James Robinson (c1745-1805) of Shelby County, KY

James Robinson, this writer's fifth great-grandfather, was married to Elizabeth Fulton; it is possible he had a previous marriage. James based on the births of his children was probably born about 1745. He is believed to be the son of James Robinson, yeoman, whose will was recorded in Augusta County, VA, written on 11 December 1770 and recorded in 1776, naming wife, Jane, & children - William, George, David, James, Joseph, John Robinson and Sarah McMullen (Augusta County, VA Will Book 5, pp483-484). Jane/Jean Robinson, daughter of James & Elizabeth (Fulton) Robinson married James McMullen (1788). They were cousins. James McMullen was a son of Edward McMullen, who left a will in Botetourt County, VA in 1788 (Botetourt County, VA Will Book A, p260). Edward McMullen & Sarah Robinson were married in Augusta County, VA on 16 May 1759. Edward McMullen like James Robinson owned land on Dunlap's Creek, a tributary of the Jackson River in Botetourt County, VA. James, Elizabeth & Jean Robinson were witnesses on the will of Edward McMullen.

The Robinson family is believed to have lived in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania prior to members of the family moving to Augusta County, Virginia. A lot of the Scotch Irish that moved into the Augusta County area of VA came from Lancaster County. Members of the family resided in the part of Augusta County, VA that became Botetourt County, VA in 1769.

James & Elizabeth (Fulton) Robinson were living in Botetourt County, Virginia by 1771. Charles T. Burton in the book, <u>Botetourt County</u>, <u>Virginia Early Settlers</u>: From the Earliest Times Through 1795, in the Area that was Botetourt County in 1782: Covers Parts of Present-day Counties of Montgomery, Bath, Giles, Floyd, Alleghany, Roanoke, Craig, and Monroe (1979) groups the county's earliest land grants through 1795 under each settler's name. The following are listed for James Robinson, and wife Elizabeth, who owned land on Dunlap Creek and at Rich Patch Mountain, and who in 1795 were residents of Bath County, VA (letter B in left column = Botetourt County and DB = deed book- page):

James Robinson is referred to in the following passage from the book, <u>Kegley's</u> <u>Virginia Frontier</u>, B. F. Kegley (The Southwest Virginia Historical Society, Roanoke, VA, 1938) pp447-448 (the writer is speaking of events circa 1771):

COMMUNITY LIFE ALONG THE JAMES

The road up the river from Pattonsburg and Looney's Ferry has ever been a matter of general interest. The Indians knew a way through the gorge. But Col, Skillern, Malcolm Allen and John Bowen needed a wagon road. Each in turn was responsible for the condition of the road bed. At the beginning of the new county John McClure, who had a mill up stream, and Thomas Reid were appointed Surveyors of the road from Walter Stewart's (Pattonsburg) to Lawrence's, the tithables belonging to those Precincts to attend the Surveyors accordingly, Col. Smith and George Skillern to proportion them between the said surveyors. Continuing up the river Joseph Carpenter, Thomas Kelly and John Crawford were to view the way leading from Crawford's to Peter Wright's on James River. Peter Wright's was at present Covington, so this order with certain descriptions in land entries shows that the junction of Jackson's River with the James at that time was at that point. George Skillern and Caleb Worley succeeded John McClure on the lower end of the road before the end of a year. George Poage, Samuel Lawrence and James Robinson viewed a way from Michael Kirkham's to the Pedlar Ford on the river and got a road established with James Young and James Cloyd as Surveyors, the people for five miles on each side to work on it. Mathew Arbuckle, Robert Gillespie, John Robinson and William Hugart reported that it would be impossible to establish a road from Jacob Persinger's to the Forks of Dunlap's Creek. Later Peter Wright, John Robinson and Edward McMullin were appointed to find a way through from Wright's to Sweet Springs. Jacob Persinger took the place of William Dougherty as overseer from the county line by the Cowpasture to the Red Hill, and Mathew Arbuckle took the place of William Gillespie.

Edward McMullen in the preceding paragraph was the brother-in-law of James Robinson. Robert Gillespie referred to is the father of James Gillaspy, who married James Robinson's daughter, Mary (1785). William Gillespie, who is named is the grandfather of William Gillespie, who married James Robinson's daughter, Araminta (1809).

Three of James Robinson's daughters were married in Botetourt County, VA – Mary in 1785, Sarah in 1786 and Jane in 1788. In 1790 Bath County, VA was formed out of parts of Botetourt, Augusta & Greenbrier Counties, VA. In 1792 James was living in Bath County, VA, where his daughter, Elizabeth, was married in 1792. Subsequently James owned land in the Western part of Virginia that is now part of West Virginia. During 1795-1796 he moved to Madison County, KY. In Madison County, KY his daughters, Jane was married in 1794 and Rebecca in 1796. In the early records of Madison County, KY there are several James Robinsons / Robertsons. In the 1795 Madison County tax list there were four listed.

James Robinson and his son-in-law, Benjamin Midkiff are listed in the 1796 tax list of Madison County, KY. Some of his children prior to this were living in Madison County. His son-in-laws, John Sawyers, James McMullen and Robert Carson are first listed in the Madison County tax lists in 1790. In 1797 James Robinson and his son-in-laws, Benjamin Midkiff and James Gillaspy, appear for the first time in the tax records of Shelby County, KY. His son-in-laws, Robert Carson and John Sawyers were also residing in Shelby County by 1799. In Shelby County, KY four of the daughters of James & Elizabeth Robinson were married – Nancy in 1805, Margaret in 1806, Charlotte in 1808 and Araminta in 1809. James Robinson died in Shelby County in 1805 and his wife, Elizabeth died after 1808.

James & Elizabeth Robinson were also found in the following records:

- 3 August 1771 received a new grant of 117 acres on Dunlap Creek in Botetourt County, VA, patent book 40, p790 (<u>Kegley's Virginia Frontier</u>, B. F. Kegley, 1938, p440)
- 10 June 1772 a list of tithables in Botetourt County, VA on Jackson River, including CowPasture and down James River as low as James Lawrence included: James Robinson, Edward McMullin, John Robinson, John Robinson, James Galaspy, John Galaspy, Robert Galaspy, Robert Galaspy, William Galaspy
- 10 August 1773 purchased 100 acres at the mouth of Dunlap Creek in Botetourt County, VA from Alexander Dunlap (<u>Botetourt County, Virginia Early Settlers</u>, Burton, 1979)
- 8 August 1775 sold 117 acres on Dunlap Creek in Botetourt County, VA to John McAllister, received as a new grant on 3 August 1771 (<u>Botetourt County, Virginia</u> <u>Early Settlers</u>, Burton, 1979)
- 14 November 1775 sold 95 acres on side of Camp Mountain in Botetourt County, VA to William Lawrence (<u>Botetourt County, Virginia Early Settlers</u>, Burton, 1979)
- 1782 in Botetourt County, VA tax list, assessed taxes on 100 acres (<u>Botetourt</u> <u>County, Virginia Early Settlers</u>, Burton, 1979)
- 24 October 1783 received a grant of 99 acres in Botetourt County, VA on the side of Rich Patch Mountain near Dunlap Creek a tributary of the James River, patent book I, p88 (Kegley's Virginia Frontier, B. F. Kegley, 1938, p440)
- 7 January 1786 Sarah Robinson married John Sawyers in Botetourt County, VA; consent signed by father, James Robinson
- 1787 tax list of Botetourt County, VA district of William Davidson includes James Robinson, James Gillaspy, James McMullin and John Sawyers
- 15 March 1788 Jane Robinson married James McMullen in Botetourt County, VA, consent given by parents, James & Elizabeth Robinson
- 1 January 1793 Elizabeth Robinson married Benjamin Midkiff in Bath County, VA; consent signed by father, James Robinson
- 10 February 1795 James Robinson & wife, Elizabeth, "of Bath County, VA" sold 99 acres in Bath County, VA at Rich Patch Mountain to Samuel Porter (he had obtained this from a new grant issued to him on 24 October 1783 (<u>Botetourt</u> <u>County, Virginia Early Settlers</u>, Burton, 1979)
- 1796 tax list of Madison County, KY

- 11 February 1796 Rebecca Robinson married Lindsey Carson in Madison County, KY; her father, James Robinson, signed consent
- 27 March1796 James Robinson "of Madison County, KY" purchased 1,000 acres on Fox Run & Bullskin Creeks in Shelby County, KY from Stephen May for 100 pounds (Shelby County, KY Deed Book B, pp53-54)
- 1797-1805 tax lists of Shelby County, KY; the 1797 list shows James Robinson with 1,000 acres on Fox Run & Bullskin Creeks, the 1803 & 1804 lists show him with 332 acres on Bullskin Creek and the 1805 list breaks down the 332 acres into three tracts 84 acres Bullskin Cr., 138 acres Bullskin Cr. & 100 acres Fox Run Creek; in the 1806 Shelby County tax lists the 84-acre tract is shown under James Robinson's son, John, and the 100-acre tract is listed under James' son, George; John & George in the 1805 list were shown with no land holdings
- 19 August 1800 James Robinson granted power of attorney to "my trusty friend George Robinson" to transact business for him in the state of Virginia to demand and recover possession of land at the mouth of Elk River in Kanawha County, VA from Andrew Donnally and to give Andrew Holeman possession (Shelby County, KY Deed Book D, pp262-263) [James Robinson had originally obtained 200 acres from Philip Cooper and on 12 October 1799 rented it to Andrew Holeman; Kanawha County was formed in 1788 and in 1853 became part of the new state of West Virginia, Charleston the county seat is situated at the mouth of Elk Creek & the Kanawha River, which flows south from the Ohio River; at the time Andrew Donnally, Sr. & Jr. were living in Kanawha County, VA. Andrew Donnally, Sr. served as sheriff and as the first representative of Kanawha County in the Virginia assembly when the county was formed in 1788 and for a time lived on Elk Creek]
- 21 January 1801 James Robinson sold 676 acres on Bullskin & Fox Run Creeks to Samuel Shannon for 5 shillings, part of original survey of William May (Shelby County, KY Deed Book D, p421)
- 2 February 1801 James Robinson, of Shelby County, KY purchased from Samuel Shannon & wife, Martha, for 89 pounds a tract of 138 acres on Bullskin Creek in Shelby County, KY (Shelby County, KY Deed Book D, p429)
- 1804 Shelby County, KY tax lists reports that James was the owner of 3 slaves
- 2 March 1805 in Shelby County, KY Nancy Robinson, "daughter of James Robinson" married Stephen Allen, Jr.
- 23 May 1805 James Robinson wrote his final will and it was probated in Shelby County, KY in August 1805. Abstract – wife, Elizabeth, shall continue to live on land on which he now lives and be maintained. To son, George, 100 acres of land purchased from Samuel Shannon adjoining lands of Robert Carson & Robert Simonton. To son, John, remainder land purchased from Samuel Shannon, 13 ¹/₂ acres purchased from Robert Simonton and land purchased from Stephen May on which I now live. Remainder of estate to be divided among my daughters: Sarah Sawyer, Mary Gillespy, Jean Carson, Elizabeth Metcalf, Rebecca Carson, Peggy Robinson, Nancy Allen, Minty Robinson, and Charlotte Robinson. Slaves that he possesses shall remain on home plantation for the maintenance of his wife & unmarried children. My Negro man Moses may be sold. To grandson, Joseph Metcalf, 100 acres on Fox Run waters on which Benjamin Metcalf now lives. My granddaughter, Elizabeth Fulton Gillaspy, is to be raised & maintained among my

daughters, with her grandmother, until she be 25 years of age or be married. Names as executors: wife, John Sawyer & Stephen Allen. Also refers to Benjamin Metcalf, John Sawyer and Stephen Allen but does not state relationship [they were his son-in-laws] (Shelby County, KY Will Book 2, 1804-1811, p33-35)

- 3 October 1805 an inventory & appraisal of the estate of James Robinson, deceased, made by Samuel Vancleave, Benjamin Yeates, John Ford, William Eddy and Elizabeth Robinson; recorded in April 1806 (Shelby County, KY Will Book 2 pp84-87)
- 29 May 1808 Charlotte Robinson married John Fuqua in Shelby County, KY, on marriage it was written "daughter of Elizabeth Robinson"
- 24 January 1809 Araminta Robinson married William Gillespie in Shelby County, KY, on license it was recorded "daughter of James Robinson deceased"
- 4 January 1822 the following legatees of James Robinson, deceased, late of Shelby County, granted power of attorney to John Gillaspy, of Shelby County, KY, to settle our business in the state of Virginia, to determine rights to certain lands of the said James Robinson at the mouth of Elk Creek & Kanawha River in Virginia and to convey their interest in land – John G. Moore & wife Jane (late Robinson) of Shelby County, KY; Benjamin Midkiff & wife Betsey (late Robinson of Ohio County, KY; Stephen Allen & wife Nancy (late Robinson) of Shelby County, KY; John Gillaspy & wife Peggy (late Robinson) of Shelby County, KY; William Gillaspy & wife Araminta (late Robinson) of Shelby County, KY; John Fuqua & wife Charlotte (late Robinson) of Henry County, KY; document was recorded in Shelby County, KY on 15 October 1822 (Shelby County, KY Deed Book S1, p470) [5 children of James Robinson were not referenced in the document – Mary, Sarah, Rebecca, George & John]

- Mary Robinson, 'Polly', was born 1765-1770 VA. She married James Gillaspy (c1759-c1800), 25 January 1785 Botetourt County, VA and James Connell, 15 March 1820 Henry County, KY. Children of Mary & James Gillaspy were –

 - William (1786-after 1860), married Leah Connell
 - James Fulton (c1788-1846), married Nancy T. Calloway & Susan Spencer

 - Robert (1793-1849), married Nancy Agnes Montgomery
 - Elizabeth Fulton (1795-c1815), married William McWilliams

John Sawyers was born 1760-1765 VA. He was the son of Sampson Sawyers & Agnes McGray, who were married in 1759 in Augusta County, VA. John Sawyers is listed in the 1790-1796 tax lists of Madison County, KY and the 1799-1814 tax lists of Shelby County, KY. In 1805 John Sawyer & Stephen Allen were named as co-executors of the estate of James Robinson. In the 1810 census of Shelby County, KY 6 males and 5 females were listed in his home. In the 1814 tax list he was assessed taxes on 100 acres on Bullskin Creek. John Sawyers died 1814-1815 Shelby County, KY. In August 1815 in Shelby County an inventory & sale bill of the estate of John Sawyers, deceased, was ordered to be recorded (Shelby County Will Book, 1815-1818, p29). In the 1815 Shelby County tax book his wife, Elizabeth Sawyers, appears in his place, she was listed as being taxed on 96 acres on Bullskin Creek. Elizabeth Sawyers in listed as a household head in the 1820 census of Shelby County, KY. Elizabeth is last found in the Shelby County tax records in 1824; she was then taxed on 94-acre tract on Bullskin Creek originally entered in the name of William Shannon. Sarah (Robinson) Sawyers appears to have died 1805-1814. "Sarah Sawyer" was named when her father, James Robinson, wrote his will in 1805. John Sawyers married second Elizabeth (Dinwiddie) McWilliams, 16 September 1813 Shelby County, KY. Elizabeth Dinwiddie was born 28 April 1768 VA and died 14 February 1837 Marion County, MO, she married Hugh McWilliams, who died c1807 Shelby County, KY. Elizabeth's son, William McWilliams, married Elizabeth Fulton Gillaspy, daughter of James Gillaspy & Mary Robinson, and who was named in the will of her grandfather, James Robinson, in 1805. In May 1816 Sampson Sawyers was appointed guardian for Thomas, Jane C., John Franklin & William Sawyers, infant orphans of John Sawyers, deceased (Shelby County, KY Will Book, 1815-1818, p134). In Shelby County in October 1818 the heirs of John Sawyers, deceased, signed an instrument agreeing to pay monies to Elizabeth Sawyers, the administratix of the estate of John Sawyers, under the agreement she would make no future claims against the estate. The heirs signing were – Sampson, Betsey, Nancy, James & George Sawyers, and Sampson Sawyers also signed as guardian for the minor children – Thomas, Jane, William & John F. Sawyers. Rachel Sawyers was not named in the body of the document as an heir but her signature was included in the heirs signing the document (Shelby County Will Book 4, pp217-218). Children of Sarah Robinson and John Sawyers were (birth dates of several of the children were not documented by this writer) –

- Sampson was born 1786 VA. He appears in the Shelby County, KY tax lists in 1808-1815. He was a soldier during the War of 1812. He died after 1818.
- Elizabeth was born 1787-1790. She married Thomas Aldridge, 30 July 1829 Shelby County, KY. On their marriage record it was recorded "daughter of John Sawyers dec'd"
- Nancy. She died after 1818.
- James (? born c1794). He was a soldier during the War of 1812. He died after 1818.
- George was born 1795 KY. He is listed in the 1840, 1850, 1860 & 1870 censuses of Clark County, MO. Married Mary. He died 23 June 1871 and was buried in the Troxel Cemetery, Clark County, MO.
- Thomas Hiram born 11 September 1799 Shelby County, KY. He is listed in the 1830 census of Shelby County, KY, 1850 census of Clark County, MO and 1860 & 1870 censuses of Mendocino County, CA. He married Mary Pierce King (1804-1842), 19 January 1826 Shelby County, KY & Margaret Hay (1825-1914), 6 June 1850 Clark County, MO. Thomas died 25 December 1879 Little Lake Valley, Mendocino County, CA, where he was buried in the Little Lake Cemetery.

