

Tichenor Family

The Tichenor family of Ohio County, Kentucky are descendants of Martin Tichenor, who took the oath of allegiance at New Haven, Conn, in August 1644. Connecticut's coast was discovered by a Dutchman named Adriaen Block in 1614. A few years later, the Dutch from New York tried to establish a colony at the present site of Hartford, but it lasted only a few years. For many years after that, most settlers of Connecticut were of English origin, coming either from England direct or migrating south from other areas of New England. The first permanent English colony was made by colonists from Massachusetts in 1633, at the present site of Windsor.

It is believed that Martin Tichenor was of French origin, but no record of him before he took the oath of allegiance at New Haven in 1644 has been found. He was married by the governor to Mary Charles on May 16, 1651, she was the daughter of Rev. John Charles. Martin and Mary Tichenor resided at New Haven, on the Connecticut coast, about 60 miles northeast of New York. They were members of the New Haven Church, the birth of four of their children were recorded there. A five acre lot he owned in New Haven he had acquired from his father-in-law, John Charles.

Rev, John Charles came from England to Charlestown Mass., in 1636, only 16 years after the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock. Shortly after he sold his "lot" and settled at New Haven, Conn. He married Sarah, the widow of John Geare (The Abridged Compendium of American Genealogy, Vol. I, Virkus, p,96). Rev, John Charles died in 1673 His son, John Charles, Jr. was born in 1649, married Abigail, and moved to Springfield, Mass.

On October 2, 1666 Martin Tichenor sold his lot in New Haven, Conn. to Henry Glover. Earlier in 1666 he had joined a party of about 30 families who sailed from Milford, Conn. to the Passaic River in New Jersey, a little west of the settlement at New York. They traveled by sea and in May 1666 landed in New Jersey. The site on the New Jersey coast they settled later became the city of Newark, today New Jersey's largest city, having a population of over 400,000, and is the courty seat of Essex County.

On June 24, 1667 Martin Tichenor and Daniel Tichenor were among 41 inhabitants of the new settlement who signed "the Fundamental Agreement", their first articles of government. The relationship of Daniel Tichenor to Martin Tichenor is not known. Martin had a son, Daniel, but he was then only 10 years old. The older Daniel was no doubt of close relationship to Martin, possibly a brother or maybe even his father. Since Daniel did not take possession of any land in

the settlement he may have lived with Martin Tichenor's family or died soon after signing the charter.

In 1667 Martin Tichenor, like the other first settlers, was granted a lot of 6 acres in Newark. He died in 1681 having made his will at Newark on October 19, 1621. New Jersey continued to be the home of most of Martin Tichenor's descendants until after the Revolution. In 1977 Harold A. Tichenor, of Napton, Missouri, a fifth great-grandson of Martin Tichenor, wrote a book entitled: The Descendants of Martin Tichenor: A History In The Making.

Martin Tichenor, like all of the first settlers at Newark, was a member of the Congregational Church, a Protestant sect in which each local church has free control of its own affairs. Congregationalism arose out of a revolt in 16th and 17th century in England of separatists against formalized worship and state control of Established Church (the church of England or Anglican Church). The Pilgrims brought Congregationalism to America in 1620. In New Jersey descendants of Martin Tichenor later became members of the Presbyterian Church. Members of the family who migrated to the Kentucky frontier in the late 18th century became members of the predominant church on the frontier, the Baptists.

Martin Tichenor in his will in 1681 named five children: John, Daniel, Samuel, Jonathan Tichenor and Abigail wife of John Treat, A daughter named Hannah was born March 13, 1659 and died before her father's will in 1681. Abigail Tichenor was born February 1, 1654 and married John Treat. They resided at Newark, N.J., where she died April 1, 1713. They had no children.

John Tichenor was born April 14, 1653 in Conn., he was baptized in the Milford Church February 8, 1657. He married Hannah Baldwin, daughter of John Baldwin and Hannah Osborne. John Tichenor wrote his will at Newark, N.J. on May 18, 1695 and it was proven on September 10, 1695. In his will he names his wife, Hannah, son Martin and refers to "an expected child". John and Hannah's son, Martin Tichenor, was born in 1688, married Susannah Ball. Martin resided at Newark, N.J., where his will was recorded (Essex County), he died on February 1, 1732.

Samuel Tichenor was born October 14, 1660 in Conn. His wife's name was Hanna. He died at a young age about 1688, when papers regarding the settlement of his estate were recorded in Essex County, N.J. He left a son, Joseph Tichenor.

Jonathan Tichenor, youngest son of Martin Tichenor, was still a minor when his father wrote his will in 1681 and his father designated that he was to live with the family of his sister and brother-in-law, John and Abigail Treat. Jonathan was born about 1663 and was still living in 1693 when he was admitted as a planter in Newark, N.J.

