So, my question to you is - have you come across anything to link Stephen to his parents - and who were they?

I recently discovered that he is a 2nd cousin of my father. I at first had difficulty in explaining to Mr. Long to understand why I was asking questions about his family. After telling him several facts I already knew about his family he began to reply to my questions. He was born on 2 Sep 1925 in Dallas, TX to Maurice T. Long & Genell F. Starnes. He did not know his grandparents names or any siblings of his father. Never heard of a Fred Long. He did know that he had some Niblo cousins. Said his dad did not marry a second time; did not know that he was married to a Henrietta. His mother later married Earl Entrekin, her only other husband he knew of. She was born in Waco, TX and is buried at the Westminister Cemetery in Westminister, CA. Did not know his mother's middle name. Mr. Long while serving in the Marine Corps during World War II he was wounded with shrapnel on the island of Okinawa on 30 May 1944, he later recuperated in Hawaii before returning to the US. In January 1946 he went to live in California, where his mother was already residing. He worked as a truck driver. He married Susan Grant in

1989 in Orange, CA; she is still living. He does not have any children. Has lived in Oregon for 20 years. He said he did not have any old family pictures or documents.

Helen:

After doing a little research on Kent Worth Coffman (1859-1913) I have concluded that the 1885 death notice for him was in error and have deleted it. I added the following note to his 1913 obituary: TM - 1885: 7/2 p.4 ("Prof. Kent Coffman, of Sacramento, was reported dead yesterday. Prof. Coffman was recently a candidate for Representative and was defeated for the Democratic nomination by only ten votes. Since the primary election he has been lying ill with brain fever." - note: the report of his death was a mistake, possibly the confusion was over the illness of his wife, Lillie Hewlett Coffman, who died one month later on 1 August 1885).

The only Kent Coffman I could find in Kentucky was Kent Worth Coffman, who is listed with his parents in the 1860, 1870 & 1880 McLean County, KY censuses and with his second wife in the 1900 & 1910 Owensboro, KY censuses. He married 1st Lillie Hewlett in Hopkins County, KY on 5 July 1882. His 2nd marriage to Felecia Alice Livingston was also in Hopkins County - listing of marriages on the Hopkins County GenWeb site lists the marriage date as 6 July 1887, his obituary however, reports it as 21 June 1887.

In 1987 I compiled a booklet on the Thurston family. I researched the family for the Historical Highway Marker at Thruston here in Daviess County. One of the granddaughters of Algernon Sidney Thurston for whom Thurston was named married Dr. John Marvin Coffman. David Ada Todd, was born 15 Sep 1877 Daviess Co., KY, died 25 Dec 1912 in Owensboro and was buried there in Elmwood Cemetery. She married first Griffith Weir in Owensboro on 14 May 1902 and she married John Marvin Coffman in Owensboro on 27 Feb 1908. She had one child, Jean Todd Coffman, who was born 10 Feb 1909 Owensboro, died 22 May 1980 Owensboro, buried there in Elmwood Cemetery, married William P. Sandidge on 5 July 1930 in Perry County, IN. I have attached some articles about the marriage of John Marvin Coffman & David Ada Todd.

I would be very surprised if the Kentucky State Archives has any records on this. The only way they might is if the Hancock County Archives has sent them the Circuit Court files in recent years. The only record about this I know of is the Hancock County Circuit Court suit that we have discussed several times - Horace & Susan Young, plaintiffs, versus Samuel Wheatley, Box 38, bundle 110(? or 190), file #1319, filed 29 June 1896, in the suit Wheatley denied paternity and in final judgment he was ordered to pay \$50.00 and costs of plaintiffs in suit). I believe this suit was the end of the affair legally. This file was still in the Hancock County Archives room in about 1990 when I made notes from it. Beyond this suit no further litigation was probably required. It would only have gone further if paternity needed to be established for an inheritance. I doubt if any inheritance was involved. The 1960 Kentucky death certificates recently arrived at the library. I have gone through all of the certificates for Daviess County and several of the surrounding counties. In checking for burials at Greenwood Cemetery I was very surprised to find seven names that we did not previously know of. The seven additions are listed below.

There were thirty-four burials in all that were found to be buried there in 1960. The newest additions bring the grand total of known burials at Greenwood to 2,303. There are 257 additions since the publication of the Greenwood book.

I also recently discovered another vet that was not previously submitted. He is: Kelly, Robert V. 12 Feb 1907 29 Apr 1959

Christopher Columbus "Kit" Jackson's daughter Tunney Jackson married to Walter Scott Jones. Walter Scott and Tunney Jones had Sallie Smith Jones (my grandmother) married C.C. Collins. C.C. and Sallie Jones Collins had Lorraine Antionette (yes, this was correct spelling) Collins (my mother) married Richard A. Bowers. Interesting note is that all three of Gabriel Jackson's sons died before he did. Two of them were murdered (including "Kit") and all three were said to have died with their boots on. A researcher for the PBS TV show, "History Detectives", called the Kentucky Room. They had been submitted a story about two pistols that were sold at an auction that were identified as belonging to John P. Thompson of Owensboro. They had been bought by him in Louisville, KY about the time of the Civil War period and were carried by him during the war. They were researching the guns as a possible show. They knew that he was a Confederate soldier in the Civil War and was arrested on the river near Owensboro for trying to recruit Confederate soldiers in Union territory and he reportedly lived and died in Owensboro. They wanted to learn more about him. When and where he died and was buried. After researching for about two hours I returned Ms. Laks call and talked to her for about half an hour about what I had found about him. John P. Thompson was referred to the 1883 "History of Daviess County". He raised one of the first rebel outfits in Daviess County and was appointed captain of the company. The group Dixie Guards left Owensboro on 28 May 1861 to join up with the Confederate Army in Northern Virginia. I found several articles that referred to this company and to his capture in May 1863 near Henderson. The 1860 & 1870 Daviess County censuses showed that he was born 1831-32 Kentucky; and married Nelia, between 1860-68 and in 1870 they had two sons, John Jr. (born 1867-8 VA) & William C. (born 1869 KY). He served as Circuit Court Clerk of Daviess County (1856-1862 & 1868-1872) and died in Owensboro on 3 April 1872. There were many deeds recorded in the Daviess County deed books by him and his sisters whereby they were transferring land that they had inherited from their father, Philip Thompson. His father and grandfather were quite noted figures in the history of Daviess County. He was the son of Philip Thompson (1789-1836) & Sallie Clay Moseley and grandson of Revolutionary War soldier, Thomas Moseley. His father was a lawyer, had participated in a celebrated duel with Robert Triplett and was killed in a street fight in Owensboro in 1836. John P.'s parents were moved from the old Rural Hill Cemetery along east fifth street to Elmwood Cemetery in 1879. Several of their children are also buried at Elmwood. I could not find a gravestone for John P. Thompson. I promised I would go to Elmwood and check in the Philip Thompson plot to see if John P. had a gravestone there. She asked for scans of several items I had mentioned. She also asked if there were any way to discover where he had lived and if there were still any Civil War era structures in Owensboro. I also checked the Daviess County Wills, Estate Settlements & Guardian Bond books, WPA's Registration of Veteran's graves for Daviess County for John P. Thompson & children.

I have attached an article about the capture of John P. Thompson (c1831-1872) near Henderson from the "Owensboro Monitor" of Wednesday, 27 May 1863. Also I have attached two newspaper articles that reflect on John P.'s father, Philip Thompson (1789-1836). One is from the "Owensboro Messenger & Examiner" of 2 August 1883 and the other from the "Owensboro Daily Tribune" of 20 June 1896 (the latter is in two parts the top and bottom of the newspaper column). The 1896 article gives the wrong death year for Philip Thompson - it was on 25 Nov 1836. I will attach some other items on Philip Thompson in a second e-mail.

I have attached two biographies of Philip Thompson (1789-1836). One is from the 1883 "History of Daviess County, Kentucky" (p147) and the other from the book, "Ohio County, Kentucky, in the Olden Days" (by Harrison D. Taylor, c1926, pp.82-85).

Pictures of the grave stones of Philip Thompson & his wife, Sallie Clay Moseley Thompson, at Elmwood Cemetery in Owensboro, KY can be seen on findagrave.com. Their son, John P. Thompson (c1831-1872) is not listed.