- Jane C. (? born c1800). She married Eli Ambrose Troutman (1804-1894), 10 April 1825 Bartholomew County, IN. She died 27 August 1837 Fulton County, IN.
- Rachel born 10 November 1800 Shelby County, KY. She married William Troutman (1802-1887), 19 October 1822 Shelby County, IN. Rachel died 12 October 1869 Fulton County, IN, where she was buried in the Shaffer Cemetery. William Troutman was a brother of Eli Ambrose Troutman, who married Rachel's sister, Jane Sawyers. They were sons of Peter Troutman (1769-1836) & Catherine Spurgeon; Peter Troutman's third wife was Mrs. Mary Robinson, who was the widow of John F. Robinson, son of James & Elizabeth.
- William (? born c1801). He died after 1818.
- John Franklin (? born c1802). He married Mariah Lapsley Moody, 15 July 1830 Henry County, KY.
- 3. George Robinson was born 1765-1778 VA. His father, James Robinson, in his will in 1805 left to his son, George, 100 acres of land purchased from Samuel Shannon. One George Robinson is continuously listed in the 1799-1830 tax lists of Shelby County, KY. The 1799-1805 tax lists show George Robinson with no land and in the 1806 list George is taxed on 100 acres on Bullskin Creek that was originally entered in the name of William Shannon. This appears to be James & Elizabeth Robinson's son. In the following year, 1807, a George Robinson

married Amy Newland in Shelby County, KY. Starting in the 1807 tax list this George's land is listed as being on Clear Creek not on Bullskin Creek. At first glance it seems that the George Robinson, who married Amy Newland, is James & Elizabeth Robinson's son. However, he is clearly not. This George was born 12 October 1771 in Virginia and was the son of John Robinson, of Campbell County, VA, who married Jane/Janet Edgar in 1768. A family bible record of this couple that survives listed then as having a son, George, who was born on 12 October 1771. In the Grove Hill Cemetery in Shelbyville, Shelby County, KY, there is a gravestone for George Robinson, that bears a birthdate of 12 October 1771 and on the same stone is the name of his wife, Amy, who died in 1828. This George is listed in the 1810, 1820, 1830, 1840, 1850 & 1860 censuses of Shelby County. During the years of 1852-1861 the state of Kentucky recorded some vital statistics on the state level. In these records a death record for this George Robinson was recorded - he died in October 1861 of old age, at the age of 90 years, he was a farmer, widowed, born Virginia and he was the son of John & Jane Robinson. In the book, Portrait and Biographical Record of St. Charles, Lincoln, and Warren Counties, Missouri (Chicago, Chapman Publishing Co., 1895, pp200-201) appears a biography of Rev. James Reid. The sketch reports that Rev. Reid was the son of James Reid, Sr. & Miss Lucy (1808-1886), daughter of George and Amy (Newland) Robinson. The biography ends with:

George Robinson, our subject's grandfather, was born in Virginia, October 12, 1771, being of Scotch descent. He removed to Kentucky at a very early day, and there his death occurred during the winter of 1861-62. His wife, Amy (nee Newland), was probably a native Virginian, and died in Kentucky.

George Robinson, son of James & Elizabeth Robinson, appears to be living in 1806. Subsequently no trace of him could be found. The first order book of Shelby County, KY is not indexed and was not searched page by page for a possible reference to George Robinson.

- 4. Jane Robinson was born c1770 VA. She married James McMullen (c1760-1793), 15 March 1788 Botetourt County, VA, Robert Carson (1759-1810), 22 July 1794 Madison County, KY and John Gay Moore, 18 July 1814 Shelby County, KY. Jane Robinson Moore died 1836-1846 Montgomery County, IN, where she was buried. Children of Jane & James McMullen were –
 - John (died infancy)
 - James, Jr. (1792-1846), married Martha Van Cleave, moved to Montgomery County, IN in 1829

7. John F. Robinson was born c1783 VA. He married Polly. He is listed in the Shelby County, KY 1804-1816 tax lists. In the 1810 census of Shelby County, he was shown as being a resident of the town of Shelbyville; in his household were

two males, one age 16-26 & one under 10 and 2 females, one over 45 & one 10-16. He died 1816-1817. John F. Robinson wrote his will on 27 December 1816 and it was recorded in Shelby County in March 1817; to my wife, Polly – plantation on which I live; my three children - George, Matilda, and Joseph; I appoint my wife and my nephew, William Gillaspy, executors; witnesses: John Gillaspy and Samson Marmaduke (Shelby County, KY Will Book 3, p544). Polly Robinson & William Gillaspy were appointed executors of his estate on 17 March 1817. In Shelby County Will Book 4, p11 an inventory (22 March 1817) and a sale bill of his estate (24 March 1817) were recorded and in Will Book 4 p248 a list of monies received by the estate was recorded. His widow, Polly, appeared in his place in the 1817 tax list of Shelby County. Polly married Peter Troutman (1769-1836), 9 November 1818 Shelby County, KY. Polly Troutman died 1824-1827 Bartholomew County, IN. Children of John F. & Polly Robinson were –

- George born 1807-1810 Shelby County, KY, married Angelica Irwin, 20 July 1837 Bartholomew County, IN.
- Matilda born 1810-1815 Shelby County, KY. She married Alonzo Gale (1809-1861), 6 March 1831 Bartholomew County, IN. Matilda died 12 March 1835 Johnson County, IN. - 8. Nancy Robinson was born 1784-1790 VA. She married Stephen Allen, Jr., 2 March 1805 Shelby County, KY.

Stephen, son of Stephen Allen, Sr., was born 1775-1784. He is listed in the 1810 & 1820 censuses of Shelby County, KY. He died in 1823. He wrote his will on 3 October 1818 and it was recorded in Shelby County, KY 17 November 1823; witnesses were George R. Carson & Joel Adams (Shelby County, KY Will Book 6 pp151-152). He appointed his brothers, William & Joseph Allen, executors of his estate. He left his estate to his wife, Nancy Allen, and at her death to his two children, Joseph & Elizabeth. His widow, Nancy Allen, is listed in the 1830 census of Shelby County, KY; in her home was a male & a female, both aged 20-30. Nancy and her two children moved to Montgomery County, IN during 1830-1835. Nancy's brother-in-law, William Allen, also moved to Montgomery County, IN; he married Patsy Kerns in 1802 in Shelby County, KY. Nancy (Robinson) Allen died in 1846 Montgomery County, IN. She wrote her will on 11 January 1845 and it was probated on 10 October 1846 (Montgomery County, IN Probate Order Bok 3, p484). In her will she named two children, Joseph Allen & Elizabeth Jackson. The executors of her estate were her son, Joseph Allen, and her nephew, William Carson. Nancy & Stephen Allen were parents of –

- Joseph, 'Big Joe' born 10 March 1808 Shelby County, KY. He married Margery James (1808-1873), 18 December 1828 Shelby County, KY, daughter of Johnnie James & Martha Kerns. In Montgomery County, IN Joseph served as a justice of the court and during 1847-1851 as sheriff. Joseph died 21 January 1872 and was buried Indian Creek Hill Cemetery in Montgomery County, IN.

The McMullen Family

From notes of James William Van Cleave, Born November 10, 1845, Died October 17, 1925. Son of John Peyton Van Cleave (September 26, 1820 – February 25, 1899) and Marjorie Jane McMullen Van Cleave (December 11, 1826 – April 17, 1905.

The McMullen family is evidently of Scotch-Irish descent. The progenators claimed this, but taking the characteristics of the family, they exhibit but few of the Irish traits, corporal or mental, but seem to belong to the sturdy English and Scotch.

The progenator came to America in an early day, evidently a single man or a single family and settled in the western part of North Carolina where they had a farm and lived for many years. They tilled the soil as it was tilled in that day, being half farmer and half hunter. It is not known just how much land they had, but it amounted to considerable when it was sold many years afterwards. They settled in North Carolina before the Revolutionary War, but it is not known that any of them were in the Army. The family consisted mostly of boys, but there was at least one girl named Sarah.

They lived in North Carolina until after Daniel Boone had settled in Kentucky when three brothers and their families moved to Kentucky. They were disturbed by the Indians and lived in a "block-house" something like a fort. The three brothers were named James, Joseph and John. All were stout, healthy, average men, expert in Indian cunning, accustomed to the life of the bordermen. They were active, swift of foot, adept in athletic sports and while living in the block house were often sent out as scouts to spy for Indians to were molesting them.

The Captive Maiden

There is a story that has been handed down in the McMullen family for generations of the capture of a maiden by the Indians. The girl belonged to the McMullen or Robinson family, is not known which. The story as told by James McMullen Jr. follows.

In the early days in the settlement of Kentucky the people were very much annoyed by strolling bands of Indians, killing their stock, driving off their horses, and sometimes killing the settlers or carrying them into captivity subjecting them to a life of

toil, misery and sometimes death. One of these marauding bands of Indians made an attack upon a little settlement and carried off one of their maidens. A company of twelve men were soon collected and went in pursuit of the girl. They followed the trail of the Indians and came upon them at noon. As they came to the crest they saw the Indians on the opposite ridge, a ravine between the two parties. The Indians had made camp and had kindled a fire and were cooking dinner. The pursuing party looked for the prisoner and saw her sitting upon a log to one side, the young chief by her side with his arm about her waist talking to her. He seemed to have taken a fancy to her and she seemed somewhat reconciled to her captivity. When her brother saw this his blood boiled and he said, "Boys, I cannot stand that." He raised his gun to fire on the Indian Chief. The men tried to dissuade him from his purpose. He was cross-eyed and it was at long range and the girl was near the chief, their heads were very close together and the men thought that under the circumstances he might miss his aim and kill the girl. He told them that he knew what his gun would do, that he would hit the Indian, and that he could not sit there with his arm about his sister. The Chief and the girl had their backs toward the men. The brother raised his gun, which took a large ball, took deliberate aim at the back of the Chief's head and fired. It was a long range for the rifle, but at the crack of the gun the young Chief pitched forward and fell at the feet of the maiden. The bullet had hit him in the back of the head scattering his brains, some on the maiden's clothes. As soon as she heard the crack of the gun she recognized it as her brother's and knew that help was at hand. She whirled quickly over the log facing the men and ran toward her brother and was safe. The other men fired upon the Indians in camp, who taken by surprise fled and were soon lost in the heavy underbrush. Their main object of rescuing the maiden was accomplished and they set their steps homeward and arrived without further incident. The maiden was brave and had borne up under her captivity and fatigue of travel. She knew enough of the Indian nature not to complain, and that to go along willingly was best for her. James McMullen Jr. thinks the man who shot the Indian Chief was named Mitchell, but is not sure. He thinks it was one of his grandfathers, McMullen or Robinson, for his father was a little cross-eyed which could be noticed when he was excited.

The Story of the Adventure of old Joseph McMullen

Old Joe was a brother of James McMullen Sr. He was inured to the life of the border, to all its dangers and hardships. He was skilled with the rifle as were all good frontiermen in Kentucky. He was rather tall, stout, very active and brave. He was an unerring rifle shot. It was then a practice in one of their modes of training to turn parallel to a tolling wheel and fire at it. Someone would start the wheel to rolling and the one with the gun would run parallel with it at a distance of a hundred yards and fire at the wheel. He would practice until he could hit the wheel with every shot. Old Joe could accomplish this feat and thought nothing of it. From childhood he had been brought up on the border, had learned all the tricks and dodges of the Indians as well as those practiced by the frontiermen. He had married and settled down to the life of the border and his log house was built according to the fashion of the times. One morning he went out for his horses and found they were gone - stolen by the Indians. He got his rifle and started on their trail. In a few miles the trail led into a dense cane brake. He was about to enter when he heard, laughing which he knew to be Indians by their course and savage voices. He

sought shelter behind a tree and the next moment two Indians rode out of the brake on his own horse. He raised his gun and fired and they both rolled to the ground having been shot through and through. The next moment the tree behind which he had taken shelter was struck by six balls and the Indians rushed upon him. All the guns were now empty and old Joe fled, the Indians after him. He ran in a zig-zag course, meanwhile loading his gun. He then turned and fired upon the foremost Indiana who fell to the ground dead. Again he bounded in a zig-zag course dodging from tree to tree. His gun again loaded he stopped behind a tree and fired killing another Indian. Then off again he ran as active as ever. The Indians were loading and firing at him but the dexterity of his movements made their aim uncertain. The Indians were in hot pursuit but they could not come up with old Joe. Again he loaded his gun and shot the nearest approaching Indian. He dashed on again pretty well blown. His pursuers were after him like hounds on the trail. His gun reloaded he shot again and the fourth Indian fell in the running fight. He bounded on again and there were only two Indians left of the six that started the fight. Both parties were getting tired as they had run about three miles. Old Joe kept up his zig-zagging and by the quickness of his movements evaded their aim, meanwhile reloading his gun. He dropped behind a tree, took aim at the nearest Indian and fired, the Indian fell to the ground. Old Joe dashed on partly restored by his brief rest. Five of the Indians had now fallen to old Joe's rifle. The remaining Indian did not seem inclined to pursue further. Joe reloaded his gun as he crossed a hollow and coming up on the other side and saw the Indian on the opposite ridge. As soon as the Indian saw him he called out, "Damn you, come back and get your scalps." The Indian then turned and fled into the woods, leaving his dead comrades in the forest to be devoured by the wolves and vultures. Old Joe had made good his escape and concluded to let well enough alone. When he arrived home his horses were there having started home when he shot the Indians off their backs. The Indians often resorted to decoys to trap the whites. They would steal their homes and lead them into a cane brake and lie hidden and rattle the bell that was on the horse's neck to attract the attention of the owner in their direction and shoot him as he came up.

Jumping

One time Old Joe went to a small town on the Ohio River, probably to do some trading. He saw several young men jumping. They were doing very good but Old Joe laughed at them and they said, "You can't beat it." He made three jumps which measured twelve feet or more to each jump. They all tried but could not come up to him. They were such extraordinary jumps that the men set up stones to mark them. James McMullen Jr. said, "I have seen those stones that they set up to mark his jumps, I tried to come up with them but lacked about eight feet." James Jr. was a stout man built from the ground up, well muscled, very active. He could jump up and crack his boot heels together three times before he came down. James Jr. lived a neighbor to his uncle Old Joe. Little is known of John McMullen, brother of James Sr. and Joseph. It is thought he moved to Tennessee.