Daniel Tichenor, son of Martin Tichenor and Mary Charles, was born August 9, 1656 in Conn. His wife's name was Elizabeth. He resided at Newark, Essex County, N.J., where at the

age of 71 he wrote his will on November 4, 1727, it was probated on June 18, 1728. In his will he describes himself as a yeoman, which is defined as one of a class of free-landowning farmers who were just below the gentry in English society. Daniel Tichenor owned several tracts of land. In his will he named his wife, Elizabeth, sons, Joseph, John, Daniel and daughter Jane Tuttle.

Daniel Tichenor appointed his wife, Elizabeth, and John Baldwin Jr. administrators of his estate. Daniel's brother, John Tichenor, had married Hannah Baldwin, a daughter of John Baldwin, who was born 1644 and died 1688. Members of the Baldwin family were among the party of families who had accompanied the Tichenors from Milford, Conn. to New Jersey in 1666. Generally an administrator of an estate is someone who is closely related, though not always true, sometimes a trusty friend was chosen. The John Baldwin Jr. who Daniel Tichenor appointed as co-executor of his estate may have been an in-law, which if true would suggest that Daniel's wife may have originally been a Baldwin.

Daniel's son, John Tichenor, lived at Newark, N.J. and had sons: John, Ezekiel and Daniel. Daniel's son, Daniel Jr. also continued to live at Newark, N.J. Daniel Tichenor Jr. was born about 1704 and died January 2, 1776, his wife was named Susanna. His children were: Aaron, Daniel, Isaac, David, Elizabeth, Mary, Unice, Dorcas, Catherine and Phebe. Mary and Phebe married men by the name of Meeker. Aaron lived Essex County, N.J., married Sarah, and died between 1816-1819; his children were: Thomas Brown, Isaac, Enos, Silas, William, Aaron, Lewis Tichenor, Sarah Campbell and Hannah Earl. Daniel Tichenor lived at Newark, N.J. and died in 1831; his children were: Isaac, Gabriel Tichenor, Sarah Lyon. Rachel Harrison and Abby Freeman. Isaac Tichenor, son of Daniel (c1704-1776), was born at Newark, N.J. on February 8, 1754; he graduated from Princeton College and became a lawyer. In 1778 he moved to Bennington, Vermont, where he opened a law office. Isaac Tichenor became the fourth (1797-1807) and sixth (1808-1809) governor of the state of Vermont. A biography of the life of Isaac Tichenor was published in the book The National Cyclopaedia of American Biography, Isaac Tichenor died on December 11, 1838 at Bennington, Vermont and was buried in the Village Cemetery in Old Bennington. He had no children

Joseph Tichenor,, son of Daniel and Elizabeth Tichenor, was born at Newark, N.J. sometime between 1680 and 1690. His wife's name was Elizabeth, it is not known what her maiden name was or if she was Joseph's only wife. Between 1725-1730 Joseph Tichenor left Newark in Essex County., where his family had lived for about 60 years., and moved west about 20 miles to Morris County, N.J., where he settled neat Morristown. In 1731 he acquired land in New Vernon, a few miles south of Morristown. A second tract of land was purchased in 1739. He also acquired land in Morris County in what was known as the "Turkey Pasture" from the heirs of William Penn, it was located in the Great Swamp, which is now a wild life preserve. His family were members of the Presbyterian Church at Morristown. When he wrote his final will Joseph described himself as a shoemaker.

On March 1, 1750 Joseph Tichenor wrote his will and one month later on April 5th, it was proven and recorded in Morris County, N.J. On May 4, 1750 his wife, Elizabeth, qualified as the administrator of his estate. Sometime between that date and November 6, 1751 Joseph's widow, Elizabeth, married Samuel Wade. In Joseph Tichenor's will five children were named: Joseph, James, Daniel, Moses and Jane.

Joseph Tichenor, Jr., born about 1744, married a Miss Day (note: on his grandfather, Daniel Tichenor's will in 1727 Phebe and Mary Day were witnesses). Moses Tichenor, son of Joseph Sr., born about 1743, married Margaret Jackson, and died in Allegany County, Maryland about 1796.

Daniel Tichenor, son of Joseph Tichenor (Martin-Daniel-Joseph-Daniel), was born in 1742 in Morris County, N. J. He married twice; about 1763 he married Catherine Wade and on May 6, 1776 he married Mrs. Anna (Byram) Condit. They were Presbyterians and the births and baptisms of most of their children were recorded in the Morristown Church. Several years before the Revolution he purchased a farm in Morris County, on which he lived about 15 or 20 years. During the Revolutionary War Daniel Tichenor served in both the Minute Men and Militia from Morris County, N.J. In 1776 he was one of sixty Minute Men of the company of Capt. James Wheeler who signed a petition to the Provincial Congress of N.J. concerning the company's reorganization. New Jersey was known as "the pathway of the Revolution", Washington's army crossing it several times and several major engagements taking place on its soil. At Morristown, N.J., near the home of Daniel Tichenor, Washington and his army spent two brutal winters (1777 and 1779-80), the winters immediately before and after Washington's encampment at Valley Forge. Daniel Tichenor served as a private and corporal in Col. Silvanus Seely's Eastern Regiment of the Morris County Militia under Captains Isaac Halsey, Crane, and Stephen Baldwin. He appears on the militia rolls as a private in the company of Capt. Halsey's, from Parsippany, without date. On the rolls of Capt. Crane's company dated May 7, 1778 he is listed, no rank was given. He was in active service as a Corporal under Capt. Baldwin, June 7 to 14, 1780 and was at the Battle of Connecticut Farms, New Jersey, June 7, 1780. Following the war he received certificate No.108, dated May 3, 1784, and signed by Silas Condit for 1 pound, 9 shillings, 4 pence for the depreciation of his Continental pay in the Morris County Militia.