John P. "Jack" Thompson according to the 1883 "History of Daviess County, Kentucky" served as Circuit Court Clerk of Daviess County 1856-1862 and 1868-1872 (p105). He held this office at the time of his death on 3 April 1872, he died of brain fever (p424). He organized one of the first Confederate companies in Daviess County. He was the Captain of the Dixie Guards (Company G, 1st Kentucky Infantry) that left Owensboro on 28 May 1861 for Richmond, VA. He became a POW when he surrendered to Captain Hornbrook on 17 May 1863.

I checked the Philip Thompson family plot. Located in west end of section A between 14th & 17th rows uphill from the Old Harford Road. Philip & his wife, Sally Clay's, inscriptions were very legible, as well as their children's – Mary Thompson, William B. Thompson, Sarah Claiborne Pearl & Kate M. Craig. Parts of the monuments for their children Daniel Thompson, Susan B. Watkins & Emily Scarborough I could not read. Found one monument in the plot that could not be read. It was laying flat on the ground. Only parts of its inscription could be made out, including last name of Thompson, child of "Hon. Phil. & Sally", first name

could possibly be Martha, death date could not decipher, and age looked like 19, at very top it looked like "Our Sister". A large top of an obelisk monument was off of its base and laying face down in the ground. It was the top of Sarah Claiborne Pearl monument. I found no evidence of a gravestone for Philip's son, John P. Thompson (c1831-1872). All of Philip's other children are all buried in this plot and it is reasonable that John P. would also be there.

Over the weekend I visited Elmwood Cemetery. I checked the family lot of Philip & Sally (Moseley) Thompson. It is on a ridge near the west end of section A, one of the older sections in the cemetery. In this plot eight children of Philip & Sally have marked graves. Their only child who does not have a gravestone there is John Philip Thompson. There are, however, open areas in the plot where he could be buried. John P. may never have gotten a monument since he was the last surviving child of his parents. This often occurs in families. Also it could be that he had a monument but it was broken and removed over the years.

It was beginning to look like when I wrote you today all I could tell you about John P. Thompson's final resting place was my belief that he was buried at Elmwood Cemetery in his parents' family plot. Today, however, while doing some work on an unrelated project I found proof that John P. Thompson was indeed buried at Elmwood Cemetery. Here at the Kentucky Room one of my ongoing projects is abstracting death notices and historical articles in the old Owensboro newspapers for our online Owensboro Obituary Index on the Daviess County Library's Web site (dcplibrary.org). The first page I worked on today was the 26 May 1890 issue of the "Owensboro Inquirer" (p1, copy is attached). On this page was an article entitled, "Decoration Day – Graves of Federal and Confederate Soldiers at Elmwood to be Decorated, Friday, May 30". One of the four Confederate soldiers noted was John P. Thompson. His father, Phil Thompson, a veteran of the War of 1812 was also noted in the article. I believe this proves that John P. was interred at Elmwood Cemetery. Sometimes we just get lucky and make accidental discoveries.

Out of curiosity about what happened to John P. Thompson's family I did a little more research over the weekend. You probably know the following already but I thought I would mention it just in case. John P. Thompson married Maria Cornelia Cave in Orange County, Virginia on 19 Dec 1865. She was the daughter of William Porter Cave & Isabella Delacy. She was born in New York City on 4 July 1842. She is listed in the 1880 & 1900 censuses of Orange County, VA; the latter census reported that she was the mother of three children, one of whom was then deceased. Cornelia died on 9 April 1903 and was buried in the Cave

(Montebello) Cemetery in Orange County, VA. Two of her children are buried in the same cemetery – William Cave Thompson (born 1869 KY died 1871?) and Isabella delacy Cave Gray (24 Nov 1871 KY – 2 May 1962, wife of Leslie H. Gray). The third child of John P. & Cornelia, John Philip Thompson, Jr., was born in June 1867 Orange County, VA and died there on 18 March 1945, he married Florence B. Kemper during 1899-1900. Interestingly a Civil War diary of John Philip Thompson (1831/2-1872) survives. It was kept by him while a prisoner on Johnson's Island. I did not get to see the original diary only a catalog reference to it.

The family of John P. Thompson has many interesting interconnections to the early history of our county - Daviess County. His father was a US Congressman and was quite noted for other circumstances of his life. John P.'s grandfather, Thomas Moseley, was a Revolutionary War soldier – at his home the first court of Daviess County was held. His grave in a family cemetery, here in Owensboro, is one of only three known graves of Revolutionary War soldiers in the county. He has had numerous illustrious descendants. John P. Thompson's four brothers-in-law were all prominent citizens of Owensboro – George Scarborough was the most noted early educator of the city, an addition to the city was named for him and Dr. Francis M. Pearl was a doctor and a city street is named for him.

If you have any biographical items related to John P. Thompson, such as his diary, that you could share, we would greatly like to have copies for our collection. If you should decide to use John P. Thompson for a televised episode please let us know.

Met them at Kentucky Room. Early in the day they had visited several cemeteries in the Magan area of Ohio County. They did not know about the Cap (Midkiff) Cemetery near Beech Valley, where their 4th great-grandfather, James G. Midkiff, is buried. I explained how to get there. Gave them 73 pages I had copied on several

of their family lines (Baughn, Westerfield, Midkiff, Bruce & Taylor). They had a copy of the obituary of their grandfather, Albert Dee Baughn (1890-1948).

Did you receive the e-mail below (with one attached page) on Monday afternoon? Your subsequent e-mail made no reference to it so I am not sure if it got there are not. The two separate e-mails I sent last Friday contained a total of seven different attachments. I will resend each of these after receiving confirmation that you got the following. The reference about Phil Thompson's large land holdings was from the 17 September 1895 (not 1986) issue of the "Owensboro Daily Tribune". There are numerous deeds whereby John P. Thompson and his sisters sold lands inherited from their father. A lot of these lots were along Frederica Street now Owensboro's busiest thoroughfare.

Hi Jerry, First and foremost, thank you for your incredible research!

No, I did not receive an email from you yesterday afternoon. Perhaps the attachment was problematic. The file "Owensboro Inquirer 1890.jpg" did go through this time around. The 1890 Owensboro Inquirer reference to J. P Thompson's and Phil Thompson's is quite the coincidence! The email I received on Friday had three attachments: Owensboro-Monitor, Messenger Examiner, and Owensboro Tribune. These were the only attachments that came through from you on Friday. Most likely our server blocked the email as the files totaled over 8MB.

RE Thompson properties in Owensboro: The Thompson relative that we are in communication with mentioned that seven of J. P. Thompson's properties in Owensboro burned down while J.P. Thompson in Virginia marrying Maria Cornelia Cave. However, she thinks that two properties did survive. Did the deeds you came across mention any structures or buildings? Perhaps the deed was only for the lot as the homes/buildings were destroyed in the fire.

RE the Civil War diary of John Philip Thompson and other biological related items: I believe the relative we are in contact with has this diary, but I have not seen any writings from it. I would think that she would be more than happy to share her documents with you. I will ask the producer to ask the relative if she would mind if you contacted her. We may request that you contact her after we finish filming the story- the pistols are a sensitive topic (they were stolen from the family home in Montebello in the late 1970s).

- 1. I have ten more pages that I will send as attachments today. I will attach each to a separate e-mail. The first is from the book "History of Kentucky" published by Richard H. Collins in 1874 (p228). He mentions the death of John P. Thompson in a chronology. An entry for the date of April 3, 1872 was "Death, at Owensboro, of Maj. John P. Thompson, clerk of the Daviess co. circuit court; he was the first man in Ky. who raised a company of soldiers for the Confederate army." The other six attachments are about the Dixie Guards (Company G – First Kentucky Infantry). Four pages is a roll of the company published in the volume "Report of the Adjutant General of the State of Kentucky: Confederate Kentucky Volunteers - War 1861-65" (pp.22-25). The company consisted of 101 men, 94 of whom enlisted at Owensboro and others enrolled at Richmond, VA. Two other pages are copies of an article, "Long List Of The Men of 1861: From Daviess County Who Joined Confederate Army – 'Dixie Guards' First Company To March Away" (from "Owensboro Daily Messenger" of 21 May 1905 p.1, part of the bottom of this article was damaged). The final three pages are from a thesis by a local historian, Aloma Dew that contained a reference to John P. Thompson and the Dixie Guards. Best wishes, Jerry Long
- 2. I studied the Daviess County deed records yesterday. I had hoped to learn where John P. Thompson was actually residing at when he died. There were many deeds between 1850 and his death whereby he was selling land. However, none of the deeds suggested the property was his actual residence. Almost all were for land that he had inherited from his father's estate. Many were town lots that were located in what was known as Scarborough's addition to Owensboro. George Scarborough married the eldest daughter of Philip Thompson and was the administrator of his father-in-law's estate. These lots were just west of the original town limits that were laid out on the original plat of the city. I was able to learn where Philip Thompson's home was located based on a later newspaper reference and the deed books. It was located on the west side of Frederica Street between 2nd (main) & 3rd streets just across from the Daviess County Courthouse. By the mid 1880's Guenther Hardware Company store was located on the site (224-226 Frederica Street). This business continued there until about 1967 when it was torn down. Subsequently the Owensboro National Bank was located there. Just in the last few years the bank

I had previously done a little work on James M. Howard (1803-1883) because his wife, Magalene Jackson, was a first cousin of one of my ancestors and several of his descendants tie into my Pate line. I gave it another try and still was unable to come up with any proof of who the father of James & his half-brother, William L.

