Dear Ms. Juhl:

I have completed the research you requested on the Mobberly family. I am sorry it has taken awhile. I wanted to wait until my trip to the Kentucky Historical Society Library in Frankfort, Ky. earlier this month before I sent you a report.

At the Owensboro, Ky. library I checked the card files and family folders for the Mobberly name. In the Mobberly folder I found the names of two other descendants of Lewis B. Mobberly & Susan S. Owen, who were doing research on the family. An ancestor chart of Mr. H. S. Morton, Jr. of Charlottesville, Va. (in 1968), from this file, is enclosed. The other descendant, Doug Moberly (1604 So. Hawthorn, Sioux Falls, S.D. 57105; 1984 address), had a query in the file on the Mobberly family. At the Owensboro library we have only one book on Prince William County, Va., no Mobberly or Hardins were named in it. I checked the other general books on Virginia for the two names but found nothing I could connect.

I spent several hours checking local sources at the library and Daviess County Courthouse, in order to clarify some dates on your chart where there were some discrepancies and also to compile data on the families of each of John G. Mobberly's children. The last part I realize is beyond your request and I will not charge for that part of my research. On each family I work on I like to compile some info on the first couple of generations of that family in our local area.

At the Kentucky Historical Society I spent an hour checking the Mobberly & Hardin names in the card files (for general family histories) and in the family folder files. The only book on Prince William County, Va. they had was the same general history of the county that was in Owensboro. I could find no listing of the marriages of Prince William County, Va. and thus I was unable to check for the 1808 marriage of John G. Mobberly and Martha Hardin. In several general books on Virginia marriages it was not listed.

Martha Hardin Mobberly is most likely a descendant of the French Huguenot immigrant, . Marc Hardouin (Hardin), who settled in Prince William County, Va. in 1716 and died there in 1734. Any of his four sons may have been the grandfather or great-grandfather of Martha.

Enclosed are some pages on this family of Hardins. Some of them are from Hardin and Harding of Virginia and Kentucky, by Dorothy Ford Wulfeck; I could not locate the original book and the enclosed pages are the only ones I found from the book. There is a publication "The Hardin Family Newsletter" I would suggest writing a query about Martha Hardin Mobberly (born 1789 Va. & resident of Prince William County, Va. in 1810) to the following Hardin family researchers: Elaine Hardin, Rt. 1, Box .72, Buffalo, Ks. 66717 and Larry Hardin, 404 West Van Buren, Gallatin, Mo. 64640.

John G. Mobberly (1781-1868) was born in Maryland, not in Virginia. In the 1850 & 1860 censuses (of Ohio & Daviess Counties, Ky.) his place of birth was reported as Maryland. It was also stated that he was a native of Maryland in the books: Record of Carter Jerrel Kelley, by Rev. Carter Jerrel Kelley, written in 1854, and History of Daviess County, Kentucky, 1883, copies from these sources are enclosed. John G. Mobberly's wife, Martha, & son, Remus G., have monuments in the Wells-Mobberly Cemetery in Ohio County, Ky., about two miles north of Fordsville. On her monument it is inscribed "Patsy H., wife of John G. Mobberly, born in Virginia 1789, died 22 Dec. 1829". Her monument is the oldest in this cemetery, in recent years the cemetery has been referred to as the Wells Cemetery. The following are some clarifications on John G. Mobberly's children: William Peyton Mobberly died 29 July 1872 (not 1871 or 1874), this date is on his monument and at the Daviess County Courthouse it is recorded that on 29 August 1872 B. E. W. Stout was appointed administrator of W. P. Mobberly's estate. Elizabeth K. Motherly Britton was born in 1817 not 1812. Delila H. Mobberly Whitler was born 9 March 1825 (not 7 March), this is on her monument and is in numerous sources on the Whitler family, the published date from the Mobberly family bible may have been a misinterpretation of the original. Remus G. Mobberly was buried at the Wells-Mobberly Cemetery in Ohio County, Ky., not at the Mobberly Cemetery near Masonville in Daviess County, Ky.

I tried to locate the Mobberly family bible in hopes of obtaining a xerox copy of the original. In the enclosed article (Kentucky Genealogist, Vol. 17, #1, January-March 1975, pp16-20, "John G. Mobberly – Martha (Patsy) Hardin Bible Record, Ohio and Daviess Counties, Kentucky) it is stated that two generations of the Mobberly family had bible records and they were then in the possession of Miss Hattie Belle Martin and James S. Mobberly (son of John S. & grandson of William Peyton). Both resided in Owensboro and are now deceased. I talked to Mrs. James S. (Adele) Mobberly of Owensboro and she said the records her husband had are now in the possession of James S. Mobberly, Jr., 5315 Windy Lake Dr., Kingwood, Tx.77345 (phone 713-360-3291). She did not know about the bible that Hattie Belle Martin had. Some of the papers and belongings of the latter are now at the home of her cousin, Mrs. Olene Barren, of Owensboro. I talked to Mrs. Barren and she said when she got the time she would check the boxes of Miss Martin's material to see if there is a bible.