On January 8, 1776 Catherine Wade, wife of Daniel Tichenor, died, she was about 39 years of age. The following month on February 26th, Sarah, a child of Daniel and Catherine, died, her age is not known. Following his wife's death Daniel left with seven small children, the youngest one year old, he married on May 6, 1776 Anna Byram, the widow of Peter Condit.

Considerable history on the ancestry and family of Peter Condit and Anna Byram was included in the book Genealogical Record Of The Condit Family, compiled in 1885 by Jotham Condit and Eben Condit and revised and published by the Condit Family Association in 1916. According to this record Anna Byram's first husband, Peter Condit, son of Peter, was born April 8, 1744 and died July 14, 1774. Peter and Anna Byram Condit had three children: Edward,

Byram and Lewis. Edward Condit was born- November 15, 1769 and died December 7, 1856 in New Jersey. Byram Condit was born August 22, 1771, moved to Ohio County, Ky. in 1805, where he drowned in 1816 at Condit's Ferry (row Point Pleasant) on the Green River; he married Mary Lindley. Lewis Condit was born March 3, 1773, lived at Morristown, N.J. and died after 1856; he was a member of the U.S. Congress, serving in the House as a Representative of his native state of New Jersey. Anna Byram Condit Tichenor was the daughter of Ebenezer Byram and Abigail Alden, and was born in New Jersey in 1750. Her great-great-great-grandfather, John Alden, arrived with the Pilgrims on the Mayflower in 1620, and is said to be the first European to set foot on Plymouth Rock.

In 1790 Daniel Tichenor exchanged his farm in Morris County, N.J., with Capt. John Howell, for 2500 acres in what is now Ohio County, Ky. The land was located where the Green and Rough Rivers meet, in the area known as "the Point". The deed for the tract was recorded in Nelson County, KY, in 1790 this region of Western Kentucky was part of Nelson County, in 1792 it became part of Hardin County and in 1798 Ohio County. In September of 1790 Daniel Tichenor removed his family to Kentucky. He was disappointed to find the Green River region still a wilderness, with Indians, wild animals and few settlers. He decided not to settle on his newly acquired land instead chose to make a home for his family near Bardstown (the county seat of Nelson County, Ky.), then the nearest settlement on the frontier. He first settled a short distance north of Bardstown on Cox's Creek and five years later moved to a farm on Plum Run Creek, about five miles northeast of Bardstown and about 1½ miles south of the present community of Fairfield. In 1796 he purchased two tracts on Plum Run Creek in Nelson County, a total of about 300 acres. He kept his land in Ohio. County, Ky., in the Nelson County tax lists he is shown as paying yearly taxes on the land in Ohio County in addition to his land in Nelson County. In 1799 he bought another 150 acres from John Howell which joined his other tract in Ohio County on the west.

When Daniel Tichenor came to Kentucky in 1790 he was 48 years old and had twelve children, all of whom accompanied him to Kentucky. His four oldest children had married before making the trip. James Tichenor (1794-1886), a son of Daniel Tichenor and Anna Byram, in 1858 wrote an article giving his recollections about his parents, their trip to Kentucky, and information and history of their family. The article, "Reminiscences of the Tichenor Family" was published in 1970 in the Kentucky Family Records, a quarterly of the West-Central Kentucky Family Research Association, Owensboro, Ky. (Vol. I, pp.53-58).

At the age of 62 Daniel Tichenor died on April 12, 1804 and was buried in a family cemetery on his farm in Nelson County, Ky. In November 1804 his wife, Ann, went on a trip to Morristown, N.J. to visit her three sons by her first marriage to Peter Condit. In May 1805 she returned to her home in Nelson County, Ky. She was accompanied by her son, Byram Condit and his family, and also by the families of Uzal Condit (a nephew), Daniel Prudden, Abraham Lindley and Daniel Lindley. Later that year, Anna's sons, Byram Condit, Jared and Jonas Tichenor, along with the Prudden and Lindley families that had come with them from New

Jersey journeyed from Nelson County to Ohio County, Ky. There they settled along the Green River, in the vicinity of the village now called Point Pleasant, formerly called Condit's Ferry and Lindley's post office, and near the lands, owned by Daniel Tichenor. Timothy Tichenor, a son of Daniel by his first marriage, was the first of his family to make his home in Ohio County, having gone there in 1803.