Life of James McMullen Sr.

James Sr. was a brother to Joseph and John McMullen, he was the eldest and moved to Kentucky with his brothers. He was evidentally born in North Carolina. When a

young man he married Jane Robinson, daughter of Captain Robinson (given name unknown). Robinson and his wife were opposed to the match so Jane ran away and they were married. It was a long time before her parents would forgive her for running away. They would not send her clothes to her. Her mother was more inclined to forgive her than her father. At last her father sent word to her that if she would come and kneel on the floor before him and ask his forgiveness and acknowledge that she had done wrong he would forgive her and she could come home. This was a "bitter pill" for Jane. One Sunday she went over, got down on her knees, acknowledged her wrong and asked forgiveness, and she was restored to her family again. Jane was of an independent will and it was hard to believe she would humble herself, but she did it for sake of the respect of her parents. While the old folks were opposed to her marrying James McMullen, they afterwards liked him very well.

Captain Robinson

A little history might be given of Captain Robinson (his given name is not known at this time, was John or George, probably John). He was a good man, brave and fearless, stout and used to the life on the border. What state he came from is forgotten, evidently North Carolina. He came to Kentucky and soon became known as an Indian fighter. He was feared and hated by the Indians and they often tried to capture him. One day he was taken by the Indians, bound and lead away to their village amid rejoicing that they had their mortal enemy in their hands. He ran the gauntlet and was taken into the council house and his fate decided. He was to be burned at the stake. At the proper time he was lead out and fastened to the stake and dry splinters fitted into his flesh, either by breaking them in the middle and letting them hinge on to his flesh, or sharpening them and sticking them into his skin until his body was filled with splinters so the fire would butt into his flesh causing excruciating pain. They intended to punish him with all the devices of torture that their devilish ingenuity could devise. The fire spread in a circle around him. The yells of the savages rose on the air as though a horde of demons had congregated there. All took part in torturing him, squaws and children as well. The Indians had gotten some whiskey in their forage on the whites. They were drinking and whooping and yelling while they danced around their victim. The Indians got dead drunk and fell asleep. As the fire began to burn a rain came up and wet the thongs that bound him so that he could shift a little, and an old squaw, who was friendly, unbound him and let him go. He escaped just at the dawn of day pulling the splinters from his flesh as he ran through the woods. He made good his escape.

Betsy Robinson, daughter of John [should be James] Robinson married Benjamin Metcalf. Their children were Joseph, John, James and Betsy. Joe married Anna Taylor; James married a girl by the name of Ford, their daughter was named Queen. Mintie Robinson married John (Jack) Galspy, who seemed to be a man of note and of a very good family.

There is a little story of Grandma Robinson when she was a little girl. She was going out one evening to drive the cows up to be milked and decided to ride horseback so jumped on one of the horses standing near. Now this was one of their trained horses that would start at the word "go". She did not think of this when she jumped upon his back and said "go" and away he ran as fast as he could. She had no saddle or bridle and they went flying, jumping over logs and brush. It was all she could do to hold on and when he came to the bars in the pasture fence, he jumped over and ran for a mile or more, his record, and stopped. Grandma was terribly frightened. The horse had been trained to race a certain distance before he would stop. Grandma walked back to the house and took care not to ride that horse again.

Lottie Robinson married John Fiskeway [should be Fuqua]. They moved west and it is not known what became of them. There is a family of "Fiskway" living in Oregon, a very old man and a wife named Lottie. She might have been Lottie Robinson. Nancy Robinson married Stephen Allen. Their courtship was rather romantic. Her father and mother were opposed to the match and would not allow Stephen to talk to her. One day there was a quilting and chopping at a neighbor's house and all the Robinson family was invited. All went but Nancy. The old folks would not let her go lest she be with Stephen, and they sent her to the loom house to weave cloth all day. Stephen came to the chopping and saw that Nancy was not there. He judged where she was and went to the loom house and talked to her until Nancy was called up for dinner. The two came walking in as large as life, arm in arm. The old folks were surprised but said nothing. They saw that Stephen had outwitted them, but they would not give their consent, and Stephen and Nancy ran away to be married. After the marriage the old folks liked Stephen very well.

Nancy had two children, Joseph and Betsy. Joseph was known as "Big Joe Allen" and Betsy was known as "Big Betsy". Nancy and Stephen lived in Kentucky, where he died. After his death Nancy came to Indiana with her children. Betsy Allen, Nancy's daughter, married Griff Jackson. They had two children, Joseph and Nancy Jane, or "Duck" as she was called. They lived in Montgomery County, Indiana, south of Indian Creek in Brown Township. Griff Jackson sold out and moved to Wapello County, Iowa. Betsy died of dropsy in Indiana. She had been ailing for many years but was able to do her work. She was a neat housekeeper. About this time, the son, Joe got mad at some breachy horses of a neighbor and shot the man. He was about to be prosecuted for it and his father, Griff, sent him to Missouri. He then sold his possessions and with his daughter, moved to Missouri, and here their history ends. Joseph Allen, son of Nancy and Stephen, married Margery, daughter of Johnny James. His wife was Patsy or Martha daughter of old Grand Pa Kerns. Joe and Marjorie had several children, Stephen, Lizzie, Albers or "Dick", Nancy, Isaac, Amanda and Andrew Jackson or "Hick" as he was called. Stephen started to Oregon with "Big John" Van Cleave and died on the way. Lizzie married Jake Harris, son of Randolph Harris. "Dock" married a Hannock, had one child, a girl and died. Amanda married James Harris, son of old George Harris, and now lived on the old Allen place. Nancy and "Hick" never married. "Dock" is a farmer and trader. Isaac was educated for a lawyer but soon dropped the profession and now lives in Crawfordsville, Indiana. He is a _____ and his wife is a milliner. Joseph Allen died at his home place in Brown Township, Indiana, in 1881. His estate was bankrupt. He stood very high at one time, held several offices and was Sheriff of the county. He had a good memory for which he was noted.

James McMullen Sr.

James McMullen Sr, and Jane Robinson lived in Kentucky, then a wilderness. They had two children, the eldest evidently named John. He is said to have been an uncommonly smart child but died in infancy. Those were dark days in Kentucky. Bands of Indians were roaming through the forest, people were being murdered, scalped by the Indians and their homes burned to the ground. People fled to the block-house for safety. Scouts were sent out to spy on the Indians, watch their movements and report back to the block-house. It was on such an occasion that James McMullen lead a party of men to scout for several days. That morning he held family worship, as usual, read a chapter from the Bible. sang a church hymn, ate breakfast, took up his gun and accoutrements and marched out of the block-house followed by his men. They marched through the woods all day without seeing an Indian, that is except one man named West. He saw an Indian and dodged behind a tree, the Indian dodged too, and West saw him no more. When they came to their rendezrouz at night and repeated their experiences West wanted to return to the block-house, saying that the Indians would attack at the break of day and kill them all. The other men wanted to camp in the forest and told West he was afraid and James McMullen said. "I never fear danger until I see it." So they camped in the woods, ate supper and went down to a branch, not far away for a drink of water. Then they went back to camp and went to sleep, putting out no guard. Just before day they were aroused from their sleep by hideous yells of savages and the discharge of a rifle. As they rose up they were shot down by the Indians. James McMullen had raised upon his elbow when an Indian shot him in the left breast below the nipple. It was afterwards found that the rifle ball went through his heart. West, alone, escaped unhurt. He started. running towards the block-house with several Indians following him. The moon was shining a little as he ran through the woods he saw the gleam of tomahawks thrown by the Indians, but they did not hit him. It was ten miles to the block-house and the Indians followed him until they heard the dogs bark. West ran on falling exhausted at the gate. He was taken in as soon as the men ascertained who he was. After awhile he was able to speak and told the awful tidings, how all the men were murdered by the Indians, he alone escaping. These were sad times, wives grieved for their husbands, mothers for their sons. As soon as possible a band of men went out to care for the dead. Jane McMullen went along on horseback. The men were all scalped and stripped of their garments, except underclothes. James McMullen's jet black looks of raven hair were gone. People had always admired his luxuriant growth of hair, which came to his sholders, and had predicted someday he would lose his scalp.

They found one man, not yet dead, wounded, shot through the thigh and the bone broken. He managed to crawl away during the confusion and hide in a sink hole near by. The Indians were all round him, and he said, "My heart beat so loud I was afraid that the Indians would hear it and find where I was hidden, but they all passed by." The men hastily threw the bodies in a sink hole and threw dirt, then logs and stones until they were hidden from view. So this was the sad ending of James McMullen Sr. His widow had cause to remember all her life the worship the morning he went away and the hymn he sang and the chapter he read from his Bible. The Indians that killed James McMullen Sr. belonged to the tribe of Potawatanes, and belonged to Cathyzez, north of the Ohio River. James McMullen Sr. was active, fearless, heavy set, a man of bone and muscle, and seemed to be of prominence in the community where he lived. He was a good man, belonged to the Methodist Church, held daily worship, morning and night. He had mild blue eyes and jet black hair. He was beloved by all, honest to a fault and lived the life of a Christian and his untimely death was regretted by all. Thus ended his life, murdered by Indians, sadly buried in a sink hole; no stone to mark the place for the times were too precarious to permit a Christian burial.

After the sad death of her husband Jane McMullen held her abode for awhile in the block-house until peace was restored with the Indians. Then she went to live with her parents. Her eldest child evidently died sometime before her husband was murdered by the Indians. After his death a child was born to them. She called him James for her husband. Jane afterwards married a man named a Carson, evidently Robert Carson. By him she had several children, Lindsey, Billie, Sarah, George, Elizabeth and Andrew. Lindsey married a fine looking woman, black eyes and hair, round face, and clever. He lived in Shelby County, Kentucky. First lived on Bullskin Creek and then moved down on Rough Creek where he died. He left some sons. George Carson, too, had some sons. They tried to secure an estate from cousins in Kentucky that belonged to James McMullen. Billie, Wm. Carson married Lucy Kerns which was not a very satisfactory union. Lucy had a first lover that went to the Indian wars. He was shot and while dying he wrote a note to her in his blood and had it sent to her. He died on the battle field. Lucy cried and went distracted over the letter, so sad a note scrawled in the blood of her lover. She would steal out in the woods and hide and hollow "Whoopee." Her parents thought she was going crazy but her brother. Pete, broke her of such foolishness. He was quite a determined fellow and told Lucy if he found her acting foolish again he would drown her. This scared her for she knew that he would do what he said; so she stopped going out in the woods and acting so strange. She never forgot her first lover and kept the letter. She had a rather disturbed life, fretful and fault finding. Billie could not please her, she said he did not manage well and provide enough. It is probably that he was careless, but generally had plenty. He had a farm and a tan yard and made money, but Lucy would say, "Oh, if I had plenty like Betsy McMullen, I would be satisfied." So she would grumble. Billie and Lucy's children were Robert, Sarah Curander, Joseph, Jane and William. Robert never married. He paid some attention to a widow, Mary Allen. Her maiden name was Stone, first married Peter James, son of John James and by him had one son, named Peter, named for his father. The son died. She then married Jimmie Allen, had two children by him and he died. Jimmie had been her lover before she married James, and after his death one of the Van Cleaves was paying attention to her, but he was cut out when she married Jimmie. Robert Carson's parents objected to her and he went no more and never married. Robert owned a tan yard and made enough money in one year to buy 160 acres of land down by the Thorne family in Montgomery County, Indiana. He sold the farm for \$1200 and kept a store in Brownsvalley. He sold this store and moved to Crawfordsville where he ran a grocery store for many years. May Allen was much older that Robert. May's sister, Lizzie, married a Holloway. He was kin to the Kerns family. Sarah married a Cannine and lived in Brownsvalley. Jane married Josiah Harris, had a family and lived at Ladoga, Indiana. Joe married a Burrus. He was a rough featured

fellow and became a preacher of the Gospel. William (Bill) turned out bad and rough, went to Iowa, then to Missouri. Lucy Carson died somewhere in _____. William Carson died in 1860. Betsy Carson married Brooks Harris. Betsy's mother was opposed to the marriage and tried to persuade her not to marry him. But she would have him and finally her mother said, "Well, Betsy, if you burn your ass you will have to sit on the blister." So Betsy ran off and married. Long afterwards, when her mother came to see them she found them rather hard run. He did not provide well, was away most of the time hauling goods and the like. Betsy said to her mother one day, "Well, Mom, I am sitting on that blister every day." She seemed to regret her choice. She had three children, Billie, Austin and George. It is not known what became of them. Betsy came to see James McMullen, Jr. once, brought her three children with her. They were at meeting when she came and when they returned home, Betsy had baked bread and was getting dinner. James McMullen and wife went to see her once. Sarah married a Bennett, had one child, Rebecca Lottie. She was an active, pert little girl. Her grandmother Carson stayed there a great deal. At times she would get mad at her grandmother and say for spite, "I could see you skinned and your hide stretched on a rail." She was only three or four years old then. Kit Carson's father was a brother of George [should be Robert] Carson and an Uncle to Lindsey Carson. Carson died and Jane Robinson was left a widow again. She had raised her family and by this time was getting old. Her son Andrew Carson was unmarried yet. He was a boatman on the river running flat boats to New Orleans. Jane married again, a man by the name of Gias Moore. She lived with him, it is not known how many years. After his death Jane lived with her children and died at the home of her son, James McMullen, Jr. She broke a blood vessel and bled to death in a few minutes.

James McMullen Jr.

James McMullen Jr. was born April 12, 1792 in Shelby County Kentucky. He was a posthumous child, born after his father was killed by the Indians. He was a healthy child never sick to amount to anything in his boyhood days. One time when he was five he was sick for a week. Nothing seemed to do him any good. As he layed in his cradle looking up toward the left he saw a piece of bacon hanging from a rafter. He pointed up to it and said he wanted some of it. His mother got a piece and broiled it, he ate it and soon was better and was never sick again until the day of his death. He looked very much like his father, deep blue eyes and jet black hair. When he was five or six years old he met with an accident. One day he went into the woods to look for birds nests. He found one in a bush and climbed up to get the eggs, slipped fell and broke his arm. The sharp splintered wrist bone cut through the flesh and stuck into the ground. He was alone in the woods and none to help him. He started home but fainted. When he came to he started to crawl home, as he could not walk, and came near dying before he arrived late at night. His wrist and arm were bandaged and soon were well and never troubled him later on. He cautioned his boys, later on, about climbing trees when they were small. At another time he wandered away with his dog and got lost but thought he knew the way home. His dog would come up to him, whine and start the other way but he would not follow the dog so he kept wandering farther and farther away from home. He saw a man in the woods, but hid from him. Next he came to a field and a house. He started to go through the field and someone from the house saw him and called to him, but he only ran away. At last a little girl came out to where he was and spoke kindly to him. She had been sewing and showed him the thimble on her finger. It was bright and shiny and attracted his attention and she easily led him to the house. They asked his name and he said they called him Jimmie. "But haven't you another name at home except Jimmie?" "What other name do they call you?" they asked. He said, "They call me Jimmie McMullen at home." Then they knew who he was and where he lived. The girl was Nancy Moore. He thought a great deal of her, in fact his young heart waned toward her and he would say, "I love her and am going to have her for my wife." His step-father would say, "How do you feel when you love her and what kind of a feeling is love?" He would put his little band over his heart and say, "Oh, I feel so curious in here." He was but a child and she a young woman, but this was his first love dream. He had wandered about five miles from home.