Howard, is. The obituary of James states he was born at Hartford and in the 1799-1806 Ohio County tax lists there are only three Howards - Eilhu, Robert & Mark. Mark Howard lived on Panther Creek in what became Daviess County and there is documentation of his children and he cannot be the father. William L. Howard, James' half-brother, according to his gravestone at Elmwood Cemetery in Owensboro was born 1 Nov 1822 and died 9 Oct 1900. I could find no obituary for him in the Owensboro newspapers, his wife, Louisa had one in 1899 and his son, Jeff in 1903. The year of 1822 for William agrees with his listing in the 1860, 1870, 1880 & 1900 censuses. A record of his marriage to Louisa Berry, in 1857 in Daviess County, appears in the 1852-1861 vital statistics kept by the state of Kentucky. This record gives his place of birth as Breckinridge County, KY. I could not find William in the 1850 census. I checked the Breckinridge County tax lists for the years of 1820-1823 and the following are the Howards listed -Christopher and at least two different William Howards. I was hoping that the names of Robert or Elihu who had earlier been in Ohio County might appear. I could not locate Robert or Elihu Howard in the 1810 or 1820 censuses of Kentucky. If William L. Howard's father was in Breckinridge County circa 1822 it may be that you can locate something about a Robert or Elihu Howard in the deed or other early county records there. James M. later resided in Breckinridge County also suggesting that might be where his parents may have been. Best wishes, Jerry Long, Kentucky Room

I would like to offer a couple of comments about your recent article, "PBS show gunning for Owensboro man". I offer my comments only because I don't know how the PBS report will play out and from your article I am not sure if you are aware of these points.

Were you aware that the Kentucky Room of the Daviess County Library had provided crucial elements to their story? In recent articles in several other

Kentucky newspapers the Kentucky Historical Society, where the episode was filmed, has gained credit for their assistance but nowhere is our library cited. Also on the PBS.org site they allude to the Kentucky Historical Society but nowhere give any mention of Owensboro's contribution. I am hoping that the PBS's episode will give some suggestion of our role.

Last December representatives of the "History Detectives" contacted the Kentucky Room. The main question they presented was: "What happened to John P. Thompson?" "When and where did he die and where was he buried?" They had not been able to discover this from their prior contacts, including members of his family, the Virginia Historical and Kentucky Historical Societies. I was able to document this very crucial ending to their story. From two published sources, "History of Kentucky" by Richard Collins (1874) and "History of Daviess County, Kentucky" (1883) I learned that John P. Thompson died of brain fever here in Owensboro on 3 April 1872.

I first had difficulty documenting his place of burial. After visiting his parent's family lot at Elmwood Cemetery in Owensboro I felt sure that he was buried there. But because no monument could be found for him and since the Cemetery burial records and Owensboro newspapers for the period of his death are missing it seemed that documentation would be missing. However, a few days after the show's initial contact I returned to my ongoing project of indexing the Owensboro newspapers for deaths and historical items for our online Owensboro Obituary Index on the Daviess County Library's Web site (dcplibrary.org). To my surprise the very first article and page I looked at provided proof that John P. Thompson was indeed buried here at Elmwood Cemetery. On this page was an article entitled, "Decoration Day – Graves of Federal and Confederate Soldiers at Elmwood to be Decorated, Friday, May 30" (26 May 1890 issue of the "Owensboro" Inquirer"). One of four Confederate soldiers noted was John P. Thompson. His father, Phillip Thompson, a veteran of the War of 1812 was also noted in the article. Sometimes we just get lucky and make accidental discoveries. I have since found other articles surrounding Memorial Day in subsequent years that note that the grave of John P. Thompson at Elmwood was one of those honored.

I also provided other biographical information to the PBS show about John P. Thompson, including data on his parentage and their prominent role in the history of this county; location of his family's residence in Owensboro; articles that provided data about the Civil War unit, the Dixie Guards, that he organized; article from the "Owensboro Monitor" about his capture in 1863; and information on his service as Daviess County Circuit Court clerk. Representatives of the show stated that several views of the two Daviess County courthouses, where John P. Thompson served, that we scanned and sent would probably be used in their broadcast.

If the "History Detectives" episode fails to give any credit to Owensboro's contribution to their story it would be a very callous oversight. Without learning the fate of John P. Thompson their story would essentially have no ending.

The second comment I offer is about a reference that appears on the PBS' site. The "Antiques Roadshow" appraiser stated that what John P. Thompson did was "not too big a deal." I realize that this is not your comment but I personally

feel this statement is in error. Yes, Thompson did indeed spend a large part of the War imprisoned. However, the unit he organized here a few days following the first shots of the war was the first company of soldiers raised in Kentucky for the Confederate Army. This statement is made in Collins' reputable "History of Kentucky" (Vol.1, p228). It was not just the first unit raised in Daviess County but was the first in the entire state. Thompson was an officer and a leader. In the second year of the war Thompson was promoted from Captain to the rank of Major and was sent back to Kentucky to recruit others for the Confederate cause. In this very dangerous endeavor he was captured near Henderson in 1863. At first it was ordered that he be shot as a spy but mercifully his sentence was changed to imprisonment. John P. Thompson spent the final two years of the Civil War imprisoned at Fort Delaware and Johnson's Island. Enduring two years of the hardships of imprisonment adds to his meritorious service – it certainly does not detract from it!

The family of John Phillip Thompson also adds significant import to his story. His parents, Phillip Thompson (1789-1836) & Sallie Clay Moseley, were one of the most prominent families of the early history of Owensboro. His grandfather, Thomas Moseley, a Revolutionary War veteran, is buried in Owensboro. At his home the first court of the newly formed county of Daviess was held in 1815. John P. Thompson's father was the first resident lawyer of Owensboro and one of the county's first representatives in the US Congress. His father was also celebrated because of his participation in a famous duel with Robert Triplett. He was severely wounded in his meeting with Triplett on an island opposite Owensboro in 1829. It is claimed that the pistol used by Triplett was the same one by which Aaron Burr killed Alexander Hamilton. Phillip Thompson's notoriety was added to because he owned an extensive part of the western half of Owensboro, he erected the first school in Owensboro about 1820 and because he was stabbed to death in a fight on the Owensboro streets in 1836. Another illustrious family connection of John P. Thompson was the marriage of his son, John P., Jr. to Florence Kemper, whose father, James Lawson Kemper, was a Confederate general and a Virginia governor.

To me the circumstances surrounding the life of John P. Thompson was "a very big deal."

Hopefully the "History Detectives" in its episode will yet make some reference to Owensboro's contribution to the show. Their internet site, however, has given me doubts.

The first two censuses of Kentucky, in 1790 and 1800, were destroyed. In book form tax records have been put together in order to create a substitute for the lost censuses. In the first tax list of Ohio County in 1799 "William Smeathers" is listed and in the 1800 list he appears as "William Smothers". The tax lists for this period make no designation of towns or neighborhoods; only nearest water courses of any land holdings is given. In the 1799 & 1800 tax lists William is not shown as being taxed on land that he owned. The first surviving census of Kentucky is the 1810. "William Smethers" is listed in the 1810 census of Ohio County, KY, but again no differentiation that shows Yellow Banks is given. The only town for Ohio County that is given a separate listing in 1810 was the county seat of Hartford. In the 1821 tax book of Daviess County appears "A list of the white males over 21 in Owensborough". They were: George Hanley, Daniel Moseley, Brice P. Duncan, David Morton, Wm. W. Franklin, Christo. Jones, Isaac Kennady, Phillip Triplett, P. Simpson, Ira Hathaway, Elisha Adams, J. M. Rogers, Alexander Moreland, J. McHendle, James W. Johnston, John Roberts, Wm. R. Griffith, P. Thompson [this is Phillip Thompson father of John P. Thompson], James Talbot, Samuel Smith, Thos. Potts, Willis M. Pickett, William Adams, John Parks, Thomas Moseley Senr., J. G. Livers, Jesse Kincaid, James Hiatt, James Sands, William Lampton, John Churchhill Jr., James Higgins, John Proctor, J. J. Amos, A. Legrand and Samuel Harbez.

