# West-Central Kentucky Family Research Association Owensboro, KY (WCK:FRA) File (1968-2014)

Thomas W. Westerfield (1926-1980) was the first director of the Kentucky Room at the Daviess County Public Library. He was also an avid genealogist and was the founder of the West-Central Kentucky Family Research Association (for short WCK:FRA). He had conceived the idea for the organization and named its two publications, The Bulletin and The Kentucky Family Records. In a memorial to him by WCK:FRA it was stated "In his work at the library he observed persons working on the same families who did not know each other, and he envisioned an organization to bring them together to share data and to help each other." The group was organized at a meeting at his home with three other founding members, Michael James Edgeworth (1927-1981), Margaret Simons Alford (1930-2008) and Elizabeth Smith Cox (1901-1999), in May 1968.

On 10 January 1969 Thomas W. Westerfield, president of WCK:FRA, was the speaker at a meeting of the DAR chapter at the Owensboro Public Library. At this meeting he outlined the purposes of this new organization as: To encourage and to further genealogical research; to collect and to preserve family genealogical records of

Western Kentucky; and to encourage public officials to make genealogical records available to persons who wish to do research. In 1969 he published the first of five volumes of Kentucky Genealogy and Biography. This series was a reprint of the biographical sections of Kentucky: A History of the State, originally published by J. H. Battle, W. H. Perrin & G. C. Kniffin in 1885-6. This made available information from this scarce and previously unindexed cornerstone of Kentucky genealogy.

Beginning in September 1971 the Kentucky Room at the Daviess County Public Library in Owensboro became the repository for the books purchased by West-Central Kentucky Family Research Association (WCK:FRA). In the library board minutes of 21 July 1971 it was noted that a research and genealogy group had asked permission to place their collection in the library. It was agreed that the group would place their books in the Kentucky Room on an indefinite loan and with the stipulation that they could be withdrawn with a 30-day notice. Their books are catalogued by the library and contain a label of ownership by West-Central Kentucky Family Research Association. By the end of November 1971 WCK:FRA's first installment of thirteen books had been delivered to the library and by April 1973 a total of one hundred eighty volumes, not including periodicals, had been placed in the Kentucky Room.

For the period between July 1976 and April 1978 the placement of books in the library by WCK:FRA was temporarily halted until new guidelines and policy were worked out between the group and the library board. The interruption had been initiated by the library board's request that the group give up ownership of all books placed in the library and their proposal of a new guidelines policy that placed restrictions on what could be accepted. Several on the library board believed a private collection should not be maintained in a public library. A compromise was worked out and it was agreed that the books placed in the library by WCK:FRA were like before on indefinite loan and could be removed with a 30 days written notice, but the library could reject any materials that did not fall within their new guidelines policy. Margaret Alford, one of the four founding members of West-Central Kentucky Family Research Association, has served the group since its inception as librarian, acquisition chairman and editor of their publication The Bulletin. In 1985 Mrs. Alford reported that the group had donated about \$30,000 in books to the Kentucky Room. A recent count of WCK:FRA books in the collection showed a total of 1,712. In addition to this they also have 495 hardbound and 51 loose bound volumes of periodicals. The total cost of these materials would be in excess of \$50,000.

In 2011 the organization, West-Central Kentucky Family Research Association, moved from Owensboro, KY to Calhoun, McLean County, KY. In addition to the group's files, the collections of the Society of Kentucky Pioneers and of the McDowell Publications (materials of the late Samuel McDowell) were relocated to Calhoun. In 2014 the West-Central Kentucky Family Research Association ceased to exist. The group's collections subsequently became part of the McLean County History & Regional Family Research Center (540 Main Street, P.O. Box 291, Calhoun, KY 42327).

The organization had published a wealth of genealogical data in their long time publications, <u>The Bulletin</u> and the <u>Kentucky Family Records</u>. They also published over forty other books of census, cemetery, family bibles and county records on Daviess County and surrounding counties, including Breckinridge, Butler, Edmonson, Grayson, Hancock, Hardin, McLean, Muhlenberg and Ohio. In 1992 in commemoration of Kentucky's Bicentennial they published the book, <u>Kentucky Honor Roll of Ancestors</u>. Their members devoted many hours volunteering to microfilm the pre-1900 Ohio County Circuit Court files.