John G. Mobberly may have had a brother who settled. in Nelson County, Ky. In the book, Kentucky: A History of the State (Battle, Perrin, Kniffin, 1885), is a biography of Lewis T. Mobberly. In this article it is stated that his father, William, "was born in Maryland in 1808 and removed to Nelson County, Ky., in his boyhood." This would have been about the same time that John G. Mobberly resided in Nelson County, Ky. before moving to Ohio County, Ky. The William Mobberly referred to is of the age to have been a nephew of John G. Mobberly.

For my research I will request payment for 5 hours of research, which is the total you stated in your letter. At the rate of \$4.50 per hour, as quoted, this equals a total of \$22.50. I will also ask \$2.50 for my copying and postal expenses, which would make a total of \$25.00. In the future I will keep an eye out for new leads on the ancestry of John G. & Martha Hardin Mobberly. If you should learn who their parents are I would really appreciate it if you would let me know. Would you please share a family group chart on the family of your ancestor Lewis B. Mobberly (1820-1893)? Thank you for contacting me.

History of Daviess County, Kentucky, Inter-State Publishing Co., Chicago, 1883:

Pages 700-701 (Masonville Precinct) - WILLIAM P. MOBBERLY, deceased, was born in Prince William County, Va., June 14, 1811. His parents were John G. and Martha (Hardin) Mobberly, natives of Maryland. William P. was the eldest of eleven children. When he was some four years old he came with his parents to Nelson County and settled near Bardstown. He afterward moved with his parents to Ohio County, Ky., and settled near Fordsville. He remained on the old homestead with his father until his marriage to Lucy Haynes, Nov. 26, 1835. She was born in Ohio County, Ky., April 8, 1815. She was a daughter of William and Jane (McGuire) Haynes, natives of Virginia and Anderson County, Ky., respectively. After Mr. and Mrs. Mobberly were married they moved to Daviess County, Ky., and settled in the timber of Masonville Precinct, where his wife still resides and where he died, July 29, 1872. He was a Mason and had been for thirty years. He was also a member of the Baptist church. He and wife had a family of eleven children – John S., born Sept. 3, 1837, married Mary A. Martin, and is a farmer in Owensboro; William H., born Sept. 14, 1838, remained on the old home until twenty-three, when he went to Paducah, Ky., and ran a tobacco factory for two years; he then returned to Daviess County and married Nannie R. Yewell, April 29, 1869. She was born in Daviess County, Ky., and was a daughter of Harrison and Sarah (Lewis) Yewell, old settlers of Daviess County, Ky. After his marriage he went to Meridian, Miss., and engaged in the wholesale liquor trade for eighteen months. He then settled on the old homestead, where he has since resided. He and wife are both members of the Baptist church. Mr. Mobberly is a Mason and a demitted member of the John J. Daviess Lodge, Masonville Precinct. He owns half interest in a farm of 200 acres. He is engaged in raising tobacco, corn, hay, horses, cattle and hogs, but pays special attention to the culture of tobacco. In politics he is a Democrat. Emma R. was born May 16, 1840; died April 20, 1841. James M. was born July 7, 1841, and married Mollie Noel and resides at Long View, Texas. He was in Captain Noel's Confederate cavalry. Samuel H. was born Sept. 10, 1842, and married Laura Bennett. He is manager of the Stamboul plantation, Illawara postoffice, East Carroll Parish, La. He was a member of Noel's Kentucky Confederate cavalry. Elizabeth, born Feb. 5, 1846; died March 22, 1859. Nannie J., born Nov. 25, 1847, is the wife of Dr. F. M. McGruder. Chas. L. was born May 2, 1851, and married Sue Gordon. Mary and Sarah (twins) were born Dec. 9, 1853. Sarah married J. F. Hite, May 21, 1872; they reside in Whitesville where

he has a drug store. Mary married J. B. Burton Oct. 27, 1881. They reside on their farm in Boston Precinct. Almarion, born March 14, 1858, was formerly engaged in the drug business at Whitesville; he now owns half interest in the old homestead farm, where he is engaged with his brother in farming. Mrs. Mobberly still survives her husband. She is now in the sixty-eighth year of her age. She has been a member of the Baptist church since nineteen years of age. She is of Irish and English descent, her grandfather having come from Ireland.