Mr. Cotter called to ask about the papers of Oswald Jett. He wanted to know if they contained anything about his ancestor Elias Lyons, who died in a Confederate prison during the Civil War. I told him I had some of Mr. Jett's papers and I would check. His grandmother was Emma Kay Lyons, who was the daughter of James Franklin Lyons and granddaughter of Elias Lyons.

Dear Mr. Long: many thanks for getting back to us so quickly even though a search of Mr. Jett's papers didn't turn up anything. Maybe all his information came through phone conversations with Mr. Norwood and he made a few notes he didn't think were worth keeping. We'll need to look into his books when we make our visit, probably in mid-September, to Owensboro. I hope we can meet you then. If you're referring to the handwritten information Juanita Lyons completed on the Elias Lyons line (and the other Lyons relatives, including my gt grandfather James Franklin Lyons) on file in your library, yes, Shelia Heflin found this material for us in 2011 along with Mr. Jett's Pioneer Paths Widen. Up to that time we knew nothing about Elias Lyons and Juanita's material is the source of what we know. Are there other papers or notes from her on deposit at the library, raw data, so to speak, on which she based her finished product?

Quite by chance we stumbled on the obituary database on your library's website yesterday - and then remembered you were the one who had done all that work! We found it very helpful in connecting some of the Lyons family members across generations. We also realize that that obituary may be the source for the date of death of Catherine Newton Lyons. If it is she, she appears as Mrs. Elias Lyons, having died in 1892. When we've asked others, who claimed that date of death, for their source, they couldn't tell us where they found the information. But we can see how it might have been assumed that she was the widow of Elias Lyons who died as a p.o.w. in Missouri in 1862. Of course, there were at least three other Eliases in the Lyons family, but they usually used middle initials. This is something else for us to check up on when we make it back to Owensboro.

Finally, I'd mentioned a Dr. Hale, located in Reynolds Station whose biography, or family history, Mr. Norwood is supposed to have used to get onto the track of his Lyons relatives. You'd told me there were several such Dr. Hales so we looked further and think the most likely suspect is one Josiah H. Hale, "physician and oculist," born 1831 or so. We'll need to see if the Owensboro library has a copy of a book about the Hale family or this particular Hale. But am I remembering correctly that his name is not well-known today?

Many thanks for your help with the Jett papers and for the time you spent with me on the phone. If we have a chance to meet you, I'd like to hear a little bit about Mr. Jett. He seems to have been a remarkable man.

I have been reviewing the laws. They seem quite specific in not allowing use of a cemetery 12 years after last burial for a park, place of entertainment or amusement, etc. The county knows the laws when dealing with vandals who destroy markers on other cemeteries, they know the laws when dealing with businesses that want to relocate a cemetery in order to put the land to other use. I would say the county might need to publish what laws do not apply to them. The law does not recognize a commemorative marker. The law is specific in that even if the cemetery is not recognizable as such, the documentation of burials qualifies to verify its existence.

With the current state of legal limbo of the cemetery, it poses a risk for contractors who are hired to 'work on the property.' Kentucky laws do not authorize use for other purposes without moving the graves, as I read them. They are buying quite a liability, but of course they can recognize the location, dig up the markers and fence from the cemetery and use the remainder of the property for park purposes.

I don't have a dog in the fight. It is just a black mark on Ohio County history, that has an opportunity to be easily and justly rectified. Good men we hope respect graves of others as they would their parents, children, etc.

His arrival to port of Philadelphia occurred in September 16, 1751 on the "Brothers". There is mention of a marriage to "Rachel, b. in 1742 in Baden, Durlach, Germany" in 1761, Rachel married Joachim Lehman, and to them a child named Rebecca was b. in 1762. Sarah Grooms b. 1768, married Joachim October 12, 1768 in Bedford County, Pennsylvania. I believe that the Rachael LAYMAN who appears on the 1811 Grayson Co. tax records was also the wife of Joachim. She would have been a second or third wife and possibly the mother of some of Joachim's children. The tax record entry is the only reference I have ever found of her, and I have no proof at this time that she was Joachim's wife. So another mystery; was there a Rachel in 1761 and a child Rebecca in 1762 and what about the Rachel, that appears in the tax records of 1811, Grayson County? Was she a daughter maybe, instead of a wife, that appears in the tax records of 1811, Grayson County? Now although the above information is compiled, my family's verbal history, birth records, marriages and Census records do not link up with Kentucky or for that matter Joachim in any way. Therefore there must be missing links or our family history side-stepped the trip to Kentucky, altogether. Our Ancestry records show: Jacob layman b. November 27, 1801 in Dauphin County, PA, d. July 4, 1868 in Mercer County, PA. His son Jacob Layman b. January 1, 1828, Mercer County, PA, d. November 26, 1915, Eckert, Delta County Colorado. James Henry Layman, b. January 31, 1859, Delaware, Mercer County, PA, d. March 28, 1949, St. Louis, MO. Jacob Franklin Layman b. November 22, Linn Creek, Camden County, MO, d, March 29, Montrose County, CO. Cleo Merlin Layman b. February 23, 1917 Lazear-Roger's Mesa, Delta County, CO, d. November 27, 1968, Grand Junction, CO. Ronald E. Layman b. January 3, 1947 in Pueblo, Pueblo County, CO, still kickin today. We believe Daniel Lehman b. September 14, 1768 Ralpho, Lancaster County, PA, d. April 19, Fairfield, Ohio and Catherine Shirk b. September 19, 1770 in Lebanon, PA, d. Columbia, Hamilton County, Ohio to be the parents of Jacob 1801 listed above. If Daniel and Catherine are Jacob's parents, how does Joachim Lorentz Lehman enter in? Based on your extensive research are there any answers that you are aware of? Can you point me in a direction that is not a circle? I have telephoned your Library, trying to speak with you and they provided one email address at the library. I obtained the other one through a Layman "cousin" who is researching the Layman, Long family lines. I understand the labor of love that has gone into your research for the past 20 years and believe your insight will be very helpful to our family, and in turn the DNA family as well. Thank you. The Sad and Strange Fate of a Kentucky Fisherman.

A correspondent from Culhoon, Ky., writing to the St. Louis Globe-Democrat, tells the following story:

There is a lonely deserted graveyard in the hills above Green River, fifteen miles south of here. It was once well kept, but that was long, long ago, before the little white church was built a few miles further on. There is a graveyard now near the little white church. It is well kept and has a more modern appearance than the old burying-place in the hills above the river. There is a sunken grave near the center of the old grave yard, above which there is a plain limestone slab upon which is rudely written the quaint inscription:

William Henry Larkin, 36 years old, He was killed by a catfish.

A native of the hills was found who had known William Henry Larkin in life, who also knew well the circumstances that caused his death. The aforesaid native's re-collection of the dates is very faulty, but as nearly as he could make it out, it was directly after the war between the States that William Henry Larkin, his esteemed friend and neighbor, met a tragic death. Bill Larkin, as he was known in the country around, kept the ferry over the Green River known as Larkin's Ferry. Besides the business of ferryman, he followed the humble avocation of fisherman,

and supplied the country folks with choice fresh fish. There was a big Baptist association in session a few miles away from the ferry, and Bill's fish trade was unusually large. He put out every trotline he had, and was doing a flourishing business. Business on the ferry was also good, and Bill was, to use the native's language, "making money hand over fist." One evening he left home "run" his trotline, and he was not until again his body was found cold in death. Bill's spirit had joined the great majority on the other shore. His body was found by a searching party the on the following day, hanging to one his trotlines. A large fish-hook was firmly fastened in the unfortunate man's clothing, and a few feet from him on the same trotline there was a large catfish. The supposition was that Bill was running the trotline when the big fish jerked the line, catching a hook in Bill's clothing and pulling him out of the boat into the water. The fish weighed thirty-six pounds and Bill was thirty-six years of age. Those single facts were looked upon by the simple country people thereabouts as positive evidence that Bill's taking off was the Divine will of Providence. Bill's funeral was the largest ever held in that community and his remains were laid to rest in the old churchyard beside his ancestors, with the simple ceremony of the primitive church, which he belonged in life. The grass and briars have grown over Bill's grave for a quarter a century or more, his widow still lives in the old-fashioned house near the river, and she carries on the business just the same as before Bill was drowned by the fish.