Next we hear of him going to school in a log school house with wooden benches. The windows were holes out in the logs to let the light in. Books were scarce and often the little ones had the alphabet carved with a pen knife on a board and fastened to their necks with a string. At school Jimmie became acquainted with Martha, or Patsy Van Cleave. She was a small girl and did not like Jimmie very well. She said she would tell lies on Jimmie to get him whipped. She thought him too proud for he had a haughty bearing in his walk. One day while Jimmie was yet small boy his mother was having company for dinner and it was necessary for him to wait until the second table. They had fried chicken that day and as they were about to sit down his mother said "Jimmie, take a little pail to the spring and bring it full of water and put it on the stove to wash dishes with." It was distance to the spring and when he came back he looked at the plate of chicken. The piece he liked was gone, probably the gizzard. He was hurt, thought his mother should have saved it for him and he went out of doors. After the company had eaten his mother called, "Jimmie, come to dinner now." He didn't come and finally she went out to where he was and asked, "Jimmie, why don't you come to dinner?" He said, "I don't want any, the piece of chicken I like is gone and I don't want any." After the company was gone she called him inside to talk about the way he had acted. She determined to punish him for his conduct and sent him to get a switch. She struck him a few licks and one switch broke. He had cut it with his knife so that it broke in two pieces. So she sent him out for another. This time he brought in a rock and handed it to her. "Why do you bring this to me?" she asked. "To kill me with, Mama, and be done with it," he replied. She thought this was an awful way for a little boy to talk and determined to correct him and sent him out for another switch. This time he brought in a limb from a thorn bush with thorns on it. She was vexed at his obstinacy. She took a knife and trimmed the thorns off and whipped him with it, and asked, "Now are you going to act like this again?" But he would not say, "No, Mama." She took him into the house and tied him up with one of the loom cards so his toes just barely touched the floor and whipped him hard. "Now will you act that way any more?" she asked, but he would not say, "No, Mama." She whipped him again and again until the blood ran down his legs and dripped off his toes. She was sorry for the little fellow but tried to conquer him. "Now Jimmie, will you be a better boy and not act this way any more?" she asked. At last he said, "yes". Say "Yes, Mama'," she said. She had to whip him again but finally he said, "Yes, Mama." Then she let him go. She had whipped him more than she intended had he not been so stubborn. Jimmie went out and was gone a long time. She became uneasy and went out to

hunt for him. She found him in a big hollow log sharpening some splinters to stick into his belly to kill himself. She took him to the house convinced that whipping did little or no good and that persuasion was a more powerful weapon to control him with. After this episode, she got along with him very well and soon he was old enough to go to school. James had a religious fervency. He joined the Methodist Church when eleven years old and remained in the church until the day of his death. He believed in the change of heart, the baptism of the Holy Ghost, and experimental religion. He was a good man and lived a Christian life, offering prayer morning and night and returning thanks at all meals. He believed very strongly in baptism. His early life was passed in quiet pursuits and in tilling the soil.

James said that when he was a young man he went one night with some other boys to a neighbor's place to see the girls. There were three girls and they all chewed tobacco, as did all the family. They were twisting up tobacco and gave the boys all the tobacco they wanted. One time James was down in Kentucky and was returning to Indiana and thought he had rheumatism. At a place where he stayed all night they gave him some of the oil of a bald eagle. He often tried to kill a bald eagle but never succeeded.

These were sunny days for James McMullen. He had grown to man's estate. Indian wars were over, the country was settled, farms were cleared and schoolhouses erected. The boys indulged in courting. The object of James McMullen's choice was Martha, daughter of John Van Cleave. She was a modest maiden of fourteen summers, black hair, fine and glossy, eyes of deep blue and graceful form. A love, pure and strong, sprang up between them, though it is said that when they were children going to school Martha did not like James very well, thought him too proud and she would tell fibs on him to get him whipped or punished by the teacher.

She worked in the corn fields at home, for there was but one boy in the family and she had to help with the work. When James was going to call on her he often waited out in the edge of the woods until she went to the house to prepare to greet him. She spread soft to the Van Cleave place to call on her, he often waited out in the edge of the woods until she went to the house to prepare to greet him. She spread soft clay over her arms while at work in the fields to keep them from being browned by the sun, not knowing that James saw her. In the course of time James and Martha were married. The event took place on the third day of October, 1811. When they went to house keeping she did not know how to cut out or make a shirt but by close observation she soon learned. Uncle Andy Carson said she was but a little girl.

Soon they moved to a small tract of cleared land where James had a log house. They lived here for many years engaged in active, hard work. James tilling the soil and Martha spinning, weaving and caring for the house. Here part of the children were born. Anna was the oldest, born July 8, 1815; Emily, March 24, 1817; John, May 6, 1819; Benjamin and Joseph (twins), December 11, 1820; William, March 26, 1823; Lindsey, December 10, 1824; Marjorie Jane, December 11, 1826; James Madison, August 29, 1828. About this time they decided to move from Kentucky to a new land, Indiana, across

the Ohio River. This was richer land with broader farms. Some folks had been over into the new country and brought back glowing accounts; said there were wild hogs so fat they went around with a knife and fork stuck in their back, temptingly saying "come and eat us? So James sold out his land, traded his tobacco patch for a horse, called Beldy, and bought another, old Gray, from Granny Wilson (she was first married to Miles Lane).

James got Uncle Billy Anon to move him out to Indiana. Aaron Van Cleave and old Joe McMullen, his uncle, came with him. They crossed the Ohio River together. There they separated, James going on north and his Uncle on west to the wilds of Missouri. James never saw his Uncle again. He went to Boone County Missouri where he accumulated considerable property. During the Civil War his property was confiscated by bush-whackers. He was last heard from in 1879. James in company with Aaron Van Cleave moved to Montgomery County, Indiana in the central part of the state. Here James began building a log house. They lived a few days at Gabriel Mitchell's until he had completed the house sufficiently to move into. It was not yet finished when there came a snow that drifted down through the board roof on to the beds until they were white with snow. James went to work clearing ground, cutting away trees, making rails, fencing, burning logs, brush, etc. Then he turned the ground up with a shovel, planting corn. The country was wild and Indians were seen now and then prowling or passing through the country. More settlers came in soon, all the land was taken up, and fans were cleared out. These were the days of the log rollings, house raisings, etc. People enjoyed themselves, even if they did see pretty hard times. They were all on an equality, plain people dressed in homespun. They visited much, dinners and the like were given, wood cutting and quilting in the day time and play acting and dancing at night. In the course of time James had his farm cleared and built a better home, more pretentious. It was of hewn logs. It stood north and south with a brick chimney in each end. He buried the brick on the place near Kern's Creek.

After James came to Indiana more children were born to him. Andrew Jackson was born October 14, 1830; Edward Robinson, September, 15, 1832; Francis Marion, October 12, 1834; Lemuel Washington, February 10, 1837 and Sarah Elizabeth, May 10, 1844. She was the youngest and the favorite of her papa. Aunt Nancy Allen came to see them and requested that the baby be named for her, but Grandpa told her that he had the name selected and that it was Sarah Elizabeth. It was a favorite name of his and he prayed on his knees to God that he might have a daughter and name her Sarah Elizabeth. Nancy Allen said she would say no more about the name, though it was a disappointment to her.

James had cleared out a considerable farm with the help of his boys. He bought more land, the Joe Phelps place, and now had three hundred acres or more. He set out an apple orchard just south of the house. He made a trip to Kentucky and North Carolina to get an estate coming to him. He had an adventure on the way back. He was in a lonesome hilly country, in the "knobs." He thought he saw two or three men in his path; finally a man stepped out of the brush in front of his horse and began to talk to him about a great spring of flowing water, which he said was not far away and urged him to go see it. James concluded that they were highway men who wanted to entice him into the woods and rob him of the money from the estate? His only weapon was a stout, heavy pocket knife with a curved blade. He put his hand into his pocket and with his thumb nail drew the blade back as far as he could and let it snap; this made a noise like a cocking pistol. He did this until it attracted the attention of the man who thought he had a pistol in his pocket. Presently they left him and he pursued his way home unmolested. With the money obtained from the estate he purchased more land and had a larger farm. His boys were now large enough to help him very much. Anna, the oldest married Jesse Van Cleave and had one child, Mary Elizabeth. Anna died when about twenty years old of consumption. She was a member of the Christian Church. Emily married Benjamin H. Brown of Kentucky, raised a large family and died May 26, 1879. John married Clara Watkins, had one son, James and died of consumption. Marjory Jane married John Peyton Van Cleave. William married Catherine Coons, had several children and moved to Iowa. James McMullen's mother, after the death of her third husband came to live with him and died at his house. She had been troubled with asthma for a long time and would spit blood now and then as some blood vessel would be eaten away. One evening she went to bed, began to bleed and called for Martha, James's wife. "Patsy, Patsy, come here." It was the last words she spoke. When Martha woke James and they hurried to her bed the blood was streaming from her mouth, and she bled to death. James held her in his arms when she died. One of the children, Jefferson McMullen, was asleep in the bed at the time, to keep her warm. He was her favorite grandson. Thus departed a. goad woman. Jane Robinson was married three times; first to James McMullen Sr. then to Robert Carson and then to John Gay Moore. She outlived all of them. She was slim and industrious but never seemed to hurry about her work. She had a contented mind. She was a great reader, loved to read her Bible, hymn books and especially books of a religious nature. She memorized much of the Scriptures and would argue for her beliefs.

Death of James McMullen Jr.

James was never sick of consequence until the day of his death. He was afflicted with rhuematism, backache and lumbago. He took sick September 24, 1846. He sent for Dr. Herenton of Crawfordsville. When he came he bled him, which he should not have done as it threw him into a congestive chill. The doctor would not come again but sent a student under him, a Mr. McMahn. Towards evening of the fifth day he grew worse, had cold sweats; they gave him quinine and whiskey. They sent his son-in-law, John P. Van Cleave to Crawfordsville for brandy but it did no good. He grew colder and colder, felt cold everywhere except his heart. As evening approached he grew worse, and he began to talk to his boys, told them that it was about time to milk the cows. Then he talked about sowing wheat, and said, "Boys, hurry up and sow the wheat, you know that mother wants it done." He didn't say that he wanted it done, but that Mother did. He wanted to please their mother. He grew steadily worse and took a third sinking spell. They worked with hint until near midnight when he breathed his last. His family was very much grieved over their loss and it made a deep impression upon them. James McMullen, followed by numerous friends and relatives was borne to his grave at the Presbyterian Church west on the Terre Haute road and on the west side of the Church.

> Here he lies silently sleeping But the grave is not his goal In those mansions, bright supernal

Found he rest for his soul.

He was a good man, lived in the hope and truth of the resurrection and life beyond. He was just in his dealings with his neighbors and was much beloved by all who knew him. Some of the land was sold and his debts paid and the estate divided among his children. The land fell to them by lot. Those receiving improved land got 15 acres and uncleared land 20 acres. His widow kept about 70 acres with the dwelling and improvements and here she dwelt until her death.

James McMullen, born April 12, 1792; died September 29, 1846.

Martha Van Cleave McMullen, born November 28, 1796, died March 1, 1864. They were married October 3, 1811 and their children were: Anna, born July 8, 1815; Emily, March 24, 1817; John, May 6, 1819; Benjamin and Joseph (twins), Dec. 11, 1820; William, March 26, 1823; Lindsey, Dec. 10, 1824; Marjorie Jane, Dec. 11, 1826; James Madison, August 29, 1828; Andrew Jackson, Oct. 14, 1830; Edward Robinson, Sept., 15, 1832; Francis Marion, Oct. 12, 1834; Lemuel Washington, Feb. 10, 1837; and Sarah Elizabeth, May 10, 1844.

Martha McMullen was the daughter of John Van Cleave, the son of Benjamin and Ruth Munson Van Cleave. She was a modest comely girl, born in Shelby County, Kentucky, November 28, 1796, during the heroic age of Kentucky. She grew up accustomed to frontier life. She experienced no Indian attack but an alarm now and then. John Van Cleave 's family were all girls except one, Benjamin. Martha and the older girls helped their father in the fields besides spinning and weaving cloth and other household duties. She married James McMullen October 3, 1811, in her 15th year. She and her husband joined the Methodist Church in Kentucky at an early age. She was a good Christian and lived a life of devotion and was faithful until the end.

The Life of Marjary Jane McMullen

Her parents were James McMullen, Jr. and Martha Van Cleave McMullen.

Marjary Jane McMullen was born December 11, 1826 in Shelby County, Kentucky. She was the third daughter. The first of her adventures that Ma remembers was hunting goose eggs up in the tobacco patch. She was hardly three years old at the time. She went with her brother Lindsey. He was older and took a large cup in which to put the eggs in. "We went through a hole in the fence," she said. It was a little hard to get through and we went up into the tobacco patch, Lindsey carrying the cup. I asked him how large was a goose egg, and he said, "I guess one egg will fill the cup." "I wanted to see a goose egg, I saw the tobacco leaves as we went through the patch, but no goose eggs. While we were hunting the eggs, a little dog came running down through the patch. The dog belonged to one of our neighbors, but as we had heard of a mad dog in the country, so we thought that this dog was mad and started for the house as fast as we could go. I was scared and began to cry. Lindsey led me by the hand and said, don't cry, sister, I will not let the dog bite you. Ben and Joe, the twins, seeing us coming and the strange dog, so they climbed up in the plum tree in the yard to a place of safety, but the dog went by." "At another time I had been playing out on the chip pile, I remember seeing a log sled there. The day was warm, and I got tired and went to sleep on the chips. When I awoke a big yellow dog was standing by me. I thought it was mad and was scared, I began to scream. Sister Emily came running out of the house and carried me in, but I never forgot the big yellow dog."

Uncle Abram", as we called him, was an old colored man, had been a slave of Lindsey Carson's, had been faithful, and was much liked. When he was fifty years old Lindsey Carson set him free, told him to do for himself. He said, "When a slave has worked faithfully for fifty years he should be set free." So Abram built a log cabin on a piece of land belonging to James McMullen, Jr. His wife was still a slave and her name was Kate Brooks. They had some children, but they belonged to Mr. Brooks. Uncle Abram had a piece of ground to tend, a truck patch and garden. He raised corn, potatoes and cabbage. He worked at cobbling; he made shoes and patched them for the neighbors. He finally made enough money to free his wife. She would come to his cabin on Saturday evenings and stay until Sunday evening, then she would go back to her master's place to work. When freed she lived with her husband. They had one child after this, a free child; they called her Jane, and boys used to tease Mother about Abram's child being named for her. Old Abram was a good judge of human nature. He judged people a great deal by the look in their eye. He would say, "All I wants is just to see the color of the eye." He didn't like Aunt Lucy Carson, said she wouldn't do, but he liked James McMullen's wife. He called James his "son", and Martha his "daughter" and often went over and helped nurse the children when Martha was busy weaving cloth. This helped her very much. He would give the children a drink. Once he gave Jane (Mother) a drink from his mouth by filling it with water and putting his lips to hers, saying to Martha, "La daughter dis child is suffering for water." When Mother was grown up her brothers teased her about old Abram, saying, "you even drank water from his black mouth." "One day papa found Uncle Abram laying out in the field half dead, his nose bleeding and he was not able to get to the house. Papa hitched a horse to the sled and hauled Abram to the house and took care of him until he was able to go home. One day sister Emily took me on her shoulder and started out for Uncle Abram' house, not far away. Her brother John wanted to go too, but Emily would not let him. He called out to her, "I hope the old gander will flop you on the way." He was a savage fellow, boss of everything on the place including the horses, cows, sheep and hogs, as well as the chickens. The road to Uncle Abram's place ran across a little ravine. I remember seeing the vellow clay along the road; also some "poke" sticks. Didn't know what they were and asked sister Emily. She said, "They are poke sticks, and the red on top are berries." Abram was glad to see us, and we started to have some fun. He took Emily on his knee, but I would not get on the other, so he snatched me up on his other knee. Then Emily got down and he tried to hold her but she ran out of doors, and when I wanted to follow he tried to persuade me to stay, saying, "daughter you stay with me today and I will roast some sweet taters and you shall have all you want to eat." He raised up a puncheon in the floor and we saw a cellar beneath filled with fine looking sweet potatoes. He picked up some and said, "Look here what fine ones they are, I'll roast dem and you can have all you can ea.t" But his promise of taters had no effect, I wanted to go home. I tried to get off his knee, but he held me. I was scared, cried and screamed, then scratched his hand and began to bite. In the middle of the struggle he said, "Why you bite do you!" Then he sat me down on his knee pretty hard, but I got away from him. I saw Emily's bonnet through a crack in the door. She had not gone home but had hidden in some woods alongside the cabin. I was greatly relieved. We then went home. I will never forget my first visit to Uncle Abram's cabin, I was only two and a half years old.

