempted such a broad scope. In 1902 George V. Triplett presented "Sermons From Thackeray" on the satiric ability of the novelist-sermonizer.

Periodicals are filled today with warnings and urgings aimed at cutting down the number of accidents. Forty years ago, J. L. Foust

presented to the Investigators a paper entitled "Accidents and Their Prevention."

To keep its program manageable, the Investigators limit active membership to two dozen. Open-

ings occur when a member loses his interest in reading, becomes too busy with other affairs, or moves away. Then it is time to elect a new member from a waiting list which now has about 20 names on it.

Investigators meetings begin with supper, after which the original paper for the evening is read. Two other offerings round out the evening. One member is 'called upon to present a scientific topic, which need not be original, but must be limited to 15 minutes. Another ten minutes is set aside for a book review.

With 24 members, each has an opportunity in a two-year period to handle every part of the program one time.

Honorary membership allows a person to enjoy the rights and privileges of the club, but requires of him no active duties. This position is restricted to those living outside Daviess County, and at present, is held by only one man.

Wilbur K. Miller, a federal judge living in Washington, D.C., holds the only honorary membership in the club now. Judge Miller, who first became a member in 1917, was an ardent investigator when he lived in Owensboro.

Members may bring guests—male only—when it is agreeable to the host. Early in the Investigators saga, the gallant members tried having a ladies' night, but after one recorded trial, the idea was quietly dropped.

Investigators got its start Feb. 21, 1894 at Waveland, the home of

James Weir on Frederica Street. Dr. James Weir Jr. invited a group of men to the home and read to them a long resolution setting out the purpose and activities of the proposed club. As the years went along, much of the original resolution was whittled away, but the basic principles have remained intact.

Charter membership was granted to Clint B. Leigh, Will R. Griffith, Gus T. Brannon, E. G. Buckner, John W. Harris, J. D. Shortell, H. Grant Artis, Charles B. Elliott, George V. Triplett, James Weir Jr., Paul Weir, Allen Dean, Fred Ames, Rev. J. C. Molloy and J. D. Atchison.

Leigh served as first president of the group. Another early member, Judge Lucius P. Little, served as president for several years between 1899 and 1918, when he died.

The first regular meeting of the group was held on March 9, 1894 in the home of George V. Triplett, who presented the first original paper "Dialectic Tendencies in America."

Three members of the club, Dr. Weir, T. S. Pettit and James McGinnis, spent six months editing

the first volume of original papers for publication. Ten copies of the 96-page edition were prepared for each member at a cost of \$4.65 per member.

A second volume was under discussion for five years. Investigators records show, but never appeared. In 1917, the Carnegie Free

Public Library agreed to keep all original papers on file.

There they rest today, as testimony to the inquisitive spirit of Owensboroans that has kept the Investigators Club lively for nearly two generations.