When I was compiling my obituary books I saw this article and included William Henry Larkin in my database. At the time I tried to locate something more about him but could not find anything. I did not find him in the 1850 thru 1880 Kentucky censuses and local cemetery listings. It is possible this is a "tall" tale not everything you read in newspapers is true. Also since no death date is given for him it is possible he died prior to 1850. I have no idea where "Larkin's Ferry" would be. If it was 15 miles south of Calhoun that would place it approximately in the South Carrollton area. In doing a Google search for "Larkin's Ferry" and Green River I did find one reference that suggests that there could have been a Larkin's Ferry along Green River. In the 1884 book "Annual Report of the Light-House Board of the United States" that lists navigation points there is a listed a "Larkin's Ferry. Only description is that it was 752 miles from Pittsburgh. However, other points appearing near it in the book are points in the Green River region. Best wishes, Jerry Long, Kentucky Room

Scott, I find no source that proves that Thomas Jefferson Smith (1835-1915) served as a soldier in the Civil War. In fact a couple of sources suggest that he did not. I have attached a biography of Thomas J. Smith from the Ohio County section of the 1885 book, "Kentucky: A History of the State (by Battle, Perrin & Kniffin). There is no mention of military service in his bio. Generally if they had served it would have been mentioned. A biography of his brother, David L. Smith, follows right after T. J.'s and it states that David was a Union Soldier (12th KY Cavalry) in the Civil War. T. J. had a detailed obituary in the "Hartford Herald" newspaper and it also makes no mention of service. The grave of T. J. Smith at Oakwood Cemetery in Hartford has no military marker. The T. J. Smith named in the 16 June 1886 that you mentioned I do believe is Thomas Jefferson Smith of Hartford, who married Nancy Norris. However, his name appears in the section labeled "non-soldier citizens of Ohio County". The names at the end of the article are county officials who are signing a petition addressed to the Kentucky Legislature concerning a pension law they were then considering. They were not soldiers. T. J. Smith at the time was County Court Clerk of Ohio County and that is the reason he is signing the petition. Thus he himself is saying he was a "non-soldier". In the Hartford Bicentennial book and other Ohio County sources I found no reference to a Thomas or T. J. Smith, who served in the Confederate army. I would like to thank KDLA for allowing me to complete or work toward my mission in life for the past twenty-five years. This decision has been a great service to the public. This statement needs considerable explanation.

I am a library associate at the Daviess County Public Library (DCPL). There I work in the Kentucky Room, the library's special collection of history and genealogy. I work there because I am a historian and genealogist. Before working in the Kentucky Room I was a professional genealogist and worked for a historical-genealogical book publishing company. I consider myself a historian not just a librarian. I only work in the Kentucky Room because it allows me to accomplish my mission in life. I love history and am dedicated to its preservation. I would be working somewhere else to achieve this mission if I was not at the DCPL.

My situation is quite atypical for public libraries. I am not the typical employee or librarian, who does just what is laid out in the job description and completes a 40-hour work week. My employment is not a "job". It is essentially my life. Due to my motivation I have accomplished far more that what was expected or required. I have sent a Word file of 44 pages that outline some of my accomplishments as part of the Kentucky Room. Some of these accomplishments are – nine books in the Library of Congress, over 200 articles on history & genealogy published in state and regional publications, 30 books in the card catalog of the DCPL that I have created and many other books & research tools in the Kentucky Room that I have compiled but are not cataloged under my name. Among the latter is the "Owensboro Area Obituary Index" on the DCPL's Internet site. The latter source is the most utilized online resource offered by my library and ranks with the best databases of its kind on the Internet – I am its primary creator. All of the resources cited are an effort to achieve the goals of the Kentucky Room.

Several years ago the director of the Kentucky Room, Shelia Heflin, a 33-year employee and one of the most accomplished master librarians in the state, thought that it was fair that I should be getting some credit for my work that was so far beyond expectations. She suggested that I start submitting documentation of my published sources to KDLA for the renewing of my librarian's certification. For several years I have done this and they were accepted. However, this past year and hence afterward they were classified as not being acceptable due to a change of standards revised in the 2010 KDLA catalog.

DCPL was informed that is "why some of his stuff cannot be counted any longer". When my work is just called "stuff" I cannot but take this as a disparagement of what I have done. Two of the salient points of why my published sources no longer qualify appear to be that they are not sufficiently library related and the periodicals that they were published in do not meet requirements. It may be considered that what I have done is not "Library" related but my work is pertinent to the very reason for the existence of the Kentucky Room. Since the Kentucky Room is part of the DCPL it is indeed related to the library's mission and is hence "Library" related. I have had articles published in some of the leading state and regional historical and genealogical publications. Why are these publications devalued and not considered credible? To rule that they do not measure up is somewhat prejudicial. Many of the articles I have written are over ten pages, some over twenty and the complexity and amount of research involved indeed makes them of comparable value to someone's opinion about a particular book or a seminar on the "Sensitivity Issues in the Workplace".

The work I have compiled is indeed a "continuing education" process. I believe that it has served me and our patrons well. It has allowed me to learn research techniques and familiarize myself with sources. It has allowed me to learn what has been described as an encyclopedic knowledge of local history and genealogy. These areas of knowledge due to my work equal or exceed those of master librarians in my department. My research skills are frequently acknowledged. I have been honored by the Kentucky Genealogical Society. Several years ago, James E. Starrs, a nationally known author and forensic scientist, visited the Kentucky Room to do research. After successfully uncovering several items that were meaningful to his search Mr. Starrs praised my ability as a researcher saying they were far above what he has found in most research facilities. This level of expertise is due to my compiling research that is now labeled stuff and not worthy of accreditation.

I am currently researching and writing an article about, John P. Thompson, who has not received appropriate credit in the histories of Owensboro and Daviess County. I was introduced to him when representatives of the PBS TV show, "History Detectives", contacted the Kentucky Room several months ago. They were preparing an episode about the Civil War derringers of John P. Thompson of Owensboro, KY. The main question they presented was: "What happened to John P. Thompson?" "When and where did he die and where was he buried?" They had not been able to discover this from their prior contacts, including members of his family, the Virginia Historical and Kentucky Historical Societies. I was able to document when he died here in Owensboro and that he was buried in an unmarked grave at Owensboro's Elmwood Cemetery. I also informed them of the fact that his claim to fame was that he organized and served as the captain of the very first Confederate outfit organized in Kentucky during the Civil War. When I complete this article on John P. Thompson I hope to have it published. I strongly disagree when you infer that such research is not credible.

I do not believe that there is a certifiable seminar or course that could have served me as well as what my research has accomplished for me and the patrons I have served. If you realized the time, effort and research that went into some of my work or if you were in the Kentucky Room and saw what I have done possibly your evaluation and decree might seem questionable. I realize that you have to have standards to go by – but I believe I meet those standards and possibly exceed them. Please keep in mind that the goal of KDLA is to see that librarians achieve a level that can best serve the public. At this point I doubt that there is another individual that could serve the Kentucky Room and our public in Daviess County as well as I do. Standards become artificial when not viewed in light of real situations. To dismiss the volume of my work and say that is not even worth a minute part of a "contact hour" credit seems quite unjust.

I have one reassuring thought. Once my librarian's certification expires and my employment terminates, my presence will continue at the DCPL. My work will continue to assist our patrons in countless ways for years to come. For most librarians their work ceases once they depart. Few will have the solace that their work will continue in such a salient manner.