Daniel Tichenor wrote his will on April 27, 1803 and it was recorded on May 14, 1804 in Nelson County, Ky. (will book A. pp.788-791). He willed his farm in Nelson County to his wife, Anna, and to their seven children after her death. To his four sons by his first marriage (Joseph, Daniel, Jacob and Timothy) he gave to each 600 acres of his lands in Ohio County, the other 250 acres of his Ohio County land he gave to his son, James.

Anna Byram Tichenor, widow of Daniel, continued to reside on their farm in Nelson County, where she died on July 8, 1826 at the age of 76. She was buried in the "Tichenor Cemetery" by the side of her husband. The Tichenor Cemetery is off of the Plum Run Road, a short distance south of Fairfield in Nelson County. At least five of Daniel Tichenor's sixteen children, as well as many other descendants, are buried in this cemetery. In 1974 a Revolutionary Soldier marker was placed on Daniel's grave by the DAR. The following inscriptions are on the gravestones of Daniel and Anna Byram Tichenor:

Sacred To The Memory of Daniel Tichenor, a native of N. Jersey, who emigrated in 1790, Died Apr. 12, 1804, aged 62 years. At home in N. Jersey he enjoyed the confidence and esteem due to him as a Christian in faith and practice continuing steadfast until death. Reader would thou follow him to glory. Then copy his right example. There is rest in heaven sacred to the memory of Anna, widow of Peter Condit & of Daniel Tichenor, born in N. Jersey 1750, moved to Kentucky 1790, died July 8, 1826 aged 78 years. Tho dead she yet speaketh saying "I have found salvation by the cross. Reader Hast Thou?"

Daniel Tichenor and his first wife, Catherine Wade, had the following children; Joseph, Daniel, Phoebe, Jane, Elizabeth, Jacob, Timothy and Sarah. Sarah died in childhood on February 26, 1776 in New Jersey. Jane married Jacob Marsh on October 2, 1788 in Morris County, N.J. Phoebe married a Sutton. Elizabeth, her half-brother James Tichenor wrote, never married and died in an institution in Kentucky about 1800. In 1803 Jane Marsh, Phoebe Sutton and Elizabeth Tichenor were named in their father's will. It is not known where they lived, in the early tax and census records of Nelson County, Ky. no Marsh or Sutton families could be located.

Joseph Tichenor was born between 1760-1770 in Morris County, N.J. He married Theodoria Rose. In Nelson County, Ky. he bought land adjoining his father's farm, on Plum Run. About 1834 Joseph died in Nelson County, he probably was buried in the Tichenor Cemetery on his father's farm. Joseph and Theodoria Tichenor's children were: John T., Lewis, Nancy, Sarah, Mary, Hannah and Moses. John T. Tichenor in the early 1820's moved to Ohio County, Ky.,

where he died between 1840-1842. Lewis Tichenor married Susannah Bryant, he lived in Shelby and Spencer Counties, Ky. before moving to Clark County, Ill. about 1840, where he died in 1849. Nancy Tichenor married William Barker. Sarah Tichenor married James Thomas, both Nancy and Sarah preceded their father in death. Mary Tichenor married John Thomas and Hannah Tichenor married a Mr. Hambaugh. Moses Tichenor married Nancy Wills and Judith Hardesty, after Living in Nelson County for a number of years he removed to Spencer County, Ky., where he died about 1865.

Daniel Tichenor, son of Daniel Tichenor and Catherine Wade, was born in 1764 in Morris County, N.J., He married Hannah Colyer (Collier) before moving to Nelson County, Ky. with his father in 1790. He resided in Nelson County on a farm adjacent to the farm owned by his father. Daniel Tichenor Jr. died in Nelson County on December 13, 1832 and was buried in the Tichenor Cemetery. He and his wife Hannah had seven children: Thomas, William, Mary, Ebenezer, Daniel Nelson, Collier and Timothy. Daniel Tichenor following his wife's death married Nancy King, they did not have any children. Thomas married Hannah Lucas, resided in Nelson County. He died April 19, 1853., William,. Ebenezer and Daniel Nelson Tichenor about 1836 moved to Gibson County, Ind., William married Charity Lagrange, Ebenezer married Susan Conner and Peggy Barker. Daniel Nelson Tichenor married Jane Clover and Emily Garland, and died in Gibson County, Ind. on February 11, 1872. Mary married Christopher Gordon. Collier married his cousin, Anne Tichenor, daughter of Jared Tichenor and Martha Bennett, about 1830 Collier Tichenor moved to Ohio County, Ky. and settled on land acquired by his grandfather in 1790, he died in Ohio County on February 11, 1886 and was buried in a family cemetery on his farm, the cemetery is today known as the Bell or West Point Church Cemetery and is located at-Matanzas. Timothy Tichenor married Jane Culverson and Emiline O'Neal, he purchased his brother's and sister's interests in his father's farm and he lived there the remainder of his life. His death occurred on March 30, 1888.