Ma said Old Abram and his wife, Kate, came over one Sunday evening to visit them and when they went home Emily and I and some of the children went with them. As we walked down the road behind them I noticed what a broad back Kate had. She was kind and good. We had a nice time for Abram was full of fun, but we did not stay long.

Emily related, "One day, mama undertook to whip me. I ran away from her, she after me with a little switch. I dodged in and out of things about the house and finally got out into the horse lot. I thought that if I could run away she would not whip me. I was swift and active and could run like a streak. Mama chased me around and around the logs and stumps in the horse lot. I could dodge faster than she could, but at last she caught me and gave me an awful whipping."

Madison Sick

Ma said, "I recollect going with Emily to get some plantain leaves for Madison. He had something like brain fever. Emily thought he might die. I was sad felt very sorry for my little brother. We came to a pair of bars, Emily let one down and we crawled through and went into a lot where we found the plantain. It was used to make a poultice to put on Madison's head. He got well."

Pet Lamb.

We had a pet lamb called "Billy". He was lively. Emily would call, "Billy, Billy", and he would come running to her. Her brother William thought we had named the lamb for him so he got mad and killed it one day. He chopped its head off with an axe. I think this happened in Indiana.

Going to Carson's.

One evening Emily, Linsey and I went to Uncle Lindsey Carson's and stayed all night. Brother Lindsey was named after Uncle Lindsey Carson. He gave brother a piece of cloth to make him a suit of clothes. Mama had just finished making it, so all dressed up in the new suit he went to see his Uncle Lindsey. We went to the creek called "Bullskin" (in Kentucky) and I saw the water flowing, by, rippling over the rocks and saw the rock banks of the stream. I walked along the bank near the edge but Emily told me not to walk too close or I would fall in. We shortly arrived at Uncle Lindsey's.

Sylvia (colored)

My Uncle Lindsey Carson had some slaves. Uncle Johnny also had some slaves in Kentucky. He had one named Sylvia who was of a mean disposition. She caused the death of some of her children; she thought they would be slaves if they lived so she caused their death. A little boy of five she poisoned with a poison known only to her, a secret she brought from Africa. When the child was buried, she looked at her next oldest and said, "Your turn will come next." In a few days the child was dead. On examination they found that a darning needle had been driven down into the back of his head.

Moving to Indiana, 1829.

James McMullen, Jr. sold his land and crops of tobacco and decided to go to Indiana a new state. Ma said she remembered the broad leaves of the tobacco plants. Uncle Abram made shoes for all the family before we left. All except William," He would not make any for him. William had highly offended Uncle Abram one day by getting his door key and hiding it and would not tell where it was. So Papa had to make William a pair of shoes before we started. I remember when Papa bought "Old Gray". He bought him from Mrs. Willson or Granny Willson as she was called. I remember seeing the horse standing by the tobacco patch; he would balk and was breechy. He liked to eat moss found on logs and drink soft water found in the branch and puddles. Granny Willson first married a Layne, the father of Mile Laynes, Billy, Walsh and Press Layne, the doctor of Crawfordsville. Willson was an old man when she married him and he would get so drunk now and then that he could hardly sit on his horse; he rode unsteady, sometimes having the horse going backwards, then forwards and around and around. He would stop at every house he came to. Granny Willson would ride "Old Gray", too. Papa drove him out to Montgomery County, Indiana. After they arrived at their journey's end Papa turned the horses out in the woods to graze, putting a "clog" on one and a bell on the other. They ran off, starting back to Kentucky. He went after them; finally he saw their trail and found them down near the river. Some man had taken them up and hidden them and denied having seen them, but Papa heard the bell and knew it was his bell. He confronted the man and got his horses back. Going home with them he came to a mire slough, the horses stepped on the edge and didn't want to go across, but he urged them. The one he was riding sank down and the other one pulled back and wouldn't go in. Papa jumped off and someone happened along and helped him get the horse out. Old Gray would balk. One time Papa loaned him to Jesse Van Cleave to work for a few days. Jesse got mad and beat him unmercifully. Papa said nothing, but Mama gave him a piece of her mind about it. Old Gray had been a wild horse and had two brands burned on him, one on the shoulder and one on the hip. He would jump fences and was a sly as a fox. He would jump out of the stable and go along the road and jump into corn fields, eat as much as he wanted, jump into the stable lot and be found there in the morning. Finally he got too old to jump the field fences, made an effort and got lodged on a fence. When he was found he was nearly dead. This did not break him of jumping, for he tried it again and hung on the fence and died there. He lived to be 25 or 30 years old. Old Baldy was a larger horse than Old Gray. He was mischievous in many ways. The stable door was fastened with a wood pin. Every now and then the pin would be missing and the boys would have to make another. In the morning they would find the door unfastened and the horses out. One day the boys saw the horse pull the pin with his teeth and carry it to a hollow stump and there they found all the missing pins. One day Old Baldy got into the yard when Mama had the washing out and tore the clothes all to ribbons. Mama said, "I saw the strips and shreds blowing about the yard and called to Mother and asked her what had torn the clothes up so." Her mother looked and saw the clothes and the horse and said, "Old Baldy has got into the yard and torn them." Old Baldy got old, too, and died one day.

The day we started to Indiana many of the neighbors came to bid us good bye. One of the women was weeping, and when I asked Mama why the woman was crying, she said, "Because she is sorry to see us go away." The woman's name was Fishback, a name I never forgot. Another neighbor was Mrs. Limkumhorn. We moved away, leaving all our friends behind.

Papa had employed Uncle Billy Allen to haul our household goods to Indiana. He rode one of the horses and drove the other. Papa walked much of the way. Mama and the children rode on Old Baldy and drove the cows. The first thing of importance on the trip was crossing the Ohio River. We went on a boat, seems like it was a flat boat, rather shallow and leaked some too. I sat beside sister Emily. I did not know we were crossing the river but thought we were sitting in a loom, such as Mama wove cloth on back in Kentucky. Emily told me to hold my feet up to keep them from getting wet. So I did and saw the water in the bottom of the boat. There was a woman and her little boy crossing at the same time and sat on a seat near me. She had been over to the Kentucky side to do some marketing. She had a basket of fine red apples. She was peeling one and giving it to the little boy and eating some herself. I longed for one and asked her for one. She paid no attention to my request, so I asked again. She said, "If you ask again for an apple I will throw you out into the river." Pointing with her hand, and I looked and saw a lot of water, we were in the middle of the river. I thought the woman was selfish not to give me an apple. The boat was heavily loaded for there were two wagons on it. Uncle Joe sat by the side of the boat and put his hand out in the water. Another boat passed us and caused the waves to splash over the side of our boat. Old Uncle Joe McMullen came this far with them and when they had crossed the river he turned westward, going to Boone County, Missouri. They stayed for a while near the bank. I saw Joe and Ben throwing sticks and rocks into the water and playing along the bank. I wanted to go down but Mama would not let me, was afraid that I might fall into the water. They stopped at a town further down the road.

Hi Jerry,

Glad to hear from someone else working on this line. Family tradition has long been -- 5 generations -- that we are related to Kit Carson. To date, I have not been able to find the connection. My 4th g grandfather married Jenny Clendenin in Madison Co., Ky. in 1775. There have been those who have told me that this Wm. is the son of James the grandfather of Kit. But, he is not listed in the will as you well know. However, a James did sign Wm's marriage bond in Madison Co.. Was this James the g-father of Kit? I don't know. Another thing, a William sold land in Shelby Co. in 1810 on Bull Skin Creek to Samuel Van Cleave. James owned land on Bull Skin Creek, as well. Wm. shows up in Howard Co., Mo. At Fort Kinkaid. Lindsey and Rebecca Carson were there at the same time. Again, is this Wm. a brother of Rebecca. I believe that he may be, but again, I have no proof.

As far as James' parents, I have not been able to establish that either. David, James, John were all together in many land deals throughout the counties that you mentioned as well as Kanawah. In 1800 James made a power of attorney to a George Robinson in Kanawah Co., Va. for land that he owned at the confluence of the Elk and the Greak Kanawah Rivers. He had bought this land from a Cooper.

That is about all that I have off of the top of my head..

Would be see what you have.

Another thing I just thought of, I have signatures of James on at least three different documents. They are all different.

Larry,

During the 1790's there appear to be at least three James Robinson/Robertsons in Madison County, KY. In the county's first tax list in 1787 there were listed James Robertson, Jr. & Sr. I don't think either of these are the James, who died in Shelby Co., KY in 1805 - hereafter I will differentiate this James by the dates (c1750-1805). These James' seem to appear frequently with members of the McNealy, Scott & Anderson families in the first court order book of Madison County. One of these James' (probably "Sr.") had children who were marrying in Madison County prior to 1795 - in 1789 James Robenson gave consent for his daughter, Rebecca, to marry John Hind. Also in 1789 a James Robertson (?Jr.) married Elizabeth Nicholson in Madison County.

In the Madison County tax lists of 1787-1794 only one year 1792 has more than two James Robertsons, in that year three are listed - James Sr., James Jr. & James (the Sr. & Jr. in 1792 are in a sub list together while the 3rd James is in a different sub list). James (c1750-1805) may not have moved to Madison Co., KY from VA until 1795-1796. I
believe he is the same James (wife Elizabeth), who was a resident of Bath County, VA when he sold on 10 Feb 1795, 99 acres at Rich Patch Mountain, to Samuel Porter (he had obtained this from a new grant issued to him on 24 Oct 1783). Source for this is the book, "Botetourt County, Virginia Early Settlers", the early land records through 1795, compiled by Charles T. Burton. I believe James (c1750-1805) was a resident of Madison Co., KY by 11 Feb 1796, when his daughter, Rebecca, married Lindsay Carson. Her father, James Robinson, signed consent for her to marry. Some of the children of James (c1750-1805), however, were in Madison County prior to this. His son-in-laws, John Sawyer(s) & James McMullen, are first listed in the Madison County tax lists in 1790. The former married Sarah/Anne Robinson in Botetourt Co., VA on 7 Jan 1786, and the latter married Jane Robinson on 14 Mar 1788 in Botetourt Co., VA.

I have been to Shelby County, KY to research the Robinson family but I have not been to Madison County, KY. In Madison County all that I have been able to research is the early tax lists, marriages, and 1787-1794 court orders. Have you searched any other Madison County records - such as the deeds? In one of your items on the Robinson GenForum page you said that James Robinson (c1750-1805) had owned land in Greenbrier & Kanawha Cos., in VA and in Madison Co.,KY. Do you have copies or abstracts of any James Robinson/Robertson deeds recorded in any of these places? I have checked the Shelby Co.,KY pre 1820 deed books and made copies of the deeds from books B-1,p53 (1796, James' first land purchase, which identifies his as being a resident of Madison Co.,KY) & D,p262 (1800 power of attorney to his son, George, to do business pertaining to land he owned in Kanawha Co.,VA). The latter record is very interesting. George was instructed to recover this land from Andrew Donnally. I wonder how Donnally was involved? I have found one reference that says one Andrew Donnally married an Ann Robinson in Greenbrier Co.,VA in 1789.

Jane/Jean Robinson, daughter of James & Elizabeth, married first James McMullen. They are believed to be first cousins. He was a son of Edward McMullen (left a will in Botetourt Co., VA in 1788) & Sarah Robinson, who were married in Augusta Co., VA on 16 May 1759. Sarah McMullen was named in the will of James Robinson, yeoman, that was recorded in Augusta Co., VA in 1770. This James also named wife, Jane, & children - William (oldest son), George, David, James, Joseph & John. The son, James, I believe could be James (c1750-1805), the grandfather of Kit Carson. James McMullen was reportedly killed by Indians. An appraisal of his estate was made in Madison Co., KY on 6 Dec 1793 and a settlement of his accounts with his widow, Jean, was recorded in the same county on 3 Mar 1795. On 22 Jul 1794 Jane McMullen married Robert Carson (brother to Lindsay) in Madison County. James Robinson (c1750-1805) is first found in the Shelby County, KY tax lists in 1797. His son-in-laws, Benjamin Midkiff (my ancestor), John Sawyers & Robert Carson, were all residents of Shelby County by 1799, all had previously been in Madison Co., KY. Benjamin Midkiff, a native of Lancaster Co., PA, married Elizabeth Robinson, about 1796. I have never found their marriage record. It was not found in the marriages of Botetourt Co., VA or Madison Co., KY. Possibly it was in Bath, Greenbrier or Kanawha Cos., VA. I have never been able to search any marriage records for these counties - reportedly they do exist for the first two but not the latter. Have you located or checked for Robinson marriages in Bath or Greenbrier Cos., VA?

If you have any other information or clues or find any in the future about James Robinson (c1750-1805) & wife, Elizabeth, I beg you to let me know. I will do likewise. Could you tell me something about your ancestors, William Robertson & Jenny Clendinen, who were married in Madison Co.,KY on 23 June 1795 and their children? Do you have any dates for them? Where did they go?

"William & Jenney Clendenen Robertson by Larry Robertson, 21 Nov 1999:

This William probably sold his land on Bullskin Creek in Shelby Co., Kentucky to Samuel Vancleave in 1810. He then joined with Lindsey Carson, who was married to his close relative Rebecca Robertson (Robinson) Carson, when they made their move to Missouri. William is listed as being one of the defenders of Fort Kincaide in Howard County, Missouri in 1812. He was under the command of Sarshall Cooper. This bunch of Cooper's were with the Robertsons while they were living in Virginia and what is now West Virginia. There are several newspaper notices for mail at the Boonville, Missouri post office for both William and his son James Robertson around the time that Leven Green was writing for his family to join him in Illinois. These notices ranged from 1821 to 1826.

It might be a good time to note that Robert Carson the brother of Lindsey Carson as well as James Robinson, the father of Rebecca Carson, owned land on Bullskin Creek. This creek is located just west of Shelbyville and runs for some distance to the south.

Marriage bond of William Robertson in Madison County, Kentucky: Know all men by these presents that we William Roberson & James Roberson are held & firmly bound unto Isaac Shelby Esquire Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky in the just and full sum of fifty pounds to which paiment (sic) will & Truly to be made to the said governor or his Successors we bind our selves with our Seals & Dates this 23rd day of June 1795 The condition of the above Obligation is such that whereas there is a Marriage shortly Intended to be had solmized (sic) between the above bound William Roberson & Jenney Clendenan both of Madison County if there be no Lawfull cause to obstruct the same then the above obligations to be Void otherwise to Remain in full force power & Virtue. Signed Sealed & Delivered} William Robertson {Seal} in presence of } x Will. Fox } James Robertson {Seal}

As the reader will note, James Robertson was a signer of this marriage bond. The signature of James resembles very much the signature of James Robinson who gave his consent for the marriage of Lindsey Carson to his daughter Rebecca. The Capital J's and R's appear to be from the same type of script. In no way does either of the signatures come close to resembling that which is on the will of James Robinson who has Rebecca listed as a daughter. Nor does either of the above signatures match that of the same James when he signed a Power of Attorney to George Robinson in Kanawha County, Virginia authorizing the settlement of the land that he owned at the mouth of the Elk and Great Kanawha Rivers. The dates of all of these signatures are fairly close, so it can not be said that the big difference is caused by age. Actually the clearest of all is the signature on his Will and is obviously not by the same hand as the others though one knows they are the same person by the fact that his daughter Rebecca is mentioned in two of them as the wife of Lindsey Carson.