The two cemeteries are close together and several Chancellor families were in this neighborhood. Sherman Chancellor (1908-1991) according to the Findagrave.com site is buried at the Beatty Cemetery. Several older Chancellors also have gravestones at the Beatty Cemetery. Listings of the Beatty and Friendship cemeteries are recorded consecutively in the book, "Hancock County, KY Cemeteries, Vol. 1", by WCK:FRA (pp.124-126). Friendship is listed, however, under the name of "Unnamed cemetery". If Perry Ryan reported that James Chancellor (1837-1910) was buried at Friendship I would bet he had a good source for this. In working with the old newspapers I can testify that a lot of what was reported in the old death notices is frequently wrong. Countless times I have seen people reported to be buried in a cemetery of a different name of where they actually have a

Please feel free to critique this. It is for the monument at Ohio County Poor Farm. Let me know what you think, I am supposed to submit later today, I can stall if you feel indicated. Helen - Ohio County Poor Farm was in existence from at least 1851 to after 1950 serving a population of black and white races, ages from infants to nearly 100. The residents included orphans, crippled, elderly, infirm, blind and people with no other place to live, usually numbering seven to twenty two residents. An earlier location was sold in 1873. This location was purchased in 1871, from John & Sally Ann Pirtle a farm 'for the use and benefit of the county paupers.' One hundred acres of this property was advertised for sale in 1883, again in 1897 (to build a new poorhouse or almshouse) again in 1918. It being sold in 1958 with the money from the sale to be used for addition to Ohio County Hospital. Ohio County repurchased this land in 2012. In 1904, dedication of new chapel for the Ohio County Poor Farm. 'The little chapel has been erected mainly for the edification and accommodation of the inmates of the county infirmary, and although of humble pretentions, is an elegant little structure. It is thought to be the only chapel of a county poorhouse in Kentucky. It adjoins the west wing of the main structure, and is so built that it can be reached by the inmates without stepping upon the ground.' The cemetery was used for residents of the poor farm, transients and other county residents, it was not moved but original tombstones were eradicated to allow for golf course construction.

The library does not own the information but it does have a copyright on the full text (letter for letter) of the abstracts. Some of the older abstracts on our site contain extensive supplemental information and organization of many articles. It makes we wonder why should I bother with doing the work if someone else is making it look like it was their work. In a weaker moment today I added an E-mail to the public messages under this particular Find A Grave member, Anita R. Austill. I really shouldn't have picked on her because she certainly is not the only one doing this. The following is what I posted:

"You are cutting and pasting directly from the Daviess County Public Library's Web site, "Owensboro Area Obituary Index" without crediting where you fully reprinted that record. The full abstract as done on this site is copyrighted and you are in violation of this copyright. Action can be taken against you! You leave the impression that you compiled this record. Mr. Meador, I have attached an article from the 24 March 1898 issue of the "Owensboro Inquirer". According to this account Col. Cicero Maxwell (1831-1865) was the son of William Maxwell, who was murdered by Irving / Irvin. This story states that William Maxwell was murdered near Fordsville about 1836. This has some discrepancies with other accounts. In Harrison Taylor's book, "Ohio County In the Olden Days", his account suggests the killing was about 1826. If it was in 1826 or before William Maxwell could not have been the father of Cicero. His gravestone and the 1850 & 1860 censuses of Ohio County indicate Cicero was born in 1831. In 1850 Cicero is with an older Elizabeth Maxwell (age 40) in the Pattieville area of Ohio County. Since William & Cicero lived in the same neighborhood of Ohio County I think that if William is not the father of Cicero he is very likely his grandfather. Mr. Meador: I have found records that indicate that there are two different William Maxwells that resided in the Pattieville area prior to 1850. The first is listed in the 1820 census of Ohio County, he was then over 45; the only ones in his household are two females and no other males. This William was apparently murdered by Ervin/Irvin circa 1824. In Ohio County will book B (p245) a sale of the estate of William Maxwell, deceased made on 6 November 1824 was recorded in December 1826. These dates correspond with Harrison Taylor's account of the murder of Maxwell and trial & execution of Irvin. In the 1830 census of Ohio County no Maxwells appear as household heads. In the 1830 Ohio County tax lists, however, a second William Maxwell is listed. This William married Elizabeth Wilson in Ohio County in 1831. He apparently died between 1835-1840. His wife, Elizabeth, is listed in the 1840, 1850 & 1860 Ohio County censuses. Elizabeth Maxwell's will was recorded on 3 April 1865 in Ohio County will book D (p17). In her will she refers to three children - Cicero, who is deceased (this is Col. Cicero, who was born in 1831 & died in 1865), William W. (other records indicate his full name was William Wallace Maxwell) and a daughter Helen Walters (in the Ohio County marriages it is recorded that Helen married Richard Walter in 1855). The William, who died in the late 1830's appears to be a brother to Cicero Hamilton Maxwell (1814-1893), who married Emeline Matthews, wand ho named one of their sons, Cicero. In the family trees published on the Internet no one has been able to identify who this second William Maxwell or Hamilton Maxwell were the sons of. Best wishes, Jerry Long

Several records establish that she is not a child of Jacob & Amelia, even though the obituary of Amelia (Ritch) Young does list her as a surviving child. Would it be all right to move the tallest one that is currently assembled and a smaller one (like the one in front of the KR desk) to the KR office or another spot so that I can begin isolating the items to be displayed on Memorabilia Day? On the larger rack I believe we can display 12 different paintings / pictorials and the smaller one will accommodate another 8.

I have added several attachments. I have tentatively reworked the library floor plan map for Memorabilia Day. I thought this could be the front side of a two-sided color program guide. The back side could be a separate listing for the displayers in the Art Gallery, Daviess County Book Store and parking lot.

Did we have to pay for the Pangea food truck to be here? What would it take to get then to come back? We might as well make it a real celebration. You cannot have a party without food!

One of my biggest concerns about Memorabilia Day is the arrival and getting everybody in place. There is certainly a lot that has to happen in that one hour between 12 & 1. About twenty of the displayers may need assistance carrying things in and setting them up. Since they are giving their time I think we should make their work as minimal as possible. Even if we have two or three staffers available at the entrance I think things may go a lot smoother if we had five or six additional volunteers for just that one hour. So found Adison Elmer Himes 1848-1913 buried Red Hill (son of Chris and Emily, death reported by Mr Bartlett) married 2-13-1908 Lucy (Morgan) Cottrell buried Elmwood. When Sarah married 1895 Mr Bartlett, Adison Himes signed for her. So at this point I am thinking Adison is Adam, etc. However, 1900 census Adison (b Tennessee) and wife Betsy Jane b 1846 have a daughter at home Sarah E Himes age 22 b Kentucky, etc. So unlikely they would have had 2 Sarah E Himes. And at Red Hill are two stones C Himes b 12-6-1813 d 1893 and E C Himes b 10-4-1817 d 12-24-1894 suspect they are Chris and Emily. Two other stones SBE Himes d 1898 and UC Himes b 1-22-1866 (Could this be 1860 Lucy Mahaney Himes real iffy)? Where are Adam and Lucy??? still the question. Wonder if Adam and Adison are twins?? Seems close but unable to untangle. Helen

I can add a couple of details. Adison/Addison Himes (1848-1913). Appears in the 1870 & 1900 Daviess County censuses; but I could not find him in the 1880 or 1910 censuses. In Ohio County on 16 January 1880 (book X, p266) he married Elizabeth Jane "Betsy" (Howard) Pate. She was the widow of John A. Pate. He was probably previously married and had children born prior to 1880 - possible children are Sarah Ellen Bartlett & Bascome Cornelius Himes. Betsy was born ca 1846 TN and died 21 January 1927 and was buried at the Red Hill Baptist Church. The 1900 census and her obituary suggest that she had three children by Adison Himes - Annie (Duncan), James Fearless & Bascus (spelling in obit) Himes. Adison did not marry Lucy Morgan in 1908 that was Elmer Himes (1885-1958).

I realize you don't have all dates for any given newspaper, however, when you do have a particular date it is logical to conclude that all pages would be filmed - not just half of them. When I go to your website by typing in the URL (newspapers.com) directly in the browser and not from a saved bookmark (URL) I get the same partial results. Again I have been working extensively with one newspaper title - "Charleston Daily Mail", Charleston, WV, where a lot of my family came from. For every year that I check subsequent to 1960 I only get partial results - only half of each issue, only the odd numbered pages (ex. 1, 3, 5, 7, etc). The even numbered pages of each specific issue are not shown (2, 4, 6, 8, etc.) As a retest I browsed each issue for the first week of January 1961 and January 1971 and got the following results: Jan 3, 1961 - I get 10 pages displayed for that issue, the table of contents for that issue shows that issue actually has 20 pages, the pages displayed on your site are pages, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11, 13, 15, 17, 19, but pages 2, 4, 6, 8, 10, 12, 14, 16, 18, 20 are not shown. For the next 6 issues of January 1961 I get the same half results. In rechecking January 1971 I got the same results. For Jan 2, 1971 - 8 pages are displayed, that issue's first page shows that issue has 16, the pages available for viewing are pages 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11, 13, 15 but pages 2, 4, 6, 8, 10, 12, 14, 16 are not available for viewing. This same consistent pattern exists for almost every year I check for the "Charleston Daily Mail". It would answer my question if you could check these two specific dates Jan 3, 1961 and Jan 2, 1971 and tell me how many pages (individual images) you show that are available for viewing. Are they 10 and 8 images respectively? Thank you for your patience, Jerry Long

I hope everything is well with you. Since leaving the library I have spent a lot of time dealing with my mother's health issues and breaking up her household. Last month we finalized the sale of her house. It had been our family's home for 51 years! A lot of memories were left there. I am beginning to pick up the pieces of my sanity.