Jacob Tichenor, son of Daniel Tichenor and Catherine Wade, was born on April 8, 1773 in Morris County, N.J. In Nelson County, Ky. on December 29, 1791 he married Nancy Boswell, she died between 1797-1802, and on December 22, 1802 in Shelby County, Ky. he married Fanny Bryant. Soon after marrying in 1791 he left Nelson County, and moved to Shelby County, Ky., where he lived several years. He later moved to Spencer County, Ky. where he died on February 23, 1853. His sons James Boswell and George Tichenor lived in Spencer County, James married Mary Lowe Pittenger and died in 1867, George married Sarah Ruble and died in 1860. Jacob Tichenor had at least two daughters, Nancy who married a Mr. Pittenger and a daughter who married a Collier.

Timothy, Tichenor, son of Daniel Tichenor and Catherine Wade, was born on January 16, 1775 in Morris County, N.J. He was one week short of his first birthday when his mother died and he was 15 years old when he came to Kentucky with his father in 1790. At the age of 21 in 1796 he first appeared in the tax records of Nelson County, Ky. In the same year he purchased 40 acres on Plum Run Creek in Nelson County next to his father's farm. Shortly afterwards he went

to Hardin County, Ky., where he married Elizabeth Humphrey on April 20, 1797, she was a daughter of John Humphrey of Hardin County. After their marriage they resided in Hardin County for about six years, he is listed in the tax lists of Hardin County from 1797 to 1802, in 1802 he paid taxes on 150 acres on Baron Creek.

In late 1802 or early 1803 Timothy Tichenor moved to Ohio County, Ky., he first appears there, in the 1803 tax list. He settled on a 600 acre tract of land which he inherited from his father, it was located along Rough Creek in the vicinity of the Walton's Creek Baptist Church. He spent the rest of his life in Ohio County and is listed in each of the censuses of Ohio County from 1810 through 1850. He was the first of the Tichenor family to make his home in Ohio County settling on the land his father had acquired in 1790. About three years later his half-brothers, Jared and Jonas Tichenor, moved to Ohio County and several years later his nephews, John Tichenor (son of Joseph) and Collier Tichenor (son of Daniel) also came to Ohio County to live. Timothy and Elizabeth Tichenor were charter members of the Walton's Creek Baptist Church which was organized in 1814. In 1823 he left the Walton's Creek Church because of a dispute over a business deal he had with Thomas Ashby, another member of the Church. No record could be found where he rejoined the church. In his later years he sold his farm to his son-in-law, Jacob H. Igleheart, whose family he lived with in his last years.. Elizabeth Humphrey Tichenor died sometime between 1840-1850 and Timothy Tichenor died in 1856, he was 80 years old. It is not known where they were buried at, they may have been buried at the Walton's Creek Cemetery, where a son, James, who died at a young age was buried and where several of their grandchildren who died at young ages were also buried.

Timothy and Elizabeth Humphrey Tichenor had eight children who reached maturity, they were: Daniel E., John, Mary, Sarah, James, Rolla, Anna and Benjamin Tolbert. Daniel E. Tichenor was born March 4, 1798, married Jane Bennett, lived near Equality in Ohio County, where he died on May 14, 1863 and was buried at the Nellie Davis Cemetery. Daniel E. and Jane Bennett Tichenor had ten children: Elizabeth Ann, Mary, Edward, Benjamin Franklin, Martha, Elvira, Isaac, Washington Bennett, Amanda Jane and James Lewis. John Tichenor, son of Timothy and Elizabeth, was born in 1800, married Sarah Blevins, and died in 1855; he resided in Ohio County but it is not known where he was buried at. John and Sarah's children were: Jared, William Riley, John J., Arena, Jacob, Martha A. and Daniel. Two of John and Sarah's sons died during the Civil War, Jared died on July 2, 1862 at the General Hospital in St. Louis, Mo. from wounds he received at the Battle of Shiloh in April of 1862, he was taken back to Ohio County and buried at the Walton's Creek Cemetery, and John J. died on September 19, 1862 in the Battle of Chickamauga in Georgia, he was a member of Co. A of the 17th Ky. Infantry of the Union Army.

Mary Tichenor, daughter of Timothy and Elizabeth, was born about 1802, married Thomas Bennett, lived in Ohio County and died following 1860. Thomas and Mary Bennett's children were: John T., Sarah Ann, Timothy S., Lucinda Emaline, Luticia, Uzal C., Isaac N., Martha E., James Garnett and Daniel B.

Sarah Tichenor, daughter of Timothy and Elizabeth, was born December 14, 1803 in Ohio County, married Aquilla Field. In the minutes of the Walton's Creek Baptist Church it was recorded that on November 22, 1823 that Sarah Field requested and was granted a letter of dismissal. Sarah Field Tichenor at this time must have left Ohio County since no record of her was found in any of the later censuses of Ohio County. In the book The Descendants of Martin Tichenor. A History In The Making it was recorded that she died on May 8, 1893, the source for the date, where she died and information, on her family, if any, was not given.