Page 662 (Murray Precinct) - CHARLES L. MOBBERLY was born on the old homestead farm of his father, in Masonville Precinct, May 2, 1851. His father, W. P. Mobberly, was born in Virginia, and came to Ohio County, Ky., when a child. He came to Daviess County at an early day. He was married here to Lucy Haynes, a native of Daviess County, Ky. Mr. and Mrs. Mobberly had a family of eleven children, six sons and five daughters. Charles L. was the fifth son and seventh child. He was twenty-one years old when his father died. He remained on the farm with his mother until his marriage to Sue E. Gordon, Nov. 17, 1875. She was born in Masonville Precinct, Sept. 4, 1853, and was a daughter of Jackson and Sarah A. (Taylor) Gordon. After his marriage Mr. Charles L. Mobberly settled on a farm in Murray Precinct, No. 1, where he remained two years; then moved on the farm of his brother, J. H. Mobberly, in Masonville Precinct, and remained here until January, 1883, when he moved on his present farm in Murray Precinct, where he owns ninety-two acres, seventy-five under cultivation. He and wife are members of the Baptist church. They have one daughter – Olive, born July 11, 1881. In politics he is a Democrat, and cast his first vote for Horace Greeley for President of the United States.

History of Kentucky: The Blue Grass State, Vol. III, The S. J. Clarke Publishing Co., Chicago-Louisville, 1928, pp975-976:

James W. Mobberly, who is officially connected with one of Owensboro's most important industries, is also a representative of one of the old and prominent families of this section of the state, it having been established here very early in the nineteenth century. Mr. Mobberly has spent practically all his life in Owensboro and his record has been such as has gained for him an enviable standing. His paternal grandparents were Peyton and Lucy (Haynes) Mobberly, who lived in Daviess county, near Masonville, where the former followed the occupation of farming, and where both died. He was a deacon in the Baptist church and was a democrat in his political belief.

Among their children was John S. Mobberly, who was born in Daviess county in 1838, and whose death occurred in Owensboro, June 6, 1921. He followed farming pursuits and was a man of importance and influence in his community. He voted for the democratic ticket and was a deacon in the Walnut Street Baptist church of Owensboro. He was married to Miss Mary Martin, who was born in Daviess county in 1845, and is now living in Owensboro, at the age of eighty-one years. She is a daughter of Thomas and Mary (Gordon) Martin, both of whom were born near Masonville, Kentucky, where they spent their lives, and there died, the father having devoted his active years to farming. He was a member of the Baptist church and was a democrat. Of the children born to John S. and Mary Mobberly, the following are living: E. T., a minister of the Baptist church in Mississippi; Mary L., who is teacher of English in the Owensboro high

school; Nellie, who remains at home with her mother in Owensboro; and James W., the immediate subject of this sketch.

James W. Mobberly was born in Daviess county on the 1st of November, 1870, and received his education in the district schools of Daviess county and the public schools of Owensboro, after which he took a commercial course in the Spencerian Business College, in this city. His first employment was as the carrier on one of the newspaper routes in Owensboro, his brother, Edward T., carrying the other route. After one year of this work, he obtained a situation as bundle boy for Phillips Brothers & McAtee, where he remained two years, after which he returned to the home farm and assisted his father until he had attained his majority. He then became clerk on the wharf boat and White Collar line, which position he held five years, when he became secretary and treasurer of the Messenger Publishing Company. He held that position thirteen years and then assisted in reorganization of the Messenger Job Printing Company, in which also he was secretary and treasurer for thirteen years. On January 1, 1922, he bought an interest in the Owensboro Planing Mill Company, of which he became secretary and treasurer, which position he still holds. He has been conscientious and faithful in the performance of his duties and has been an important factor in the splendid success which the company has enjoyed.

On May 12, 1897, in Louisville, Kentucky, Mr. Mobberly was married to Miss Ann L. Stumpf, who was born and reared in Louisville, a daughter of Adam and Margaret (Deuser) Stumpf. Her father was born in Germany in 1836 and died in Owensboro in 1916, at the age of eighty years. He owned considerable real estate in Louisville and Owensboro and at the time of his death was retired from active business pursuits. Margaret (Deuser) Stumpf was born near Charlestown, Indiana, and died in Louisville, in 1906, at the age of sixty-three years. They were faithful members of the Lutheran church and Mr. Stumpf was a democrat in his political faith. Mrs. Mobberly was graduated from the Louisville high school and then from Shurtleff College, at Alton, Illinois. She is an active member of the First Baptist church, is superintendent of the primary department of the Sunday school and is a president of the Woman's Missionary Society. To Mr. and Mrs. Mobberly have been born two sons: Eugene Stumpf, born March 25, 1900, was graduated from the Owensboro high school, after which he attended Purdue University, at Lafayette, Indiana, and Georgetown College, at Georgetown, Kentucky, and is now superintendent of the Owensboro Planing Mill Company. James Sloane, born June 3, 1903, was graduated from the Owensboro high school and is now bookkeeper in the Owensboro Banking Company. He was married to Miss Hazel Ball, daughter of A. R. Ball, of Detroit, Michigan, formerly of Owensboro. Mrs. Mobberly has a brother, Rev. J. H. Stumpf, who is a Christian Alliance minister at Newark, New Jersey.