I have been spending time doing genealogical research. In addition to subscribing to Ancestry.com I have added a subscription to Newspapers.com. I have been finding some sensational data in the old papers. I also have been enjoying catching some primetime TV programming that I had never been able to see before. Until retiring I had never seen an episode of Big Bang Theory. I am really hooked on it and have been catching the new episodes as well as many reruns. I really love the quirky characters on this show, they are a hoot. I have also been keeping up with America's Got Talent and the US Olympic trials.

I have a couple of questions. Did Mark Stone of KDLA (mark.stone@ky.gov) ever send the microfilms of Hancock County, KY deed books (1829-ca1900 and index)? I promised the Daviess County Bicentennial Committee that I would follow up on this. I hope you are having a good summer. I have been staying pretty busy. I haven't regretted retiring yet!

Leslie said it was okay to run some suggestions by you. As you know the library agreed to allow me to review and add to the Obituary database outside of Library hours of operation. I have made several "See also" additions to the older obits (ex. Milton Hall, George Panagos, Wilbur Norris, items from Keith Lawrence's columns, or other historical references, etc.). In the current obits I occasionally catch an omission or an error but they are rare. However, in the older "OI" additions (1942, 1943) there are quite a few changes from the established format. If you are not the one who is now making these additions I apologize for addressing this to you. If you are not doing these maybe you could pass the suggestions on.

It may seem that the changes are insignificant but they do affect the overall quality of the database. Many libraries have databases for their local obituaries but I believe none approaches the sophistication and consistency of the Owensboro Obituary Index. If these changes had been selected initially for the format they would be correct but they were not chosen. I believe sticking to the same format makes the database more "User Friendly", understandable and less confusing. One of the greatest attributes of the database is its standardization – an attempt was made to make everything always done the same way (see 'About' link). The 'Comments' field can get quite complicated and confusing when a long list of 'see also' articles are listed. The following are some suggestions about the Comments field. The changes to the original format that have been used for the OI additions for 1942 & 1943 are illustrated on the form of Joseph Alford (see below); corrections to the format are in the 'Survivors' field. I have changed all of the new variations (in 1942 & 1943) to the original selected format.

- After the end of the listing of the facts from the initial source date end it with a semicolon not a comma; thereafter separate each article with a comma
- Do not repeat 'see also' again after the first one at the beginning of a list; do not need to have the phrase 'see also' multiple times in the same list
- List all 'see also' articles in chronological order and after the correct source code (OI, OM, etc.)
- Additional info from any 'see also' article should go in parenthesis; for example see also OI 1942: 3/1 (former resident of Owensboro)
- Dates with pages are listed as OI 1942: 3/1 p.8A; not as OI 1942: 3/1, pA8 or p 8A
- Use former resident of ...; not formerly of...
- The first 'Source' (OM, etc) automatically adds OM to the beginning of the Comments field; if you add the source code at for the original first date at the beginning of the Comments it will end up looking like OM OM –

In the older obits (1942-43) in the cemetery field Rose Hill-Elmwood Cemetery has been used. The original obit would have shown one or the other but not both. The

usage of the combined "Rose Hill-Elmwood" only came into existence in recent years (circa 2001). Kelly Cemetery at Maceo is not spelled 'Kelley"; there is a Kelley Cemetery near Sorgho but it has been long abandoned and no one have been buried there in many years. For Catholic nuns use Sr. before her first name not (Sr.) after first name- which is reserved for Seniors).

If I have totally confused you please drop me a line or give me a call.

His mother, Dorothy Calloway Whitler Sims, was also my close friend while I was employed at Owensboro's Executive Inn Rivermont. We both worked in the dining room, she was a waitress and I worked room service. While talking I learned that she was from the Hell's Neck area of Ohio County, where my dad's family hailed from. We talked about this commonality many times and at a later date we discovered we were 3rd cousins. One of her regular patrons, the late M. J. Kelly, was a genealogist, and in conversing got her interested in digging into her family roots. She discovered she was a greatgreat-granddaughter of Benjamin Franklin Long, a Civil War soldier. She sent off and got his Civil War papers. She showed them to me and I have been hooked on genealogy since. I did not know about the Civil War vet but his was also the name of my grandfather Long and knew they had to be somehow related. And in August 1979 I visited the Kentucky Room at the Daviess County Public Library for the first time to find out the relationship. Through the 1880 & 1900 Ohio County censuses I learned that the older Benjamin Franklin Long was my great-greatgrandfather. This discovery was much more for me thru it I found my niche and career avocation. Genealogy fit me like a glove it matched my interests and skills perfectly.

After dining at the Old Hickory Restaurant I drove Mr. & Mrs. Whitler to my home and showed them my collection of materials on the Long, Travis, Sapp and their other ancestral lines. Mr. Whitler was raised by his stepfather, Opal G. Whitler. His mother told him his real father was a Charles Bebee Jacobacci, who she met while briefly employed in the Chicago area. I gave him an ancestor chart showing what I had on his ancestral lines. Also gave him charts showing how we were related to Mark Twain & J. C. Penney. I promised to send copies of several pictures.

I hope all is well with you. I really enjoyed Voices of Elmwood. Thanks for all of your work on this!!!! How is the Kentucky Room Breakfast Club group doing?

I am still occasionally editing and adding some 'see also' abstracts to the Owensboro Obituary Index (see entries for William Bailey Smith, 1864; Thomas Clay, 1931; William E. Danhauer, 1951; Paul Lee Price, 1967; Don Raines (2016), recent Voices of Elmwood MI bios; and others).

I have also recently done some more research on burials at Greenwood Cemetery. I have added eight more names. Three were from the recent 1940-1941 additions to the "Owensboro Obituary Index". Give a pat on the back to whoever is recording Greenwood burials. The other additions were from the US Headstone Applications for Military Veterans and Indiana & Illinois death certificates on Ancestry.com. I still need to go through the 1964 Kentucky death certificates for more additions.

I recently began proof reading the 1939-1940-1941 <u>Owensboro Inquirer</u> (OI) additions to the database. Are there no Inquirer papers available for May 11 thru December 31, 1939? In the "OI" additions there are numerous changes from the established format. Back in July I mentioned to you my concern about any changes to the original format and you said it was okay to send an e-mail to Christina. I never received an acknowledgment

that the e-mail was received. Several of the items I cited in that e-mail have been addressed, however, since then a whole new set of variations have been incorporated. Is Christina still the administrator-editor for the database? Some of the mistakes and variations make me think that she is not the editor. The new changes and inconsistencies since that e-mail are more disturbing. It took me several hours to proofread and correct the 1940-1941 additions. For just those two years there were new duplicate forms for 21 individuals, who were already in the database; another frequent mistake was putting Hopkins County for entries for Hopkinsville. There were some new "see also" entries that I could not decipher and correct.

I apologize for questioning the changes to the obit database format. I have thought long and hard about bringing it to your attention. The library's huge investment (of money and manpower) in this resource and its quality convinced me to pursue my concerns. It may seem that some of the changes are insignificant but they do affect the overall comprehensibility of the database. Many libraries have databases for their local obituaries but I believe none approaches the sophistication, consistency and complexity of the Owensboro Obituary Index. If some of these changes had been selected initially for the format they might be correct but they were not chosen. I believe sticking to the same format makes the database more "User Friendly", understandable and less confusing. One of the greatest attributes of the database is its standardization – an attempt was made to make everything always done the same way (see 'About' link on the Owensboro Obituary Index). Due to the complexity in the sometimes long listing of the 'see also' articles it is absolutely necessary to be obsessive compulsive about any changes to the databases' accepted format.