James Tichenor, son of Timothy and Elizabeth, was born about 1807 in Ohio County. On May 3, 1832 he married Polly Hill in Muhlenberg County, Ky. A mystery is presented by James and his wife's monument in the Walton's Creek Baptist Church Cemetery in Ohio County, etched on an old tablet style monument is the following: "Jas. Tichenor died October 1833, his wife Polly Tichenor died same minute; Jas. Tichenor 26 years old when he died, his wife 22 years old when she died". At the time of his death he owned 125 acres and following his death his brother, Rolla Tichenor, was appointed administrator of his estate.

Rolla Tichenor, son of Timothy and Elizabeth, was born in 1811 in Ohio County. He married Elizabeth Humphrey and by their marriage had two children: George Humphrey and Thomas J. Following his wife's death Rolla Tichenor married Mrs. Christina Ferguson, they had no children. He died in 1853 at Columbus, Ky. His son, George Humphrey Tichenor, born April 17, 1837 in Ohio County, became one of the most widely known members of the Tichenor family. He was a military officer and war hero, serving as a Captain in the Confederate Army, in the Civil War, he was wounded four times. He was a physician, an administrator and an inventor. He is best known for his invention of the antiseptic "Dr. Tichenors", a widely merchandised and distributed product, in the South it has become a household item and is frequently seen in TV, magazine and newspaper advertisements. Dr. Tichenor died in New Orleans, La. on January 14, 1923.

Anna Tichenor, daughter of Timothy and Elizabeth, was born June 25, 1812 in Ohio County. On September 17, 1829 she married Jacob Henderson Igleheart. They purchased the farm owned by her father, Timothy Tichenor, and they resided there the remainder of their lives. Anna died on May 7, 1860 and her husband on August 19, 1871. They were buried in the Patterson - Igleheart Cemetery at Matanzas in Ohio County. Twelve children were born to their marriage: Betsy Mary, William Bell, Benjamin Tolbert, Matilda J., Rebecca Ursula, Levi Judson, John Collins, Nancy Sydney, Edwin C. Macay, Sallie Christine, Lula Melvin and James Wade.

Benjamin Tolbert Tichenor, son of Timothy, and Elizabeth, was born December 23, 1814 in Ohio County, he was named after Rev. Benjamin Tolbert, the first pastor of Walton's Creek Baptist Church. He married Martha Ann Jackson and they had nine children: Amanda Jane, George Wesley, Thomas Cicero, Sallie Mary, Elizabeth Eunice, William Franklin, Fidelia and Artelia who were twins, and Tolbert Davis. After his wife's death in 1872 he married Mrs. Martha J. (Kerrick) Nichols, they had no children. Benjamin T. Tichenor lived in McLean

County, Ky., and died on June 5, 1893, he and members of his family were buried in the "Tichenor Cemetery" in McLean County.

Daniel Tichenor (1742-1804): and his second wife,. Anna Byram, had eight children: Peter, Jared, Sally, Jonas, Anna, Silas Condit, James and Ebenezer (he died in 1796 at the age of 18 months). The last three were born in Nelson County, Ky. and the others were born in Morris County, New Jersey.

Peter Tichenor, son of Daniel Tichenor and Anna Byram, was born on March 27, 1777. On September 3, 1797 he married Frances Cotton in Nelson County, Ky. They lived in Nelson County where he died in 1822, he was probably buried in the Tichenor Cemetery on his father's farm but he does not have a monument in the cemetery. Soon after his death his widow, Frances, along with most of their twelve children left Nelson County and moved to Vigo County, Indiana, she died there about 1830. Their children were: Zachariah, Byram, Anna, Ira, Calvin, Laura, Emily, Silas, Keller, William, Mildred and Peter. At least one of their children, Zachariah, remained in Kentucky; he married Elizabeth Taylor and resided in Daviess County, Ky., where he was listed in the 1850 census. In 1857 he was listed in the tax records of Ohio County, Ky. Byram married Eunice Kester and died in Vigo County, Ind. in 1852. Anna married John D. Cotton. Silas married Lettisha Sparks. Keller married Sarah Pound, Mildred married William K. Drake and died in Vigo County, Ind. in 1858, and Peter married Jemima Reed.

Jared Tichenor, son of Daniel Tichenor and Anna Byram, was born on February 28, 1779. In Nelson County, Ky. he married Martha (Patsy) Bennett on January 4, 1803, She was born on August 30, 1780 in Virginia and was the daughter of Thomas Bennett and Nancy Ann Tillett. Thomas Bennett (1754-1824), a Revolutionary soldier, came from Loudoun County, Virginia and settled in Nelson County, Ky. and about 1805 along with members of the Tichenor family moved to Ohio County, Ky. Five of the children of Thomas Bennett and Nancy Ann Tillett married into the Tichenor family; Martha married Jared Tichenor, Margaret married James Tichenor (son of Daniel), Sarah married Jonas Tichenor (son of Daniel), Thomas married Mary Tichenor (daughter of Timothy) and Jane married Daniel E. Tichenor (son of Timothy).