Politically Mr. Mobberly has been a lifelong supporter of the democratic party and maintains a deep interest in public affairs. During the World war he took an active part in the Liberty loan and Red Cross drives and supported every local, war activity. He is a deacon in the First Baptist church and is teacher of the Baracca Bible class. Fraternally he is a member of Owensboro Lodge, No. 130, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons; Joe Daviess Chapter, No. 32, Royal Arch Masons; Owensboro Council, No. 34, Royal and Select Masters; Owensboro Commandery, No. 15, Knights Templar, and Kosair Temple of the Mystic Shrine, at Louisville. He is also a member of the Rotary Club and the Chamber of Commerce. He is a citizen of high civic ideals and has manifested his interest in connection with all measures calculated to advance the general welfare of the community. He has been in the truest sense the architect of his own fortune and is well deserving of the high place which he holds in the regard of his fellowmen.

A History of the Daviess-McLean Baptist Association in Kentucky, 1844-1943, by Wendell H. Rone, 1943, Messenger Job Printing Co., Inc., Owensboro, Kentucky, pp. 441-442:

Miss Nellie Mobberly was born near Masonville, Daviess County, Kentucky, and was brought by her parents to Owensboro, Kentucky, at a very early age. She professed faith in Christ at the age of sixteen and was baptized into the fellowship of the First Baptist Church by Rev. Fred D. Hale. She soon thereafter moved her membership to the Walnut Street Baptist Church. She was a member of the Third Baptist Church for some time and remained a member there until the year 1921 when she united with the Buena Vista Church where she still holds her membership.

She has been very active in the work of the W. M. S. in the Churches and has served as President of the Walnut Street and Buena Vista Societies. She served for four years as the Assistant Superintendent and for six years as the Superintendent of the Daviess-McLean Associational W. M. U. She has taught a Sunday School class almost from the time of her conversion. Her parents were John S. and Mary Martin Mobberly. She attended the Owensboro public schools and has been a keeper at home during most of her adult life. Miss Nellie is a faithful worker in her Church and in the Associational W. M. U. and her friends are numbered by the acquaintances she has made through the years. Her consecrated life has been an inspiration to all who know her.

Notes by the contributor: John G. Mobberly appears in the 1810 Prince William County, Virginia, census record. His eldest son, Wm. Payton Mobberly was born there. John G. Mobberly had seven children by his first wife, and none by his second wife, Nancy Haynes, daughter of Josiah Haynes (1772-1856) and first wife, Judith New, of Amherst County, Virginia, and Ohio County, Kentucky. He and his second wife, Nancy Haynes, are buried in the Mobberly family cemetery near Masonville, Kentucky, as are four of his children: Win. Payton Mobberly

and wife; Mrs. Mary Ann Haynes, Mrs. Elizabeth K. Britton, and Remus G. Mobberly. John G. Mobberly's will is recorded in Daviess County, Kentucky.

Mary Ann Mobberly married as first wife, Francis Wright Haynes, born 22 Aug. 1809, died 22 Nov. 1877 Ohio County, Kentucky, son of Josiah Haynes and first wife, Judith New. Her husband, Francis Wright Haynes, is buried in Old Panther Creek Baptist Cemetery, Ohio County, Kentucky, near Whitesville, Kentucky.

Tabatha L. Mobberly married 1852 Daviess County, Kentucky, Frederick C. Pettit.

Lewis Bland Mobberly died 30 Dec. 1893 York County, Nebraska. His first wife, Susan Sanford Owen, died 8 Dec. 1866 Clay County, Illinois, was a daughter of Robert Owen (1784-1861) and Rhoda McGee, of Breckinridge and Ohio Counties, Kentucky.

Delila Mobberly and husband Bradford Whitler (or Whitton) lived near Fordsville, Kentucky.

Miss Nellie Mobberly (1877-1966) of Owensboro, Kentucky, who had this family record for many years was a daughter of John Simpson Mobberly, and granddaughter of Wm. Payton Mobberly. Her sister, Miss Mary Lou Mobberly, was a high school English teacher in Owensboro.