Two of the biggest most confusing changes in the format are the failure to maintain the chronological order of the 'see also' articles and the failure to list the year of the new OI entry. For example see also – OI: 1/31, p.4 is now being used; previously the format was see also OI - 1941: 1/31 p.4 (the year absolutely needs to be entered; the hyphen goes after source code; and no coma is used before p.4). The new OI entry should not be placed at the top of the 'see also' list of articles but in its correct chronological order in the list of multiple articles. I have attached a couple of forms that illustrate the problems that occur when this format is not adhered to. On Form A no year was given in the new OI addition; it probably is one from 1939, 1940 or 1941, however, without knowing what was correct I had to delete the new OI entry all together. On Form B the new OI addition has no year and it is thus confusing what is meant – I changed it to OI – 1941: 12/5 p.5, 12/7. There are other problems that are being caused by the failure to stick to the accepted format. The following are some of the changes in format:

- Do not repeat 'see also' again after the first one at the beginning of a list; do not need to have the phrase 'see also' multiple times in the same list
- After the end of the listing of the facts from the initial source date end it with a semicolon not a comma; thereafter separate each different article with a comma
- List all 'see also' articles in chronological order and after the correct source code; it is not necessary to use 'see also -', the hyphen goes after the source code such as OI 1942:
- Dates with pages are listed as OI 1942: 3/1 p.8A; not as OI 1942: 3/1, pA8 or p 8A; a comma before p. is not necessary

- The comments for a new first time obit abstract do not go in parenthesis; the additional comments for any 'see also' articles do go in parenthesis
- For a new form the first 'Source' (OM, etc) automatically adds OM to the beginning of the Comments field; if you add the source code for the original first date at the beginning of the Comments it will end up looking like OM OM –

I have reviewed the 1940-1941 new OI additions and added the years and corrected the format. In a few instances I could not decipher what was correct. If the format is not adhered to I believe it will make it increasingly difficult to retrieve the articles in the future. If the person that is now making the additions to the database printed out one of the more complex abstracts (for example Thomas Clay McCreery, 1890 or James Weir, 1906) they could readily visualize and study what was done and what is needed.

I apologize about bringing this to your attention. I had to give it a shot. Any feedback would be greatly appreciated. I have a lot of free time if anyone is interested in any further explanation.

Last Sunday morning, December 4, about 5 a.m., my mother fell at her residence at the Carmel Home. She was hospitalized at Owensboro Health Regional Hospital. She fractured her pelvis in two places and needing rehab she was today transferred to the Hermitage Nursing & Rehabilitation Center.

He is representing Harry Roberts, who is attempting to purchase property of Bernard Gratzer, at 3779Thruston-Dermont Road, Owensboro. The sale price for the house and farm will be about \$99,000. Bernard & Robert Gratzer purchased the farm in 1967. When Robert Gratzer died no pre-arrangements for the property had been completed. Consequently my mother, Mabel Gratzer Long, an immediate heir of Robert, would have a one-fourth share in the property. I had discussed this with my mother and she agreed that she has no fair interest in the property and it should go exclusively to her Bernard Gratzer. Mr. Starnes said to release my mother's interest she would have to sign a Quit Claim deed and it would need to be notarized. I explained my mother was hospitalized in the Hermitage. He said he would have the deed prepared and will notify me when it is ready.

Thanks for the updates on your family. I have added your two new great-granddaughters to my files. I was very sorry to read that you have had several health issues this past year.

Mom's health has greatly deteriorated in the past two years. This past September she celebrated her 91st birthday. In the summer of 2014 she was still driving and doing for herself. In August 2014 she and I did the annual Owensboro bridge walk. I had to slow her down so I could take in the scenery. In October 2014 she blacked out and fell at home. She broke two ribs and was hospitalized several days. At the beginning of 2015 she requested our assistance saying that she was having great difficulty in maintaining herself at home. With her consent we placed her name on the waiting list for admittance to the Carmel Home. It is one of the most reputable nursing homes in Owensboro and is located just a few blocks from her home. On 15 March 2015 she entered the facility. In October 2015 she had a couple of falls within a short time. The last one hospitalized her again. She had compressed two vertebrae and has since been aided by a walker. After some rehab she was able to return to the Carmel Home. Within the past two months she has had another four falls. The first three were she either slid down are fell back against something; in these she experienced no evident injuries. But the last one on December 4th hospitalized her again. This time she fractured her pelvis in two places. Requiring more rehabilitation before being able to return to the Carmel Home she was admitted to the Hermitage Care & Rehabilitation Center here in Owensboro on December 9th and is still a patient there. Currently she is greatly struggling having lost her motivation to get back on her feet. We are maintaining her room at the Carmel Home in the hopes she will be able to return there.

After leaving home we maintained Mom's home for a year. She refused to visit it saying that it would be as hard to leave it as it was the first time. In March 2016 one of her former neighbors approached us asking if we were going to sell it. The wife's parents were hoping to move near them. Mitchell, mom & I discussed selling it and agreed on an asking price. They met are price and in June 2016 we sold it. It was our family home since 1965. It took us two months prior to the sell to dispose of the household items. Next to my dad's death this was the hardest experience of my life.

Mitchell, Jr's fifth grandchild was born on 13 May 2016 (I have attached a picture of her). Avery Lynette Long was born in Los Angeles, CA to Brian Mitchell Long & Arpi Shakhbandaryan; Brian's wife is a native of Armenia and immigrated to the US at the age of six. One of Mitchell's son-in-laws, Nick Duvall, this year entered the service of the US Department of State as Force Security Special Agent. He & his wife, Katie, are living in New York City. He has already been on one assignment outside of the US – this past summer he was in the country of Georgia. In the latter part of 2015 he resigned as a Kentucky State policeman to enter the CIA training program. Shortly after leaving his post in Richmond, KY his replacement, Daniel Ellis, was shot and killed while on a call; his death made national news headlines.

I retired on 29 February 2016 from the Kentucky Room of the Daviess County Public Library. I was in my 28th year there. In all I had used the room for 37 years. For ten years prior to my employment I had used the room as a professional and amateur genealogist. It was truly my second home.

I was fortunate in accidentally discover genealogy as an avocation. During 1978-1984 I was employed in the room service department of the former Executive Inn Rivermont here in Owensboro. While there I served many of the stars, who performed

there – the most personable and impressive being Johnny Cash, the man in Black! While there my closest friend was an older waitress Dorothy Calloway Whitler. While talking one day I found out she was a native of the Hells Neck neighborhood of Ohio County. I thought that something about her reminded me of granddad Long. Sometime later one of her faithful patrons discussed genealogy with her and she got interested in it. She shortly discovered that she was a great-great-granddaughter of a Civil War soldier, Benjamin F. Long, of Ohio County. At that time I did not know who this was but having the same name as granddad and living in the same area I figured he had to be somehow related. Mrs. Whitler had sent off and got his Civil War pension file.

In August 1979 I visited the Kentucky Room in the hopes of learning who this vet was. I knew that granddad's father was John Howard Long but I did not know beyond that. The pension file listed that the older Ben Long had a son, "J. H." Long, who was born on 12 March 1852 and I wondered if this was John Howard Long. I went through the 1900 census of Ohio County. I located granddad with his parents and his dad's birthday matched that of J. H. Long in the pension file. Later when I visited Uncle Hubert and examined granddad's old trunk we found a slip of paper on which he had written his dad's name and birth date ("John Howard Long was born 12 March 1852").

Dorothy Whitler was thus my 3rd cousin – her mother, Margaret Sapp Calloway was your 2nd cousin. She knew about the old log cabin at Jingo, where Benjamin F. Long had died in 1909. In fact as a child her family briefly also had lived there! Mrs. Whitler acquired a free veteran's monument from the VA and installed it on the grave of the old soldier on the hill behind the cabin. When I first visited the Ohio County Library in Hartford I met a genealogist who told me about an artist who had just completed a painting of the old Jingo log cabin ("Humble Valley Home").

Since my first visit to the Kentucky Room in August 1979 I have not once stopped doing genealogy. It matched up with my interest in history and all my skills. I was always a collector – baseball cards & stats, scrapbooks, stamps, solving puzzles, etc. Many times I have wondered where I would be if I had not discovered my Hells Neck cousin!

The Daviess County Public Library upon my retirement consented to allow me to continue with my editorial control over their most used online database, the Owensboro Obituary Index, on the library's Website. I proofread and approve everything that goes into it and make new additions from articles that provide historical information about that individual. This was one of my biggest accomplishments while working at the library. I spent countless hours on it. The database seeks to not only abstract information given in obituaries but also cross reference other Owensboro newspaper articles about that person – for the more prominent individuals it is a great biographical tool. For example checkout (http://obits.dcplibrary.org) entries for Mitchell C. Long (1999), William Smothers (1866) and Florence Henderson (2016).