Jared Tichenor about 1805 moved to Ohio County, Ky., he is listed first in the tax records there in 1806, in 1805 he was listed in Nelson County. His home and farm in Ohio County was located just south of the Rough Creek on the Carter's Ferry Road about 2½ miles northeast of the Walton's Creek Church. Jared Tichenor lived there until his death on October 21, 1867, his wife preceded him in death on October 13, 1853. After his death his son, Milton, lived on the same place until his death in 1881. The firm was later owned by Mrs. Kate Oglesby who about 1952 sold it to the Beaver Dam Coal Company. The Tichenor home stood on the west side of the road and on the other side of the road on a knoll was a family cemetery were Jared Tichenor and members of his family were buried, after the coal company bought the property those who were buried there were moved to the Centertown Cemetery, where Jared and Martha Tichenor have monuments. Jared Tichenor following his wife's death married. Rose Bryant of Spencer County,

Ky. Jared and Martha Tichenor were charter members of the Walton's Creek Baptist Church, which was founded in 1814. He was the first clerk of the church and served in that capacity 41 years, 1814-1855. He also served as Justice of the Peace a number of years, and was Sheriff of Ohio County four years. Jared and Martha Bennett Tichenor were the parents of nine children; Thomas, Ann, Warren Cash, Alney, Sally, Sanford, Manley Berry, Squire Jared and John Milton. All of their children lived and died in Ohio County, except Manley B., who lived in Daviess County, Ky. Thomas married Frances N. Bryant, his cousin, she was the daughter of Aaron Bryant and Anna Tichenor. In 1843 Thomas was ordained a minister at the Walton's Creek Baptist Church, he died December 24, 1854 of pneumonia. Ann married her cousin Collier Tichenor, son of Daniel Tichenor and Hannah Colyer; she died on March 28, 1872. Warren Cash married Lydia Tichenor, daughter of Jonas Tichenor and Sarah Bennett, he married second Mrs. Martha E. (Miller) Hocker; he died on November 12, 1894. Alney married Amelia Rowe and died October 6, 1858. Sally married Isaac Brown and died August 26, 1859 of consumption. Sanford married Nancy Jane Wade and died September 18, 1882. Manley Berry married Altha Whitaker and died October 2, 1908. Squire Jared never married and died of typhoid fever on September 12, 1857. John Milton married Elizabeth Jago and died February 26, 1881.

Sally Tichenor, daughter of Daniel Tichenor and Anna Byram, was born in June 1781. In Nelson County, Ky. on November 28, 1801 she married Nicholas Langsford, a native of England. They lived in Nelson County, he died in 1833 and she followed him in July 1845, they were buried in the Tichenor Cemetery in Nelson County. Their children were: Abigail, Anna, Daniel, Elizabeth, Sally, Lewis G., James Harvey and Nicholas Byram. Abigail married James Thomas and moved to Illinois. Anna married Jacob Connor and moved to Illinois. Daniel married Rebecca S. Stallard and died February 7, 1877 in Nelson County, Ky. James Harvey married Narcissa Dunlap and moved to Illinois. Nicholas Byram Langsford in 1850 was living in Nelson County, Ky.

Jonas Tichenor, son of Daniel Tichenor and Anna Byram, was born August 4, 1784. He married Sarah Bennett on January 5, 1804 in Nelson County, Ky. At the same time his brother, Jared, and members of the Condit, Bennett, Prudden and Lindley families, he came to Ohio County about 1805. He lived the remainder of his life in Ohio County. His farm was located about a mile east of Matanzas on the old Hartford Condit's Ferry Road (now Highway 85) near the old tanyard where the Grassy Creek crossed the road (where Jim Coleman now lives). About 1880 the Jonas Tichenor home, a log cabin built by him in 1833 was: moved to another farm about a mile northeast of its original site, half of the cabin erected on the farm now owned by Cola James on the Horace Martin Road still stands today.

Jonas Tichenor married three times, his first wife, Sarah Bennett, died October 11, 1837. He married second Susan T. Nall on January 17, 1839 in Muhlenberg County, Ky., she was born in 1814 and died November 13, 1851. He married third Mrs. Lucy (Davis) Harsher on August 17, 1852 in Ohio County, she was born January 15, 1794 and died August 2, 1860. Jonas Tichenor died on April 9, 1867, he and all three of his wives were buried in the Walton's Creek