From the signatures it is my conclusion that James Robinson is in all probability is a close relative to William Robertson of the above marriage.

Kentucky Land Grants: William Rouse Jillson, Sc.D, Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc., Baltimore, 1971 The documentary land records of Kentucky fall necessarily into several groups. The earliest of these are known as the Virginia Grants. They were issued by the Commonwealth of Virginia upon warrants given in some cases as consideration for military service in the French and Indian War, and later in the Revolutionary War. The date back from 1782 to 1792 and are recorded in sixteen books containing 8,909 pages.

Now we have another point to ponder. Is our subject --William Robertson -- the same as the William that received the land grant in 1782? If so, he must have been an older man when he married Jenny Clendenin in 1795. Following the travels of James Robertson -- the grandfather of Kit Carson -- there was a William, David and John settling in the same areas and making land deals at the same time that James was in that area. George was mentioned in a letter of James' as being a friend. There was a Thomas who married a Jane McDaniel on 12-29-1795 in Madison Co., Kentucky. His Bond was by James Robertson. Could it be possible that all of these people are brothers, and that the William that married Jenny was a son of one of them or is this William and the William that received the land grant one and the same? Another point to look into is was, if William was an older man when he married Jenny, was he married before, and to whom? Were there other children?

!This Indenture made this second day of June in the year of Eighteen Hundred and Ten Between William Robinson of the County of Shelby and State of Kentucky of the one part and Samuel Vancleave of the county and State aforesaid of the other part. Witness that the said William Robinson for and in consideration of the sum of three hundred and fifty three dollars in his hand paid the receipt whereof he doth hereby acknowledge hath granted, bargained, sold, aliened and confirmed; and by these presents do grant, bargain, sell, alien and confirm; to said Samuel Vancleave his heirs and assigns a certain parcel of land containing One Hundred acres lying and being in said County of Shelby part of a two thousand acre tract in the name of (-) Lewis on the waters of Bullskin Creek which is bounded as follows: Beginning at -description of boundaries – To have and To hold the tract or parcel of Land with all and (-) appurtenances to the said Samuel Vancleave his heirs and assigns forever to his and there proper use and behoof. And the said William Robinson for himself and his heirs the said tract or parcel of Land with its appurtenances to said Samuel Vancleave his heirs and assigns against the claim of every person whatsoever do & will Warrant & forever defend. In Witness whereof the said William Robinson hath hereunto set his hand & seal the date above written. Signed, Sealed & Delivered William Robison {Seal}, In the presents of } -----Shelby County Ct. Clerk's Office 2nd June 1810, This Indenture was this day produced to and in my Office and acknowledged by the within named William Robison by his act and deed for the purposes herein named and there upon the Indenture is admitted to record. !The above records shows the difficulty in tracing the family during this era. The spellings above have them all -- Robinson, Robison, Robertson, Roberson and in one case in Virginia James and Elizabeth Robinson of Shelby Co., Kentucky had the name spelled Robason when one of their daughters was married. Take your pick as to how it is spelled. In all cases, the name is spelled Robertson the majority of the time with one exception and that is James the father of Rebecca Carson-- Robinson dominates there. It may be that he could only write his name after being taught by some individual to spell it Robinson. James Robertson of Bates County who is listed in the 1850 census as not being able to read or write spelled his name James S. Robison. His wife spelled hers as Elizabeth H. Robison. She too, was listed in the 1850 census as not being able to read or write. The signatures on the written marriage bonds are the best clue as to how it should be spelled.

Sarshall Cooper's Co.dated April 1812, is not without interest, and gives the names of the following officers and men: Partial List: Robert Cooper, David Cooper, William Cooper, John Cooper, Jos.Cooper, Stephen Cooper, Lindsay Carson, William Robertson. Every enlisted man furnished his own equipment and an order was promulgated so the "citizen soldiers may not be ignorant of the manner in which the law requires him to be equipped, he is reminded

that it is his duty to provide himself with a good musket, with a bayonet and belt, of fusil, two spare flints and a knapsack pouch, with a box thereon to contain not less than 24 cartridges; or a good rifle, powder-horn and pouch, with 20 balls and one-quarter pound of powder.

About 1828 Kelly Township, Cooper Co., Missouri. Near Bunceton was located a schoolhouse near the grounds of the Hopewell Church, William Robertson, a Baptist Minister, continued this school for a number of years.

!The above Robert Cooper married a daughter -- Elizabeth -- of Lindsey Carson. Lindsey Carson named one of his sons -- Sharshall.

I am related to the McMullens through Jane (Robinson), wife of James McMullen, Sr. She was a sister of my 4th great-grandmother, Elizabeth (Robinson) Midkiff. Both are daughters of James Robinson, who left a will in Shelby Co., KY in 1805. Jane Robinson McMullen married 2nd Robert Carson, 1794 (their son, William, also moved to Montgomery Co.IN), & she married 3rd John Gay Moore, 1814. For 20 years I have been working on compiling data on the descendants of James Robinson. Several of his family moved to Montgomery County, IN and I had hoped to learn more about these families.

In your McMullen file you referred to an article on the McMullen family in the 1988 book, "Family History of Montgomery Co., IN " (p243). Do you have a copy of this book? Joseph & Mary Susan had 10 children – Lindsey J. (c1845-); Jesse (c1847-); Henry T. (c1848-); Emma Jane (c1849- ; w/o William Henry Smith); Martha (c1850- , w/o John W. Smith); Lydia Margaret (c1852-); Sarah A. (7May1853-23May1919, w/o Joseph S. Douglas); Louann (c1854-); ?male (c1855-); & Mollie (c1856-). Any corrections or additions to this would be greatly appreciated. Where was your great-great-grandmother, Sarah A. McMullen Douglas, born and died. In what cemetery was she buried? When & where did she marry. Was Joseph S. Douglas related To Margaret Ann Douglas (19Aug1837-after1894), who married Joseph McMullen's brother, Edward Robinson McMullen on 20 Jan 1853? If so do you know her parents names? Do you have any info on Margaret's family in your Douglas file?

Jerry,

You've reached a descendant of James McMullen and Martha VanCleave via their son Edward Robinson VanCleave. Am particularly interested in getting more Robinson information. Will share what I have.

Sharon:

I have that Jane Robinson, who married James McMullen, Sr. in 1788, was the daughter of James & Elizabeth Robinson. James Robinson had lived in the southwestern part of Virginia. Between 1788-1794 he moved his family to Kentucky. In Kentucky they first lived in Madison County. About 1797 he moved to Shelby County, KY, where he died in 1805. I have not been able to learn the identity of his parents or his wife. Reportedly he was an officer in the Revolutionary War. There were many James Robinsons in Virginia and I have not been able to single out the correct one.

Several families who were descendants of James Robinson during the 1820's left Shelby County, KY and migrated to Montgomery County, IN. They included members of the Allen, Carson, McMullen and Vancleave families. I am now trying to learn more about these relatives. Sometime or other I would like to go on a research trip to Montgomery County.

Mrs. Jane Robinson McMullen Carson (d/o James Robinson), appears to have been born about 1770 in VA, and died between 1836-1846. Have you ever found any grave marker or courthouse record on her death? I believe that she may have died in Montgomery County, IN but other descendants claim it was in Ohio County, KY. Many of her relatives, including two children, settled in Ohio County. Several generations of my family line were residents of this county.

I have some data on James McMullen, Jr. & Martha Vancleave and their 14 children but would like to fill in some more on them. Do you know in what cemetery James & Martha were buried? Of the families of their children I have data only on 4 of them - Anna Vancleave (1815-c1834), Benjamin McMullen (1820-), Joseph McMullen (1820-) & Lemuel Washington McMullen (1837-).

I would like to learn about the family of Edward Robinson McMullen (1832-c1883) & Margaret Ann Douglass (1837-after1894). Reportedly they were married on 20 Jan 1853. Was their marriage recorded in Montgomery Co., IN? Do you know where they were buried? Did they have any other children other than Lorena May (10May1868-6Nov1954, w/o Alfred Milton Bowen)? Any corrections or additions on Edward & Margaret's family would be greatly appreciated!

Jerry,

Are you also from the Edward McMullen and Margaret Douglas line? If so, we should share lots of data to compare.

But back to your first paragraph, I have James Robinson's will from some kind soul. It names his wife as Elizabeth and names a number of children. I can send that to you

typed into my FTW program as notes on a group sheet, or if I have the actual copy, can scan and send as snail mail. My computer is so full, I have to eliminate stuff and can't create documents that take up a lot of space to store.

I have his parents, probably from an old letter in a Shelby Co KY file, as David and Catron Robinson, whose children included James, Wm, George, Prescilla, Mary, Catherine, Elizabeth Ann, Annabelle, Phebe, and Prudence. No documentation in my notes.

I have an old family history that I can probably pull together for you about these families, as they lived in Montgomery Co. Scott and Julieann Fisher, who did her Mom's ancestry for an LDS project, connected me with someone who had it. I've misplaced the Kearns section, but you may not want that, although it does mention Martha VanCleave's Mom, Marjorie VanCleave.

Anyway, the history says that Jane Robinson had two husbands besides James: John Gay Moore and (Was it Robert?) Carson. It also describes Jane's death in the home of her son James and family. This had to Montgomery Co, I think, because they were there when the children were growing up. And it mentions her little granddaughters getting in bed with her when she was dying to keep her warm. I would like to know what you have about her other marriage(s) and other children.

I have considerable data on the children of James and Martha. Some of it is unverified by me. My notes should indicate which descendant shared with me. Some will be the work of Robert LaFoe and his brother, long deceased. Can send in whatever format.

I have James buried at the Presbyterian Ch Cem on the Terre Haute Road. Some records say he was buried in Terre Haute, which makes absolutely no sense. Needs further work.I have nothing for Martha's burial place, but I can't imagine her being buried anyplace but by him. Theirs was a love match, according to the fam. history.

I think I have some or all of their estate papers. Indiana deaths were recorded after 1880, so we won't find anything definite for James and Martha.

I have the same date for the marriage of Edward and Margaret, but I have the wrong death date for Edward, I am sure. Margaret remarried John Buttery. I found her obit quite by accident in the Colfax items in a Boone Co newspaper c 1894. They called her Margaret Buttery, "an old resident of this place..." I also have her marriage license to John Buttery in which she listed her occupation as a physician! Must have practiced as an early healer/herbalist. I have no further ideas there. I think she also was a tailor. Oh well, sew up people or clothes, what's the difference?

The family history I mention also suggests that Jeremiah Douglas didn't approve of Edward McMullen and may have been nearby in the woods when the tree fell on him. Or may have caused it. Makes an interesting story, as the Douglas family descends from the Scots lairds and there's another story of murder and intrigue that caused them to flee to the States. Georgia Combe is the person to ask for details, but I don't think she has the

story straight yet. Anyway, one of her relatives was asked to come back to Scotland as laird. He refused, and a son who felt he should have been consulted and who would have welcomed the opportunity, never spoke to him again.

Well, that's more than you asked about. Anyway, I have Edward dying at Reese Mills in Boone Co. I have never visited his grave and should get a death certificate. I have Margaret Buttery dying at Mechanicsburg. My great grandfather, her son Thomas, lived there quite a bit, may have been there then.

Margaret and Edward had a large family, almost ran out of usable names! My grandmother Lola Pence knew the Bowen girls at school, that's how she met my grandfather, Jesse McMullen.

So how can we exchange? What are your priorities? And where do you live, is it feasible to get to Montgoemry Co? I am limited only by time.

Sharon,

Thanks for replying to my enquiry. I am not a descendant of Edward Robinson McMullen (1832-?1883). You have to go back two more generations before I am related. His grandmother, Jane Robinson, had a sister, Elizabeth, who married Benjamin Midkiff. They are my 4th great-grandparents. Elizabeth Metcalf is named as a daughter in James Robinson's 1805 will. I have a copy of this will. I copied it in 1980 on a research trip to Shelby County, KY.

I believe I also have the old family history you refer to. Is it a history of the Van Cleave, Taylor & McMullen families written from the notes of James William Van Cleave (1845-1925) and compiled in 1946 by his nephew, Errett Van Cleave, of San Francisco, CA? The copy I have is about 66 pages. To this date I rank this as one of my favorite and most informative discoveries. Truly a genealogical gem! The Taylor family in this history is also one of my lines. The Taylors, Midkiffs, and several other families that were related through the Robinsons moved to Ohio County, KY. Among the other relatives that went to Ohio County were your ancestor, Jane Robinson, her 3rd husband, John Gay Moore, and 3 of her children by her former marriage to Robert Carson (viz. Lindsey Robinson Carson, Sarah Carson Bennett & Elizabeth Carson Harris).

I estimate that Jane Robinson was born c1770 VA. She married James McMullen in Botetourt Co., VA on 14 Mar 1788. James reportedly was killed by Indians. I believe this occurred in 1792 or 1793 in the vicinity of Fort Boonesboro, in Madison Co., KY,

which is where his father-in-law, was then living. I have not yet had a chance to check the Madison County, KY Order Books for this period to see if there was a possible reference to James McMullen's estate. In Madison County Jane married 2nd Robert Carson on 22 July 1794. In Shelby County, KY Jane married 3rd John Gay Moore on 18 July 1814. John G. Moore is listed in the 1820 Shelby Co., KY census & in the 1830 Ohio Co., KY census. In Ohio County "John Gay Moore" wrote a will on 11 Sep 1835 & it was probated in May 1836. In it he named his wife, Jane, and 6 Moore children. The 1820 & 1830 censuses do not have any children young enough to have been children by Jane Robinson. She would have been in her 40's when they married and I doubt that they had any children, or at least none that lived beyond childhood. Jane at this point went to live with her son, James McMullen, Jr., in Montgomery County, IN. Her death occurred there, I believe between 1836-1846. Have you seen any probate or estate records in Montgomery County that would suggest when she died?

You mentioned a letter from a file in Shelby County, KY that reports that our James Robinson was a son of David & Catron Robinson. Could I please get a copy of that letter? I would like to investigate any new leads. Have you ever done any research on the families of William Carson (c1795-1876?) or Nancy Robinson Allen (d. 1846), who also lived in Montgomery County, IN? Nancy was a daughter of James & Elizabeth Robinson, and a younger sister of Jane.

By regular mail I am sending copies of my hand written pages on the family of James McMullen, Jr. & Martha Vancleave. I thought it would be easier than retyping it here. I was wondering if you would please check over these to see if I have anything wrong? Any additions or help on the descendants of James & Martha McMullen would be greatly appreciated. I would like to fill in more information on their children and grandchildren.

I apologize for the length of this message and the volume of questions. Please write again. With your proximity to Montgomery County, IN and mine to Ohio County, KY I believe we can greatly help each other.

Hi Jerry,

Please don't apologize for your wonderful letter. It has such great information. Already you have filled some gaps for me. I haven't found in Montgomery Co any references to further marriages. I had queried, I think, in Shelby Co KY but didn't have a chance to go there and didn't know which direction to go after that.

The family history you mention sounds like the same one except I have no Taylor data. I also have no title page. Mine may have been enlarged by Pauline Walters, a descendant in Montgomery Co. We should probably compare these more carefully to see if we have

identical data on the families in which we share interest. Mine is scattered by family name into various folders, probably a grave error.

Thanks for all of those wonderful dates for Jane. I would like to know more about her second/third marriages if you can send that. As I recall, Jane had a child before James that didn't live long. That isn't recorded on my FTW, so it may be unconfirmed data from someone. I also have that James reportedly was killed Jefferson Co, but Shelby was formed from that in 1792. I have no clue about Madison Co. I will make a note to check on a probate record for Jane Moore when I go to Montgomery Co. I want to meet a Redenbaugh researcher there in a few weeks and will look for this too. I doubt if she had one, since she probably didn't have property at this time. She also might have been listed on the 1840 tax duplicates even if she didn't own land. Sometimes women were listed.