A "SURNAME FILE" is being prepared to bring together persons working on the seine families and to promote the exchange of material between them. Your membership registration will be used to add your family names to the file immediately.

Several interesting projects and programs are being planned for the near future, and your suggestions and participation will be welcomed. The activities will be designed for the beginner as well as for the more experienced.



# IN MEMORY MICHAEL JAMES EDGEWOJITH 3 April 1927 - 24 January 1981

Michael J. Edgeworth, of 127 17th Street, Owensboro, died on 24 January at the V.A. Hospital in Louisville, KY. He was the child of Myron Edgeworth of Kankakee, IL and Georgia Tapscott of Owensboro, as were Nancy Ruth and Myron, Jr. Mike's father was president of Lehigh Stone Company in Illinois until his death in 1942. His mother than returned with her children, to Owensboro and entered the Florist business with her mother and two brothers, James A. and Terril Tapscott.

Mike graduated from Owensboro Senior High about 1945 and was president of his class. He attended Blackburn College, Indiana University, University of Kentucky, Kentucky Wesleyan College. He served in the United States Marine Corps. He worked for Airlines in ticket sales, as timekeeper at Owensboro Sewer Pipe Company, as payroll clerk for various pipeline construction companies, and was part owner of Tapscott Florist with other family members. His interests were duplicate bridge, stamp collecting, stock market, antiques, history and genealogy. Mike was a diabetic along with his sister, his uncle Terril, and grandmother Nancy Ruth Tapscott. He suffered poor health for many years. He was never married. He is survived by his brother, Myron, sister-in-law, niece Harriet and nephew Myron H. Edgeorth.

1968, Michael Edgeworth was one of four individuals who organized West-Central Kentucky Family Research Association. His knowledge of the families of Daviess and surrrounding counties was tremendous. He had done much abstracting of courthouse records, and when his health permitted, contributed regularly to "Kentucky Family Records" with cemeteries, family and court records. His collection of genealogical materials is to be presented to WCK:FRA by his brother, Myron, and family.

# ELIZABETH SMITH COX January 1901 - 15 September 1999

Elizabeth Smith Cox, 98, of Calhoun, McLean County, KY died Wednesday, 15 September 1999, at the Riverside Manor Health Care Center in Calhoun. She was born in Guffie, McLean County, KY, graduated from Beech Grove High School and attended Western Kentucky State Teachers College in Bowling Green. She obtained her teaching certificate, after which she taught at several one-room school houses, including Guffie and Licks Branch. She was a member of Oak Grove United Methodist Church.

Mrs. Cox was a member of the Captain William Rowan Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution for over thirty years. She presented many historical programs pertaining to McLean County. She received the National Seimes Microfilm pin and several letters of award from National and State officers. She served as Registrar of the Chapter for many years and was a Kentucky Colonel.

In May of 1968, Mrs. Cox was one of the four founders of our West-Central Kentucky Family Research Association. (The other three were T. W. Westerfield, Michael J. Edgeworth and Margaret S. Alford.) She served as Editor of Kentucky Family Records from its beginning in 1970 through 1988 when failing eyesight made it necessary for her to give it up. She and a coworker copied almost all of the cemeteries in McLean County, and her work made possible the publication of two volumes of cemetery records by WCK:FRA. With Mike Edgeworth, she made possible the annotated publication of the 1860 Census of McLean County (the first census of the county and another WCK:FRA book). She was a "walking history book" and always ready and able to help anyone in area family research. She compiled a book "Guffie Through the Years".

Survivors include her daughter, Dixie Wayne Cox Crawley (Mrs. Herb Crawley); a granddaughter, Kathleen Crawley Vandiver (Mrs. Joe Vandiver) and a grandson, Tommy Crawley. Services were held at 11 a.m., Monday, September 20th, 1999 at Muster Funeral Home, in Calhoun, Kentucky. Burial was in Calhoun Cemetery beside her husband, Edgar Lee Cox, who died 15 August 1994.


Cemetery and a member of Richardsville Homemakers. She was a daughter of the late Royce E. Simons and Daisy Shelton Simons.