Baptist Church Cemetery. He had been- a charter member of the church in 1814 and on August 15, 1814 along with Joseph Warden was chosen the first deacons of the church. Jonas Tichenor reared a family of sixteen children, by his first wife Sarah Bennett he had: Silas Condit, Bennett, Margaret, Byram, Jaames, Lydia, Aaron, Jane, Martha and Lewis C. By his second marriage to Susan T. Nall he had: John N., Mary Ann, George W., Martha, Alice and Susan. He and his third wife did not have any children. Silas C. married his cousin, Sally Bryant, daughter of Aaron Bryant and Anna Tichenor; he died of consumption on June 21, 1852. Bennett married Angeline Condit and died January 16, 1865. Margaret married David Imbler and died February 24, 1836. Byram married Eliza Melton and died January 5, 1899. James in 1850 was single and resided with his brother, Bennett; he was still living in Ohio County in 1863. Lydia married Warren Cash Tichenor, son of Jared Tichenor and Martha Bennett, she died April 1, 1853 of consumption. Aaron married Elizabeth Jane Lindley and left Ohio County after 1840. Jane married John Render and died April 4, 1887. Martha died in her teens during the 1830's. Lewis C. married Martha Jane Tichenor and died March 18, 1900; he was ordained a Baptist minister on October 5, 1863 and at various times pastored churches in Ohio, Daviess, Mclean, Hancock and Henderson Counties, Ky., many people throughout the Green River country professed religion under his preaching and united with the church. John N. died about 1874 in Henderson County, Ky. Mary Ann married Mahlon Pruden, they lived in Henderson County, Ky. George W. died after 1872. Martha died after 1872. Alice died at the age of 13 on February 7, 1861. Susan died at three months of age on February 2, 1852.

Anna Tichenor, daughter of Daniel Tichenor and Anna Byram, was born August 13, 1786. On May 20, 1805 she married Aaron Bryant in Nelson County, Ky.. Anna Bryant died on June 6, 1842 and Aaron Bryant died September 5, 1866, he was born March 21, 1779 in Orange County, Va. They lived in Nelson County, Ky. and were buried in the Tichenor Cemetery there. They had ten children: Fanny, Sally, Drusilla, Silas James, Jane, Martha, Thomas P., Ebenezer, Mandavill and Aaron. Fanny married Thomas Tichenor, son of Jared and lived in Ohio County, Ky., where she died after 1870. Sally married Silas Condit Tichenor, son of Jonas, and lived in Ohio County, Ky., where she died after 1870.. Thomas P. married Eliza McDonnall and lived in Spencer County, Ky., died after 1887. Ebenezer died at the age of 21 in 1838, Mandavill died at the age of 25 on September 2, 1852. Aaron died at the age of 21 on June 6, 1851.

Silas Condit Tichenor, son of Daniel Tichenor and Anna Byram, was born January 6, 1792 in Nelson County, Ky. He married Susanna Ruble on June 10, 1812 in Nelson County. He bought the interests of his brothers and sisters in his father's farm on Plum Run Creek and lived there the remainder of his life, his son Edward lived on the same farm until his death in 1904. Silas C. Tichenor died March 26, 1845 and his wife, Susanna, on August 28, 1853; they were buried in the Tichenor Cemetery. They had the following children: Edward Condit, Isaac R., Sally Ann, Lydia, Fanny M., Ann Ruble, Catherine N., Susan J., Silas M. and James Byram. Edward C. married Elizabeth Tichenor, lived in Nelson County and died December 4, 1904.

Sally Ann married Isaac Tichenor. James Byram Tichenor married Kate Thixton and died between- 1858-1872.

James Tichenor, son of Daniel Tichenor and Anna Byram, was born October 12, 1794 in Nelson County, Ky. In Ohio County, Ky. he married Margaret Bennett on March 31, 1814. She was born September 16, 1790 in Virginia and was the daughter of Thomas Bennett and Nancy Ann Tillett. Following their marriage they resided in Nelson County for several years before moving to Spencer County, Ky. during the 1820's. His wife died on February 2, 1865 and he married second Mrs. Jane Steel Hedges on May 12, 1868. In 1858 he wrote a short history of his family entitled "Reminiscences of the Tichenor Family" (Kentucky Family Records, West-Central Kentucky Family Research Association, Owensboro, Ky., Vol. I, 1970, pp.53-58). James Tichenor died in Spencer County, Ky. on March 8, 1886 at the age of 91, he and his first wife were taken back to Nelson County and buried in the Tichenor Cemetery, where his parents had been buried. His second wife, Jane, died June 5, 1900 at Fairfield, Nelson County, Ky., no children were born to their marriage. James Tichenor and Margaret Bennett had nine children: Martha Ann, Joseph Lapsley, Jared, Thames Bennett, Isaac Taylor, Silas, James Lewis, Mary Isabell, and Samuel Bennett, Martha Ann married Allen H. McKay, lived in Spencer County and died December 30, 1858. Joseph L. married Mollie E. Payne and Harriet Davidson, and died in Cloud County, Kansas. Jared married Elizabeth Bocler and Mary E. Thomes, lived at Vigo County, Ind., where he died December 24, 1861. Thomas B. married Elizabeth Stanley, died in Fulton, Missouri in 1895. Isaac Taylor married four times, Monimia Clementine Cook, Emily C. Boykin, Lulah Boykin. and Eppie (Reynolds) McGraw; he became a celebrated Baptist minister, he was long time secretary of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, he died in Atlanta, Georgia on December 2, 1902. Silas married Fanny Beckham and Melvina D. Weld. James Lewis married Roxie Cooper and Louisa Ellen (Parsons) Melvin, he died at Napton, Missouri on August 17, 1897. Mary Isabell died at the age of seven or February 23, 1840. Samuel Bennett died at the age of two on October 11, 1837.