I can send you the letter re David and Catron.

I have not researched Wm Carson or Nancy Robinson Allen; however, Allens are mentioned in estate settlements of either Martha (VanCleave) or James McMullen II. I will send anything that has an Allen mentioned.

Also will send a fam group sheet on James and Martha, or perhaps a GenReport, four generations. I will check yours when it comes.

Probably I will be beggin for more, such as data from the earlier generations. This is a nice start!

Sorry to take so long to get back to you. I haven't had much in the way of minutes to string together.

I started comparing your data to mine and made some notes; halfway through, I realized that if I send you my data, you will see the changes. So I will mention some differences or additions that I may not send. Unfortunately, my data often doesn't show source of info. In many cases, it will be the research of Robt. LaFoe and his deceased brother, who left him the beginnings of his data.

The cover page and first page of your family history looks somewhat familiar. I realize what I have is bits and pieces of that with Montgomery Co information thrown in. So I don't have the complete document by James Wm VanCleave/Errett VanCleave and would like to have it. I can copy for you whatever parts of the expanded version you would like.

The expansion is apparently written by Jerry Lou Joiner Nordmeyer, dau of Ruth Morgan. She descends from the Douglas family which intersects with the McMullens through Edward McMullen and Margaret Douglas. There are pages on the Douglas, Kerns, McMullen, VanCleef, and VanCleave. There are mentions of Carsons and other intermarried families.

The expanded version may be a totally different version, because I don't have the page on James McMullen that you sent. It is possible that I may have had and it's gotten separated. I had a page on Peter Kerns that I can't find and apparently have misfiled. Basically, it's enjoyable family stories about life while migrating from KY and living in Montgomery Co. These are handed-down stories and are a wonderful legacy. Let me know what you would like.

I have ready to go to you a group sheet on Peter Kearns and family; a four generation GenRport on Descendants of James McMullen Jr; and same on Descendants of Aaron Van Cleave. I am sure you will find many holes.

I have ready to copy: notes by Mrs. Clark Boyd, Shelbyville KY on the McMullin Line; notes by Mrs. Clark Boyd on the VanCleaves of Holland and Shelby Co KY; a couple of land transactions by James and Martha McMullen; and Martha McMullen's estate papers. Because some of these are longer than 8 1/2 X 11, I will need to take them downtown on Monday. Unfortunately, Montgomery Co had(has?) an ancient copying system that uses slick paper on land transactions. It is quite difficult to read.

Lemuel Washington McMullen and Maria Louis Redenbaugh: Maria Louise b 1841 IN (I need to find more about her, as I have a Redenbaugh line via Margaret Douglas's Mom.)

A daughter of Edward and Margaret's, Lorena May, who m. Alfred Bowen, had a couple of girls that my grandmother Lola Pence knew in teacher's training. That's how she met my grandfather Jesse McMullen.

For Joseph McMUllen and Mary Susan Elrod, I have 5 Sep as Mary Susan's birth date, same year. I have dau Emma Jane b 1857, her husband William Henry Smith b July 1846. I have Lindsey J b 1855 and Jesse W b 1859; Henry T is "P" in my data, b May 18, 1857 Montgomery Co m. Emma Elrod b July 1849. He d July 31, 1908, b Oak Hill Cem, C'ville. I have dau Martha b July 1849, m. John W Smith Montgoemry Co Sep 26, 1872. Dau Lydia Margaret I have as Lydia Eliza b abt 1870, m. Wm E Haun May 12, 1889. Dau Louann b abt 1852 I have m. Wiley Surface Feb 21, 1889 Montgomery Co. Dau Mollie I don't have. Could this be Mary or "child" who didn't survive long. I have a

daughter Louisa b 1866 that you don't have. I'm fairly certain all this came from Robt LaFoe.

On Jesse VanCleave and Anna McMullen, I have him d Montgomery Co and b Old Indian Creek Cem, Montgomery Co. I have their mg as 19 Nov 1832 Montgomery Co. That can be checked online at the Indiana State Library site. I didn't have Ellen Sullenger as spouse or Charity Brewer.

For James McMullen and Martha VanCleave, most of this will be on my GenReport. In fact, I think all.

Better send this before finishing supper. My timer is calling me, the bread machine is done. Such a pity to spend time on the mundane.....

I am sorry I have taken so long to write and thank you for all the great info that you sent. It was so much it has taken me some time to study it out. Also since I received your package I have been on vacation and have had to change Internet providers. For the first 10 days after signing on with Prodigy I was not able to get online. Since, I have occasionally been able to get through, possibly 1 out of 10 tries. Presently my new e-mail address is: <u>J-LONG@prodigy.net</u>

This week I am going to copy and send the old Vancleave - McMullen history that I have. Is it too much to ask for a copy of the old McMullen history that you said you have?

While on vacation I spent a couple of days at the KY Historical Society Library in Frankfort, KY. I checked for and found confirmation of the death of James McMullen (Sr.) in Madison County, KY (he died before his family ever moved to Shelby Co.KY). In Madison Co. Will Book A, p.76 is an appraisal of his estate, made on 6 Dec 1793 & recorded 4 Nov 1794, and on p.78 a settlement of his estate was examined & recorded on 3 March 1795. In Madison Co. Order Book B, p.240 it is recorded that Haile Talbott, Stephen Hancock & Gabriel Mullins were appointed to settle the accounts of James McMullens, deceased, in 1793 (I failed to copy the full date) and on p.260 it is recorded that the above, who were appointed to settle the accounts with Jean [I have previously found this name as a variation of Jane] McMullen, administrator of James McMullen, dec'd, returned their settlement & it was recorded 3 March 1795.

I have the following on the Robinson family: James Robinson, born c1750, wife Elizabeth, lived Augusta & Botetourt Cos., VA and Madison & Shelby Cos., KY. In Shelby County he wrote his will on 23 May 1805 & it was recorded in Aug 1805. He names his wife & 11 children in the will. His children were: George, John, Sarah/Ann (m. John Sawyers, 7Jan1786, Botetourt Co.VA), Mary (m. _ Gillespy, ?James Gillespy 25Jan1785 Botetourt Co.VA), Jane (McMullen-Carson-Moore), Elizabeth (m. Benjamin Midkiff, ca 1796), Rebecca (m. Lindsey Carson 11Feb1796 Madison Co.KY), Nancy (m. Stephen Allen, Jr., 2Mar1805 Shelby Co.KY), Peggy (m. John Gillespie 8May1806 Shelby Co.KY), Araminta (m. William Gillespie 24Jan1809 Shelby Co.KY), & Charlotte (m. John Fuqua 17Apr1808 Shelby Co.KY).

If you learn any more on the early history of the McMullen and Robinson families please keep me in mind and I will do likewise. Thanks for all the help.

I had a bit of time today to get the McMullen/Douglas/Kerns/VanCleave, etc stuff together for you. I think I have it all or most of it.

What I have discovered is that my history is based on yours and expanded to fit local Montgomery Co folks.

Jerri Nordmeyer appears to be the author, at least she is named in descendancy on the last page. What Jerri has done is to start with the basic history. The pagination is different from your copy for identical passages. The older VanCleave data is all that appears to be identical. From there, information is added willy-nilly.

Jerri cites the previous authors and copies their words. From there she expands and adds sections in that were not in the previous history at all. Sometimes she tells stories that do not appear in your copy.

I should get this copied tomorrow and will get it out then if the PO is still open. Enjoy.

Hello Jerry,

A few weeks ago I met a Redenbaugh descendant in Montgomery Co for a little research. While we mainly worked on that family, I met a local geneologist, Dellie Craig, who said she had done quite a bit of work on the VanCleaves and Kearns/Kerns families for another researcher and she could make those copies available to me with no hourly fee, just copies and postage.

Basically she had mostly VanCleave info, mostly land records. She did send a map of Brown Twp which showed our VanCleaves all living next to each other. It was amazing. And right in the middle of them was Peter Karnes, Jr. This map was a copy of original landowners. Occasionally two dates were shown. Peter's purchase dates were too close togehter to be dates of purchase in Indiana and date of certificate in Washington. There is no key for the map to explain anything.

I also found a Wm Kern and Adam Kern at the other end of the township. They purchased on 12 Aug 1822, two separate acreages, which indicates that they were related. Whether they were related to Peter is another matter.

Also found Wm and James Moore together. They are indirectly related to VanCleaves. One marriage that I know of is Jane Robinson McMullen Carson to John Gay Moore. But I didn't find a John Moore.

Dellie sent another map of another township. It wasn't named, so I have to find my Montgomery Co plat map. It showed a Kearns cemetery north of Crawfordsville. On the other hand, Dellie sent no info about that cemetery, even though she sent copies of a few cemeteries that had VanCleaves.

Dellie sent also a deed I had found before, in which John Kerns sold 1/2 of lot#14 in Crawfordsville in 1851. There was also a Joseph Karnes whose land patent certificate number was 36003.

But no Peter Kearns Sr, unless Peter Karnes Jr is that man! I realize this is the tip of the iceberg, but I wanted to let you know we have a glimmer of the existence of Kearnses in Montgomery Co.

Thanks for your e-mail on the Kearns. Also a belated thank you for the McMullen history you sent back in September. Just now realizing I had not sent a thank you. This past Oct 15th my father passed away with cancer and I've had to set research aside for a time.
Does the Montgomery County, IN plat map you mentioned show any of the property owners in Brown township? Are there any McMullen, Carson, Vancleave, Taylor or Allen names on it? If there are could I request a copy? I have sent as an attachment an LDS file on the family of William Carson (c1795-c1876) of Montgomery County, IN. He is a half-brother to James McMullen, Jr. (1792-1846). I am not sure about William's wife(s). Some give his wife as Susan Vancleave and others as Lucy Kearns (d/o Peter Kearns & Anna Jordan). I do know that there was a marriage of a William Carson to Lucy Kearns on 12 March 1818 recorded in Shelby County, KY. If you have anything or every learn anything more on this William Carson and his descendants I would really appreciate it if you let me know. I will do likewise and I will also be looking for anything about the Kearns family on the Kentucky side of the river. Do you have a listing of the Old Union Cemetery, at Waveland, in Montgomery County, IN are any published cemetery volumes for that county? William Carson and some members of his family were reportedly buried at Old Union. Also there are several other Robinson family descendants that I would like to check for in Montgomery County cemeteries if I ever get access to them.

Hello Jerry,

Sorry to hear about your Dad. Mine died last Jan 2 of cancer, following years of Altzheimers. In this case, Dad had been declining for some time, so it was no surprise. He went in that big blizzard that was our only big snow that winter. In fact, he had years earlier predicted to a co-worker that he would go that way.

I do have the names on this plat map and will get you some of these documents, which do include some cemetery listings, as quickly as I can. I will need to reduce some. I'll hold off on all the deeds until I know which ones you might want. I got everything Dellie Craig said she could acquire for the early period. It arrived a week ago, and I haven't studied it yet. No time. I will put it all in my notes on the FTW.

Wm Carson is shown on the map. Thanks for clarifying who he is. Obviously Dellie Craig, the Montgomery Co geneologist, knows about this family, as she sent me some burials for Canines, a name I hadn't expected to see. I have Wm Carson and Lucy Kearns and their mg date of Mar 12 1818. That is ALL I have on them. I'm sure I have an image of that in the Shelby Co mg book. Maybe there is another Wm and Susan Vancleave, will see what comes up. I don't believe I have any Carson deeds, so can add that to my list to ask Dellie about again.

There is quite a large set of Montgomery Co cemetery books put out by the DAR. I copied some data from them but not nearly all possibles. Don't think I was looking for Robinson that day, which was primarily a Redenbaugh research day. I met Dellie early

on that day, and she promised to send me a list of what she had. Didn't work on Kearns at all, as I might have copied stuff she could send me.

I can get back there some time this winter, it's not a hard trip for me. Likely will be after Christmas. Don't look for the copies for a week or so, as I have some catch-up to do with other obligations. But you will get them and more, eventually.

Have no info on the Wm Carson and Lucy Kearns family, thanks for sending. It's very timely, as I can look for these connections in the material I have. May have other questions for you as I go.

Since we corresponded I have not been able to do any more Robinson research. There are several leads that I want to follow up on. I have attached an article by me that was recently published in the periodical "Kentucky Family Records". It is on the Taylor family that has a couple of connections to the Van Cleave family and several members of whom went to Montgomery County, IN.

Hello Jerry,

Yes, I did email the Shelby Co list, hoping to find you. I was entering some Douglas data the othe day and came upon some McMullen data you had sent me. I've done a bit more research on McMullens lately and realized I have more than you sent. Of course, in two years you may have more also.

My Dad has also died in the intervening time since we corresponded. His death didn't precipitate a change in my pursuits, but it changed my obligations somewhat. It's been a busy time.

I'll send you more on Douglas in case some of this is new to you.

One of my pursuits in the past year and a half has been the location of the Redenbaugh cemetery in Montgomery Co IN. Since there were several Redenbaugh-Douglas marriages, the family connects with our VanCleave and Kearns families. Old information, including a WPA survey, indicated the cemetery was located somewhere near the intersection of IN 231 and Montgomery Co 600S. In the past few years Southmont High School had purchased land on that corner and was using it as a nature center.

A library researcher told me to check with several older residents who remembered a cemetery in that location. I found the couple, who showed me where the cemetery had been. It was in the middle of the nature center, and the ag boys had been using a back-hoe to get soil samples. Luckily the school had an interest in restoring the cemetery, completely hidden under the sod of a former cow pasture. To help things along, their shcool board included an IN DNR official, and their science department head is an archeologist and paleontologist who specializes in locating old cemeteries in southern IN. As I write, the stones have been retrieved from about 27 graves and are being put back together inside the high school science department. The graves have been determined by surface soil samples and are marked with wooden boards preparatory to replacing the

stones, framed and repaired. A wrought iron fence will be added and a sign, and the Redenbaugh cemetery will once more be in evidence.

I mention all this because there is one Douglas there, Mary Catherine, who married Henry Redenbaugh. There are two adult graves on the foremost row, and I wonder if they are Jeremiah Douglas and Mary Catherine Redenbaugh. Their stones have not been found. Their daughter, Margaret Ann Douglas, married Edward McMullen. Margaret Ann wrote on her marriage license for her second marriage to John Buttery that she was a physician. I think she was either a midwife or an herbal healer, I'm sure she wasn't formally educated.

Thanks for sending the Taylor data. I'll let you know if I can see a connection to any of the Montgomery Co VanCleaves. I wish this were Margaret Taylor's family. She settled in Parke Co IN and is one of mine, but I doubt if there is any kind of connection. The Newells came from Brown Co OH to Parke co.

FNU Bowen was paid \$3.00 for notices. Joseph Allen also paid to apprise \$1.50. Among the heirs, Edward R. McMullin receive his \$131.31 on 9 Oct 1865. He signed his own name. All heirs did except for Martin R. McMull in, Mary E. McMullen(granddaughter), and John H/K Coons. Most of the persons who purchased items at Martha's sale were her hei rs. Edward R. McMullin purchased a quilt and blanket, bacon, wheat, sundries, a quilt. See McMullin documents file for complete auctio n.

Sharon:

Thanks for the early data on the family of Edward McMullen. I would like to single out and comment about two points - the death places of James McMullen, Sr. and of his wife, Jane Robinson McMullen Carson Moore.

James William Van Cleave (1845-1925) in his detailed family history (copy of which I sent you) relates details about his great-grandfather, James McMullen, Sr.'s death. According to his story the death occurred in the neighborhood, within a ten-mile radius of the blockhouse where his family was then residing. If this is true the death would have taken place in Madison County, KY not in Shelby (then Jefferson) County, KY. Records prove that his family were then residents of Madison Co., KY. His death took place several years prior to his family's move to Shelby County. I believe his death occurred in 1792 or 1793 in the vicinity of Fort Boonesboro, in Madison Co., KY, which is where his family was then living. It is interesting that Squire Boone, who married into the Vancleave family and a brother to Daniel, also was living in Madison County at the same time, prior to his removal to Shelby County, KY.

In Madison Co. Will Book A, p.76 is an appraisal of the estate of James McMullen, made on 6 Dec 1793 & recorded 4 Nov 1794, and on p.78 a settlement of his estate was examined & recorded on 3 March 1795. In Madison Co. Order Book B, p.240 it is recorded that Haile Talbott, Stephen Hancock & Gabriel Mullins were appointed to settle the accounts of James McMullens, deceased, in 1793 (I failed to copy the full date) and on p.260 it is recorded that the above, who were appointed to settle the accounts with Jean [I have previously found this name as a variation of Jane] McMullen, administrator of James McMullen, dec'd, returned their settlement & it was recorded 3 March 1795.

Three different James Robinson/Robertsons appear in the Madison County tax lists during the 1790's. James Robinson (c1750-1805), our ancestor was residing in Madison County at least by 1796. In the Madison County tax lists of 1787-1794 only one year 1792 has more than two James Robertsons, in that year three are listed - James Sr., James Jr. & James (the Sr. & Jr. in 1792 are in a sub list together while the 3rd James is in a different sub list). James (c1750-1805) may not have moved to Madison Co., KY from VA until 1795-1796. I believe he is the same James (wife Elizabeth), who was a resident of Bath County, VA when he sold on 10 Feb 1795, 99 acres at Rich Patch Mountain, to Samuel Porter (he had obtained this from a new grant issued to him on 24 Oct 1783). Source for this is the book, "Botetourt County, Virginia Early Settlers", the early land records through 1795, compiled by Charles T. Burton. I believe James (c1750-1805) was a resident of Madison Co., KY by 11 Feb 1796, when his daughter, Rebecca, married Lindsay Carson. Her father, James Robinson, signed consent for her to marry. Some of the children of James (c1750-1805), however, were in Madison County prior to this. His son-in-laws, John Sawyer(s) & James McMullen, are first listed in the Madison County tax lists in 1790. The former married Sarah/Anne Robinson in Botetourt Co., VA on 7 Jan 1786, and the latter married Jane Robinson on 14 Mar 1788 in Botetourt Co., VA. About 1797 members of the Robinson, McMullen & Carson families moved to Shelby County, KY - they are last found in the Madison tax lists in 1796 and shortly thereafter they are listed in Shelby County tax records.

In the report you sent you stated my belief that Jane Robinson (b. c1770 - d.1836-1846) died in Montgomery County, IN. My source for this is her great-grandson, James William Van Cleave's (1845-1925) family history. On page 10 of his McMullen section he writes "James McMullen's [Jr.] mother, after the death of her third husband, came to live with him and died at his house." He goes on to relate more details surrounding her death. He makes no comments about her place of burial but due to the great distance from her former home in Ohio County, KY it would appear highly unlikely that she would have been taken there for burial and since she had has many near relatives in Montgomery County it is logical that she would have been buried there. James William Van Cleaves' account was written many many years ago and along with the many details about her death make me believe that they are indeed true.

Other descendants have stated that Jane Robinson died and was buried in Ohio County, KY. She had been residing there in 1836 when her 3rd husband, John Gay Moore's died and left a will. Her son, Lindsey Robinson Carson, was then a resident of Ohio County. Some of the latter's descendants have reported that his mother died in Ohio County. The

main source for this is the memory of the elder statesman of the Carson family in Ohio County, William Robinson Carson, he will be 100 years old on Dec 8th. He has told that his great-great-grandmother, Jane Robinson Carson, died in Ohio County. Based on this his family since 1988 have placed a gravestone for her in the Carson family cemetery in Ohio County, where her son, Lindsey, was buried. The sole basis of his belief is his recollection of what was told (or what he thinks was told) in his family. He had no knowledge of what his much older cousin, James William Van Cleave, had written many years previously, and did not know of the existence of the family history until I told them about it. If Mr. Carson had something that was written in their family to support his claim I could give it greater credence. Mr. Carson is further removed in time from the event and I have generally found that the closer a source is to an event the more likely it is to be true. Unfortunately because of the existence of the monument to Jane Robinson Carson in the Carson Cemetery in Ohio County, KY all future family researchers will assume that she was buried there, even though her death occurred in Montgomery County, IN. I have seen this error reported in so many places that I think it will now be impossible to correct this misconception.

Jerry,

Thanks for adding these great comments about the early Madison Co connections....and probably wrong assumption.

I'm printing it out for later study. I can see I need to get some records from Madison Co KY. Among many things I need to do.

I've encountered false reports before; in fact, it's not the first erroneous tombstone I have known about. In one instance, someone falsely attributed a middle name to an ancestor, based on their hopeful interpretation of the following: "...I, William Deal, was born...". The statement became "...J William Deal was born...". Then the interpreter gave William the middle name of Jackson, which was, coincidentally, the interpreter's middle name.

In another instance mistaken Rev War service was mentioned in a replacement tombstone in PA.

The only remedy I can think of is to publicize information that seems to be more credible...on FTW pages, or wherever on the web. The other option would be to find Jane's tombstone. She might be buried with Martha and James, but I don't know yet where they are buried. Martha, dying in 1864, is more likely to have a readable stone. One cemetery I haven't visited is the Kearns cemetery in Montgomery Co. Reportedly there is only one or two stones, supposedly Peter Kearns and his second wife.

I thought I had an email from a descendant of this second wife, but it's not in a Kearns/Kearnes file now that I am looking for it. I'll put a search for the burial sites on my to-do list.

Again, thanks for all this great stuff. Will let you know about the stone search.

Last summer I visited Ohio County looking for Mills and Richardsons. Harry D Tinsley was in the Court House, gave me background information on the families of Barnett's Creek, and helped me find a few estates. He suggested I ask Jerry Long at the library in Owensboro for more ideas. At that point I recalled that I had corresponded with Jerry Long on a Shelby Co KY family, the Robinsons. I haven't worked on Mills/Richardson since last summer, but I am now going to follow Harry Tinsley's advice. Jerry, do you have an ideas for me?

If Jerry sees this email: I haven't worked on Robinsons since we last talked in August of 2001. At that time we deplored that Jane Robinson Carson Moore's monument was placed in a Carson cemetery in Ohio County, whereas her death was reported by family in Montgomery Co IN. I think she is buried at Indian Creek Cemetery, where her son James McMullen reportedly was buried. I find no tombstones for James or his wife Martha VanCleave, so there very likely is none for Jane Moore. To further confuse the issue, James was reportedly buried in Terre Haute, but I think the reference should have been to Indian Creek Cemetery on the Terre Haute Road. It makes no sense for James to have been buried in Terre Haute, Vigo County, where he never lived.

Thank You for your reply to my email. I apologize about the Miss communication communication of your maiden name. I see know where your Gillaspy line fits in, and YES, we have a connection.

James Gillaspy married Mary Robinson on January 25Th, 1785 in Botetourt County, Virginia. They were married by a Presbyterian Minister named Edward Crawford. They had seven known children, 5 boys and two girls.

Mary Robinson's Mother was Elizabeth Fulton Robinson, with Fulton being her maiden name. Elizabeth F. was the first born daughter of James and Mary Robinson Gillaspy. She was named after her maternal grandmother, hence her full name being Elizabeth Fulton Gillaspy. She was born in Botetourt County, Virgina 1788 The only other information I have on Elizabeth is that she married William McWilliams on May 10, 1810, in Henry County, Kentucky. The other 6 six children of James and Mary Robinson Gillaspy are:

- 1. William Gillaspy b. July 20 1786
- 2. James Fulton Gillaspy b. c.1790
- 3. Robert Gillaspy b. Feb. 14, 1793
- 4. Jane Gillaspy b. c.1795
- 5. George Gillaspy b. January 25, 1797
- 6. Mary Gillaspy b. 1799 probably born Shelby Co. Ky.

James inherited 20 pounds from his fathers estate in 1798. He appears on the Shelby County Kentucky tax list of 1797, which leaves me to believe he and his family already lived in Kentucky when his father Robert died. We also find James in the tax list for Shelby Co. Ky. dated August 7, 1800. But he is not listed anywhere after that. His wife Mary Robinson Gillaspy appears in the 1801 and 1802 Shelby County, Ky. tax list. From 1803 to 1805 there are no Gillaspy or variations. In the Shelby Co. Ky order book of Oc tober 1806, The court grants Mary Robinson Gillaspy to administer her died husbands estate, with John James, and John Gillaspie, as her security. The order states that James died about some 6 years ago, which would be the last half of the year, 1800. This fits in with the fact we find James in 1800, but not 1801. Mary and the children inventory and sell James property, and move back to Virginia. Perhaps she and the children were in Virginia between 1803 and 1805, and they came back in 1806 to settle the estate. Before 1810 Mary and the children return to Kentucky, in Henry County with other members of their family. Mary remarried a man named James Connell, in Henry County, Ky. Her son George Gillaspy marries Catherine Smith, on June 17, 1818 in Henry Co. Ky. (Although I have not been able to locate a death record for Mary, other sources show she died about 1823 in Henry Co. Ky) This matches up with the fact that in 1823 James and Mary Robinson Gillaspy's sons move to Johnson County, Indiana. This includes William, Robert, George, and James F. Gillaspy.

Good news! My family member in California sent me a reply regarding the book "Buchanan and Gillespie". Apparently, he has a copy of the entire book, its second publication. He obtained it from Mr. David B. Trimble @ 2506 Hartford Road, Austin Texas 78703. My family member is Richard Gillaspy, and he stated he himself is the one who contacted the above David Trimble to purchase the book. Mr. Gillaspy said he may contact you directly. Some where in his records is the name of the genealogist who

compiled Mr. Trimbles work in Martinsville. I will check my records again to see what I can find, it may be in some other records he has sent me.

As for copies, both are in the mail! One to you at the address you gave me, and one to Mr. Long at the Library address you sent me this AM. Both should arrive within a few days. Perhaps I will write Mr. Trimble in Texas as well, and see about getting a complete copy of the book for my records. Mr. Long can contact him too. I am still unsure about the Dr. Trimle/ Mr. David B. Trimble thing, but will be sure to ask. Feel free to send a copy of this email to Mr. Long if you like. Jamie

2. Hi Jamie, Sometimes the best research time is early morning when it's quiet. I don't have a thing on Mary Robinson Gillaspy but will forward to Jerry. Since James Gillaspy died in KY, she might be buried beside him. If she outlived Mr Connell, she might be buried beside him. If he had been married previously, she might be buried on one side of him with the with his first wife on the other. Another possibility is to look at cemeteries where her children are buried. If she lived to be older, she may have been living in one of her children's households. The boys came to Johnson Co IN, I remember you said. Perhaps she stayed in KY with a daughter. The most likely reason for the Robinsons to come to KY would be inexpensive land for their growing families. They weren't a likely group to be forced off their land like some pacifists in VA. As far as I know, Jerry has not been able to pin down military service. I know I haven't, though there are some suggestions that Robinsons may have been involved in a war or military service. There are references to Captain Robinson in the Draper papers but no proofs as yet.

I only have family history on Jane Robinson, because her oldest living son, Thomas McMullen came to Indiana with the VanCleaves. As far as I know, none of his relatives came along, thus breaking my information chain. I also know little about the DAR process, but I know they have workshops and local help for potential members. At this point I think that is your best bet. Wish I could help you more.

I'm cc-ing to Jerry Long, in case he has suggestions. Your packet came today, by the way, and I will look it over later tonight. Thanks very much. I still recall I need to send you a McMullen history that mentions Jane. You are on my to-do list! Joe has surgery this week, and I'm sure I will be delayed. I do not have a lot of info on Mary or her family, other than the Gallaspy's, and James has been tough to track. I am thinking if I could add a little info on the Robinson side, I may be able to figure out what happened to James. Maybe even why they left Virginia to move to Kentucky. I have a hard time convincing myself that he would not have been a soldier somewhere. Especially since his older brother is in the DAR book, and I can prove James's father, Robert, was at the Battle of Point Pleasant in Oct. of 1774. Any info or help would be greatly appreciated. I am trying to fill in the missing gaps, for my DAR application. Again, thank you for your emails.

In October 1806 in Shelby Co., KT when Mary Robinson Gillaspy was appointed to administer the estate of her late husband one of sureties was John Gillaspie. I suspect that this is the same, John Gillespie, who married Peggy / Margaret Robinson in Shelby Co., KY on 8 May 1806 (a younger sister of Mary Robinson Gillaspy). Was this John a son of Isabella Gillespie & her cousin, James Gillespie? If so he would be a brother, of William Gillespie, who married another Robinson sister, Arminta, in Shelby Co., KY on 24 Jan 1809 and a nephew of James & Mary (Robinson) Gillaspy. In the Trimble book was there any additional info on p245 about the families of William & John Gillespie who married Mary Robinson's sisters.

Is there any documents that list the heirs of James & Mary (Robinson) Gillaspy? What documentation that proves that Mary's mother was Elizabeth Fulton? In responce to an earlier question I do not know anything about the burial place of Mary Robinson Gillaspy.

Thank you for sending the Van Cleave books. I really appreciate all of the work you did in preparing these manuscripts. It has taken me several days to study over them.

How far back in your family has the old spelling of "Van Cleave" been used? James William Van Cleave (1845-1925) utilized, possibly for uniformity, this spelling throughout his family history; however, it appears that many also used the spelling of "Vancleave". Did your great-grandfather, Joseph Albert Van Cleave (1849-1916) use this spelling? Do you know what spelling his parents used or what was used on their gravestones? His grandparents, Benjamin & Matilda B. (Taylor) appear to have used the spelling of "Vancleave". Vancleave is what appears on their gravestones (see enclosed copy) and in most public records. You list your 3rd great-grandfather, Benjamin Van Cleave (1796-1854) as having a middle name of "Munson". Can I ask what source

shows this? I have found only one source that reports a middle initial for him. In the 1850 Montgomery County, IN census (see enclosed copy) he was listed as Benjamin S. Vancleave.

Do you have a copy of the original marriage record for Benjamin Van Cleave & Matilda B. Taylor? I have seen their marriage date reported both as 11th & 12th August 1818. Also his sister, Margaret's, marriage to Benjamin B. Taylor, is reported as both 3rd & 8th Sep 1825. Myron E. Anderson, a great-great-grandson of Mary Elizabeth Van Cleave (d/o Benjamin Van Cleave & Matilda B. Taylor) reported her dates as 11 April 1822 & 30 July 1914. Mr. Anderson and several other researchers have reported that Cornelius, son of Benjamin Van Cleave & Matilda B. Taylor, as having a middle name of "Johnson". This appears reasonable because his aunt, Mary B. (Taylor) Van Cleave, was married to a Cornelius Johnson in Montgomery County, IN on 4 July 1839. What source reports Cornelius Van Cleave's middle name as "Jackson"?

In the intro to your book, "History of the Van Cleave, McMullen and Taylor Families" from the notes of James William Van Cleave you have an excerpt from <u>Men of Science</u> <u>in America</u> that was included in Dr. William E. Van Cleave's Family History. I have seen Dr. Van Cleave's manuscript referred to but have never seen it. Does it contain any data on the four children of John Peyton Taylor, who married into the Van Cleave family, or on their families, or on the family of James McMullen & Martha Van Cleave?

I have enclosed the following:

- Revised copy of article, "John Peyton Taylor Family Record" by Jerry Long, (8 p).
- 1997 query by Ginger Taylor on Taylors of Prince Georges Co., MD (1 p); I mentioned finding this on the Prince Georges County GenWeb Internet page in our phone conversation. So far I have found no clues on locating Ginger Taylor. I sent an E-mail to the address given but it was returned.
